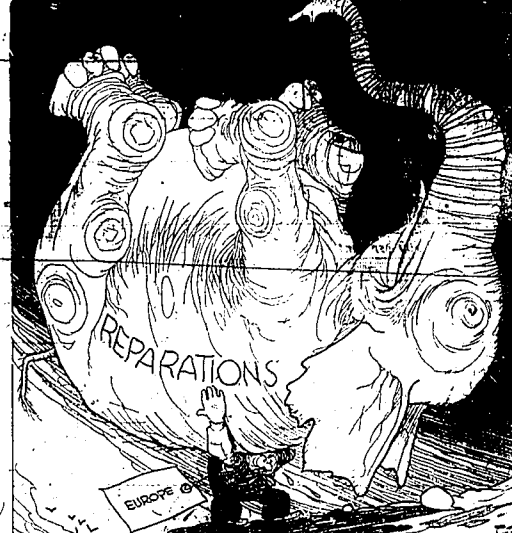

ENFORCE CURBING AND PAVING CONTRACT

The city commission last evening took a wise step when it instructed City Attorney A. J. Myers to take steps looking toward the fixing of the city curbing permanent. The members were unanimous in the opinion that from 75 to 100 per cent of the curbing is bad and that where the company has made what purported to be repairs they have proven unsatisfactory. In deciding to stand on the Murtagh report made during the previous administration, regarding conditions, the administration is on sound ground. It gave a distinct pledge when entering office to take all legal steps possible under the contract with the city to enforce the terms of the agreement. While the Murtagh construction company showed a disposition at least by implication, professed a desire to make adequate repairs, reasonable time might well be allowed to permit the carrying out of such provisions. But if the engineer of that company has, as said to have been reported by W. A. Minnick, another employe, distinctly repudiated that obligation, it is time to take steps to set the matter out finally. Perhaps the engineer, J. W. Covert, was misunderstood by Mr. Minnick, or perhaps Mr. Minnick was misunderstood by Mayor Hodgkin, but in either of these events, there will be repudiation somewhere along the line, followed by an evidence of good faith on the part of the company. There is an impression in this city that the company is as reticent in these matters as the Germans are about carrying out reparations pledges, and this can only be dissipated by speedy compliance with the conditions "nominally in the bond." If there is a dispute as to the meaning of the contract, the courts might as well settle it now as later.

RAISING WHEAT PRICES

A very singular proposition is that put forth by the American Wheat Growers' association as shown in the story released today and published elsewhere in this paper. Clearly and correctly that association sets forth the fact that since the ultimate market for our 170,000,000 bushels of surplus wheat is abroad and since this will not be exported unless the price abroad is higher than it is here, it must be obvious that the price of American wheat must depend on the condition of the foreign market. All that is clear enough. Then says the association, unless the price received for the export is raised, home prices will not be raised. Fine and dandy. Then, pursues the argument, Europe is demoralized and as a result consumption has fallen off there and this has depressed the price of wheat here. Undeniably. What then? Well, says the report, let us tax all the wheat offered for sale in America seven cents a bushel and that will raise demand enough to pay 30 cents a bushel extra for the 170,000,000 bushels exported and that will be a net gain of 23 cents a bushel to the farmers, since the price here is governed by the price received for wheat that is exported. It looks like a clever fallacy. The price of wheat is governed here by the price received on the markets abroad, specifically in Liverpool. But under normal conditions this means that 170,000,000 only goes because the law of demand and supply strike a price balance which halts exportation at that point. There is no arbitrary limit fixed to the amount that is to be exported. In order to raise wheat prices here, it would be necessary to be willing to offer 30 cents above the foreign price, not merely for 170,000,000 bushels but for all that might be offered. It would inevitably happen that the rush of wheat for export would continue until the 170,000,000 bushels had been sold until the Liverpool price would be forced down 30 cents below its normal by the surplus dumped on it. In the long run, the farmers would be lucky if they got back the seven cents tax which they paid, less the cost of the operation of the governmental machinery involved in collecting it and paying the bonus on the exports. That's the way I look at it. Read the article yourself; perhaps I am all wrong. Draw your own conclusions.

MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 27. Proposals for legislation to improve conditions in the wheat industry will be taken up at the meeting of the American Wheat Growers' Association, which is being held here today.

The American Wheat Growers' Association advocates the establishment of an agricultural export commission consisting of the secretary of agriculture and the secretary of commerce. The commission would have power to levy a tax upon all of the valuable wheat produced in the United States. The fund that it created would be applied as a premium on that portion of the crop which is sold for export. Inasmuch as the export portion of the crop is a small fraction of the total production, the burden of the tax would be increased fourfold when applied to the portion of the crop which is sold for export. Through the addition of this premium to the export price, according to the American Wheat Growers' Association, the domestic price paid for the three quarters of the crop produced in this country would be increased by the amount of the tax. The commission would be authorized to determine the amount of wheat which would be sold for export, and to determine the amount of the premium, thus resulting in a general large increase over the present international market.

It is obvious that the greater the available surplus in proportion to the domestic consumption, the higher would be the tax and the less the net result of the federal operation. The operation of an export commission on this plan would greatly assist the growth of cooperative wheat marketing organizations such as ours, which hereafter, while making a number of progress, have been handicapped by their inability to control enough wheat to protect their markets from the depressed conditions of international markets.

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CURBING AND MEAT RULES DISCUSSED

Commission Instructs City Attorney to Take Steps Looking Toward Enforcement of Paving and Curbing Contract; Stand on Murtough Report; Sanitary Regulations for Meat Sales to Be Put in Effect; Blue Light Table License is Revoked.

Announcement of determination to enforce the terms of the contract with the Warren Construction Company regarding curbing as well as paving in spite of its reported disavowal of responsibility for the question of the same; referring of the question of investigation into an alleged smoke nuisance in the vicinity of a Fourth avenue laundry to City Attorney A. J. Myers; passage of a resolution authorizing the city to publish; discussion of the matter of the Blue Light table license of T. J. Woods for final settlement Monday night; accepting a bond from the railroad addition, and allowing two milk licenses, the city that night would pass an ordinance with a referendum and discussion of the several most vexing regulation question that has occupied the attention of the courts and of three pending administrations for many years. On this last there was no consensus of opinion beyond a general agreement that better regulations should be enforced.

Paving and Curbing. The curbing and paving question that started earlier before the commission were old timers in city affairs. Both had figured in city politics for years. In the election of 1921 all three parties agreed that paving and curbing should be carried out.
