

Dictator at Helm Urgent German Need

Common People Believe An Iron Hand to Guide the Wrecked German Ship Will Mean Salvation; Food Question Vital.

BREIN, Nov. 20.—Germany is a dictator. The necessity of guiding the Hohenzollern or any other royal family on a national emergency is a matter of people believe Germany much more than it does the Germans themselves.

What do Germans want is food. They think they may get it if a dictator is established. That is the situation as seen here today.

With much more than a dollar a bushel and bread and potatoes proportionally high and nearly unobtainable in any price, the average German daily wants a strong central government which will stabilize the currency and get their started.

The labor organizations have frequently said it is known that they would use all their power against any attempt to overthrow the republic. Their general strike, it will be remembered, defeated the former Kapp Putsch in March, 1920.

It is considered questionable if they would be willing to employ the general strike today, however, because it might be settling off their food supplies from the country.

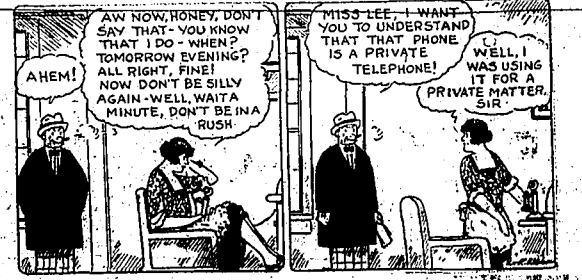

FIRST CHAMBER COMMERCE MEET THURSDAY NIGHT

Expanded Organization Will Hold Its First Meeting Thursday of This Week at Twin Falls. Many Suggestions for Coming Year Expected.

The expanded chamber of commerce will hold its first meeting Thursday of this week at Twin Falls. The subject for discussion will be "What Should the Chamber of Commerce Do This Year in Building a Greater Twin Falls?"

There will be three two-minute talks by leaders of the discussion and then everybody will be given a chance to take part. After that the members can recommend certain lines of action to the board of directors. The meeting promises to be very interesting and it is hoped that every member of the chamber of commerce will be present.

Some of the outstanding suggestions which have been made are: request of ten per cent of the members in good standing; the board of directors shall, by its own initiative, submit a question to the members for a small referendum vote; the ballot for such a vote to be accompanied by brief statistics which show the question as to whether it is in their interest.

The election of directors by what is known as the Australian ballot system—according to this system ballots—containing three 34 names will then be sent to each member asking them to vote for 12 sending their ballot by mail. The 12 receiving the highest vote will be declared elected. This is the most democratic method of electing and gives every one an opportunity to vote.

Members Form—This is the common ground on which all members should meet to present and consider matters for the program of work. It is the drama of the organization and will be semi-monthly if not weekly meetings for the discussion of the problems connected with the advancement of Twin Falls.

LIBEL CASE IS GIVEN TO JURY TODAY

Liberty of Press and Value of Fearless Newspapers Stressed by Attorneys for Defense in Presenting Arguments Last Evening.

The alleged libel case of E. F. Walters against the proprietor of The Times was submitted to the jury at 9:15 o'clock this morning after the reading of instructions of the court. At the time of going to press it was still out.

Frank L. Stephan opened for the defense yesterday, following and replying to the opening address of the attorney for the plaintiff, Mr. Stephen said that the libelous and calumnious purpose of protecting the community and its rights, although said that Walters was moved by envy, spite and vindictiveness. It was said by Mills that he wanted to establish a new era of law. Probably this was like the reign of law which he sought to establish in his country in 1908. "The plaintiff is not after the establishment of a new reign of law, he is here to demand his right of libel," Mr. Stephan said. The trouble began by the attack of Walters on Masters in the first issue. High tribute to the Times as an example of an independent press was paid last evening by Judge E. J. Walters, by closing the case for the defense, and the right of the Times to publish and to express their opinions on public affairs and to combat wrongs was stressed. Judge Walters said that the papers that dare to speak the truth are worth while in any community, and that "Walters" in this community is not what it was in the past. The Times should be given a vote of thanks. There comes a time in the history of newspapers as in the history of nations when they must speak up. Such conditions existed in this community.

Judge Walters quoted from the Observer in saying that it had assailed the defendant. "Walters" in the "Red" was in some of the editorial by the Times. Judge Walters said that the term "Walters" was used toward Roosevelt, Bryan and Frank Goodwin. Turning to the charge of "boogymongering" the attorney read from the depositions the supervision of Judge Walters was not released on the ground that he was innocent of the charge of selling the "Red" in violation of law, but because the judge in authority had exceeded the authority granted in the matter of imposing fines. "He said that the term 'boogymongering' was not one which would lay the foundation for a libel suit. It is often considered a compliment as is oftening influence in the community. Reviewing the character witnesses, Judge Walters said that the testimony as a whole indicates that the previous reputation of Walters was not worth one-thousandth part of a cent's worth. The character of Judge Walters at the time of publication, the Times gave him what he sought, notoriety. It called attention to his character and it was not notoriety that he built that most during "his brief and hectic career. The Times was a Roman holiday. The Times described a vote of thanks from the community to Walters on the man."

E. M. Dampier scored I. H. Masters, the editor of the Times, whom he said was as near a copoly as a man could be. He claimed that I. H. Masters in 1902 in the town of Bur did not constitute bootlegging, and said that the case was thrown out by the supreme court because of excessive penalty imposed by the judge. He said that the Brethren claim of \$500 for rent against the Elzie Millinery of Judge Walters was an officer would not warrant the charge that he had moved to avoid paying rent. Dampier made much of the testimony of W. O. Griffin, merchant's policeman, that Walton had always borne a good reputation, saying that the reason he had not heard of Walton's conviction at Star, while living in Boise was because it was not talked about in Boise. Dampier conceded that the plaintiff had admitted that Walton had built a warehouse, would testify as the highest character whom Walton had built a warehouse, and as a law abiding citizen. Mr. Dampier also informed the jury that the suit brought by Walton had caused the "Walters" to close the company to cost \$10,000 worth of work in this city.

INTERNATIONAL CO-OPERATION COOKE'S PLAN

Lecture Urges Tolerance and Harmony in Affairs of Nations

Declaring that notwithstanding the existence of organizations like the Ku Klux Klan, the world has progressed in the matter of tolerance and harmony during the past 6000 years, Edmund Vance Cooke lecture, last night toward the close of an interesting, clever and varied program, pleaded for like tolerance in political matters and for a larger nationalness. The lecture was frequently applauded from the time of the introduction of the speaker, fellow native of the Buckeye State until its close. Cooke, the international relations, Mr. Cooke praised the death bed message for a world court, given out by late President Harding. He said, however, that without the force and sentiment of a larger national feeling, the court would be a failure. Turning to the question of loyalty, the speaker said that a critic of some of the relations with foreign nations had said "You cannot love more than one wife. If that were of common sense, it would be a good thing. In addition here a warm feeling for your mother; you may have some affection for a sister, and you may have a whole host of cousins for whom you have some love. We have the greatest league of nations on earth in these United States. It is said that we are all one race. Here there may be more similarity in the interests of the first generation of children of foreign born. Yet they are Americans. They constitute one people. The Irish and English, the French and the Germans; the Czech and Slovakian and the Bulgarian all get along together as neighbors and friends. It is said that we all have common interests. Yet in these are great divergences between the industries and interests of New York and New Mexico; Georgia and Oklahoma; Dakota; of the various nations of Europe. You are patriotic toward your state, but you bear no ill will toward another state, and you have a love for the whole great world. One difference between crossing the line between one state and another is this: you do not know when you cross a state line. "If there were on the borders of the state at every crossing frontier fortresses, with soldiers on guard, with the tax gatherer and revenue collector to go through your effects; you would not be able to maintain the feeling of friendship and co-operation among so many conflicting interests as you have in this country. We must have the same spirit toward our international relations that we have at home and we must work together whether in the league of nations, a concert of powers, an association of nations, call it what you will. We must have the spirit and the feeling of the agreement will be a scrap of paper."

Anti-Tuberculosis Society Explained at Legion Luncheon

Plea for christening in the work of the sale of Christmas seals by the Anti-Tuberculosis association which has charge of the work, was made today at the American Legion luncheon by Mrs. D. L. Alexander, who is head of the work. While this society prior to the war was crated the work of the Red Cross seal, it has not been since the Red Cross proper entered the larger work in connection with the war and the post war activities. It has at all times been a distinct society and has a double duty in the work of the Red Cross of the organization so named.

One-third instead of one-fourth of the total receipts remain here to foot in the kiddies luncheon. The work of the Idaho seal was explained by Mrs. Alexander as follows: In Co-operation With All Official Agencies. It investigates the prevalence of the disease in the state. It informs the public and arouses interest in tuberculosis prevention and public health. It organizes committees and cities and helps them to meet their local tuberculosis and health problems—supplies program of work and trained workers to help. Works for needed legislation for the control and care of tuberculosis. Organizes the Christmas seal sale and thus finances the work in the state. Safeguards the health of the children by providing public health nurses where there are no school or county nurses, by supplying and financing a "train habit" program for public and parochial schools, by establishing nutrition and milk drinking campaigns for underweight children.
