ROUND CITY, Kansas, Nov. 30.—A trail of Kansas farmers, led by a man named who has taken up the trail to Mound City, Mo., to look for the body of a woman, whose death has been attributed to a preliminary hearing of the dead woman's husband and her niece.

The Manchester Guardian stated that the agency statement to be at variance with official opinion regarding Germany and says:

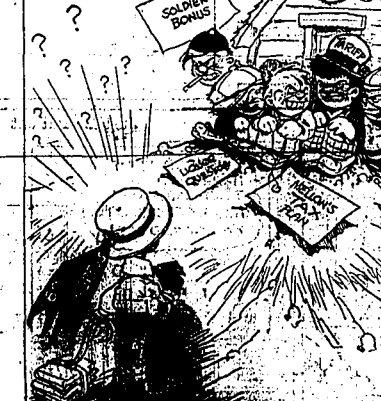
"Whoever repeats that statement was palpably bent on mischief."

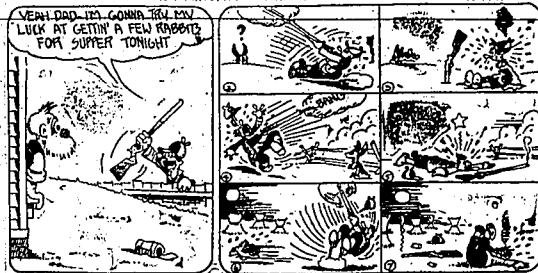

AUTO TAX GOES UP IN 1924

Strict Regulation and Enforcement Will Follow New Years; You Must Pay for Current Quarter Before Getting New Permit; Trucks and Dealers Get Jolt from Statute Passed Last Year.

Increasing changes are in force in regard to the tax laws for the coming year, including the balance of the present one. It appears from the long results of the law recently voted by (County) Assessor H. Claude Stewart from Boise. The law radically changed during the last term of the legislature in many particulars. It is expected that the Automotive association got a number of regulations, but that the railroad got in still more, though proof of this is said to be lacking. Hereafter there will be no reduction in the license fee for a renewed five years. Previously there was a reduction in the license fee in such cases. All cars regardless of age or previous condition of accuracy pay the same license. In addition to this it is necessary for all who buy a car in December to pay the license for 1924 necessary for the year of 1923 before they can get a license for 1924. Payment of personal property tax is no protection.

Stricter Rules Enforced.

Another rule hereafter enforced is that all licenses must be issued from the office of the county assessor and must be applied for by a person by the purchase of his license. The practice of having deputies in other towns is abolished. Truck owners must bring their trucks to the courthouse and be one of the deputies just go down and inspect it in person.

Big License Increase.

Truck owners and dealers are hit heavily by the new license law. This is because of the fact that according to tonnage capacity instead of according to weight. A five-ton truck that was licensed for \$140 last year will pay \$160 for next year.

Previously dealers paid \$25 for the first dealers license and \$25 for other cars added. Plates cost \$200. Now the new law \$22 license is charged the dealer and one plate goes with it. The next plate costs \$5, the second \$10 and so on as a sliding scale up to the seventh which costs \$35.

Warning that the state will enforce the law, rigidly come with the notice.
