Brown Bran Betty For Tasty Dessert



JULIA A. DUCE

HINT: Is something new in dessert, a "Brown Bran Betty" recipe from the kitchen of Mrs. Julia A. Duce, a Boston dietitian of note.

"Brown Bran Betty" has an appetizing sound and its taste lives up to promise, as Mrs. Duce has a background of extensive dietetical knowledge to draw from.

"During my early days of domesticity," she says, "I realized the importance of a sound knowledge of foods played in the health and happiness of my family, and I read every book on dietetics that had favorable mention at the public library or in the press and read food three times a day in my own kitchen."

Likewise Mrs. Duce studied at the Chicago School of Domestic Science and was at one time editor of a weekly newspaper in Nebraska, where she conducted a column devoted to foods and household problems. Here is her recipe, which calls for bran that is all bran:

Alternate layers of bread crumbs, butter, all bran and hard sliced apples. Sprinkle each layer with a little water, brown sugar and cinnamon, making top layer of crumbs and bran. Put with butter and sugar in a greased, covered dish. Cook until apples are soft, then remove cover and brown. Serve with ice cream or soup as taken from cover. As this recipe will serve five people, a medium sized baking dish should be used.

To make the egg sauce break one egg over a cup of granulated sugar and beat until mixture is foamy and entirely free from granules of sugar. Pour over this two tablespoons of boiling milk; add vanilla to taste and beat thoroughly. The sauce's success depends upon vigorous beating.

After-Dinner Tricks

A handkerchief is held by fingers diagonally opposite, between the thumb and index finger. The fingers are held together and drawn apart quite slowly. A knot has been prepared in the middle of the cloth.

The trick depends upon a shift of fingers, executed as the hands come together. Hold the handkerchief exactly as shown in the first picture. The thumb is turned back up, while the fingers, though covered up under the handkerchief, are drawn apart.

The left end of the handkerchief is held between the thumb and index finger of the right hand, and the right end is simply held between the left hand. The forefingers are raised, pulling the original knot to the right. The hands are simply drawn apart. The knot is tied automatically.
