The governor asked the jury to withhold judgment until the whole story was told.

BOYS SCOUTS

(Conducted by National Council of the Boy Scouts of America.)

SCOUTS' AND CAMPING

"The remarkable trend of the present day among people of all walks of life toward outdoor activity, and especially camping," says a student of the out-door, "is directly traceable to the influence of the boy scout program." With the slogan "Every Scout a Camper," camping among boy scouts is becoming an all-year round feature. Scouts like everything about camping. From thumbing camp booklets to reading camp statellets, and following are some unique ones, compiled by a scout executive of Waits, Washington:

Two hundred thousand scouts attended scout camp last year for one week or more. They traveled an average of 50 miles each, in going to and from camp, or a total distance of 10,000,000 miles. At the average linking pace of three miles per hour, it would take 300 years to cover this distance, which by the way, is about 400 times around the world. In an auto mobile at the rate of 35 miles an hour and with no stops, it would take 30 years.

Each boy scout, it has been estimated, generates at least one horse-horsepower while taking his morning calisthenics, which would give over 300,000 horsepower, enough to drive a heavy freight train over mountains.

The flag is raised each morning on a lowered camp at camp. At the average speed of 40 feet per minute, 40 hours are consumed each day in this one important part of camp life.

Ten train loads of food are required to feed these scouts. If they were all to use one mess line this line would be over 80 miles long.

A scout in water can support about 125 pounds. If all these scout camps were brought together they could support 125 tons of the equipment of a fully-armed fighting boat.

The scouts consume over 50,000 gallons of water each day; or more than enough to float this boat.

The boys combine approximately 12,500 acres and all the eggs 10,000 hens would lay in one year.

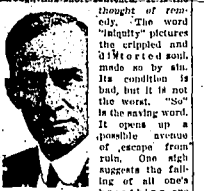

INTELLIGENCE and turn of mind are talents which shall not be ruined. Ecclesiastical 1:20.



One thought always like a day-dawn through this short existence has thought of cowardly. The word "iniquity" pictures the situation and I worried soul, made so by sin. His condition is bad, but it is not the worst. "So" in the morning word, it opens up a possible avenue of escape from ruin. One might suggest the falling of all one's wings by a certain one.

One thought of possible ruin. In God's word both the present iniquity and the impending ruin are followed by the blessedness of heaven, God-defying, death, are fully stated here. You do not find any thoughtless ignoring of our sufferings and hardships. Every phase of them is dealt with both for time and eternity. Iniquity is therefore real, and ruin may be real.

But! There is not a pleasing or selfish consideration attachable to the word. A ruined city, a ruined home, ruined life, ruined reputation, a ruined soul! It all stands (may fall) hidden in a night until by even the faintest glow of a light. But it means worth, but worth discarded to the past. It means value, but value and hopelessness. It is the gift of an "eternal sin"—a stumbling to fall.

God, through Ezekiel, was calling to His people, although they were iniquitous. His purpose was to end the wrecking before it became ruin. And this is the very business of the Christian's Gospel. It can prevent the doom. It is uttered that men "might not perish." In there any subject in all the world more difficult, more romantic? Behold! Here the rule of a soul is prevented, not by a force of fallen places, but by a work of grace wrought into the soul itself which causes it to turn in its journey toward ruin and eternally journey toward increasing glory.

First, then, there is the iniquity which the making which is against one, we might hear the physician say that there is one chance in fifty or perhaps one in twenty for recovery. But it is never so here. "He is able to save unto the uttermost." The sinner "of whom I am chief" having been saved certainly "in all acceptation" that Christ falls with no one who accept Him. Find in all the universe any, just one failure, where this remedy has been accepted and has failed. If you could find one, then you would find that all had failed and that there was no real Gospel to announce to sinful men.

Second, There is the rule rendered forever impossible. It is first saved, then safe. It is "kept by the power of God," and with that keeping who could be ruined? "We are not of the night." Our day has begun.

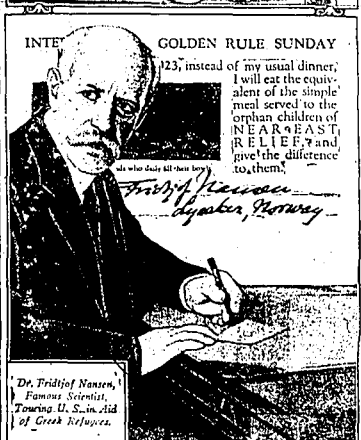

Look into the depths and behold the impending ruin, then look, oh soul, into the heights and behold the place prepared by Him who made the ruin. There is what you escape; here is what you gain.

And it is all personal. Let it be stated, "I am the man who has suffered from iniquity. I am the man, through grace, but I am the man, through grace in Christ Jesus—saved and safe." 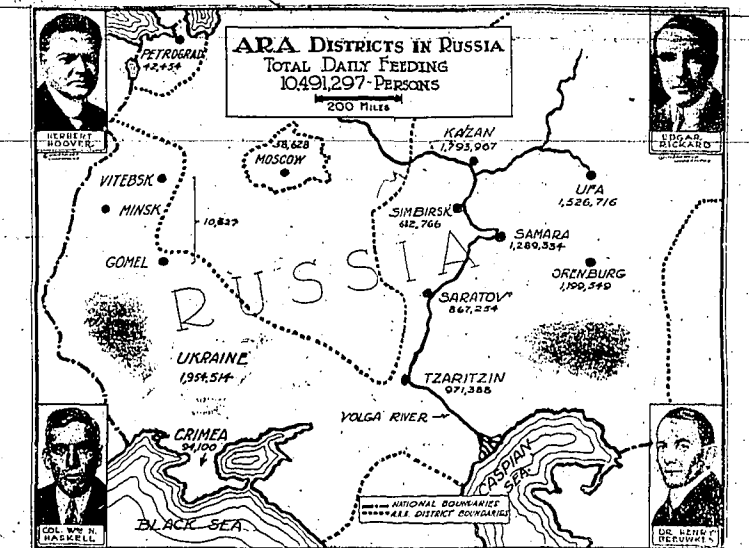

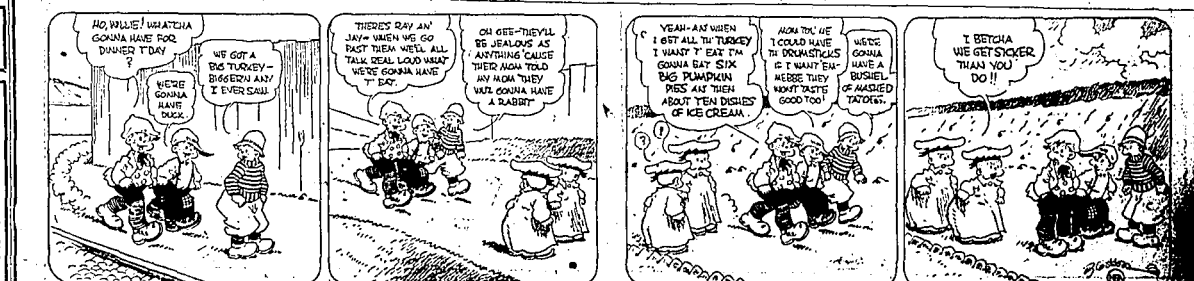

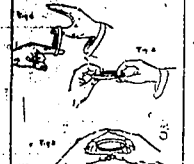
