

13 CONVICTS FLEE KANSAS PENITENTIARY

Escape Not Detected for More Than an Hour After Men Leave Prison; Posses Hot on Trail; General Alarm is Sounded.

LANSING, Kansas, Dec. 2.—Posses led by bloodhounds today attempted to find the trails of thirteen prisoners who escaped from the Kansas penitentiary by burrowing through an abandoned tunnel.

Throughout the night, 100 guards directed the operations of citizen posse which tracked the fugitives along the river banks toward the railroad tracks. None of the prisoners had been sighted since the escape was carried out while the 1,000 prisoners in the institution enjoyed their Sunday holiday.

The delivery was not discovered until more than an hour after the men were missing from their cells. When the convict set down for supper, thirteen vacant places were noted. Men immediately started searching for the missing prisoners had out a hole in the wall of the power house, burrowed through five miles of pipe, and emerged at an abandoned tunnel, 14 1/2 miles long. Through this narrow hole, the men fled with their arms, the map worked their way to liberty.

A general alarm was sounded. The prisoners from the penitentiary trucks were turned along the underbrush along the river. Bloodhounds were used as they followed the fresh trail. Discarded prison caps were found at the end of the tunnel where they emptied into a small creek, indicating the men found civilian clothes waiting. Authorities said the men had apparently been given outside aid.

Traps showed the convicts had divided into two groups. One attempted to make its way toward Kansas City and the other toward Leavenworth.

Warden A. V. Anderson believes the men were planned to escape by Frank C. Castro, a one-eyed half-breed, under Castro's second term robbery. Castro is serving 30 years and was a new tunnel was built and the old one abandoned. All officials had been warned of the escape of the old tunnel, and none of the prison guards of maps showed the route. Castro was a convict who started and by burrowing through the power house concrete walls, he created an avenue of escape.

Most of the men who escaped were serving terms of from 10 to 20 years for robbery.

Skeleton of Little Tot Identified by Finding of Shoe Maker's Label

JERSEY CITY, N. J., Dec. 2.—A baby's skull and a few bones, found by a farmer in a tunnel beneath a hillside near Greeley, Pa., will be buried here in the belief they are all that is mortal of little Jimmy Glass.

The child disappeared more than eight years ago from a summer cottage taken by Mr. and Mrs. Charles Glass at Greeley. Jimmy was four years of age at that time.

Since then the father has traveled 2,000 miles looking for his boy. The trail had led to wherever Egypt, to Porto Rico and other exotic lands long credited with kidnapping the child, swabber. Clues have come from Italy, France, Greece, etc.

The latest of these was from Greeley, where Otto Kunkler, a farmer, found a skull that might have been Jimmy's, a few bones, a set of buckles and a baby shoe. By the maker's mark on the side of the shoe, Charles Glass identified the tiny remains as those of his long-missing boy. He took them back to Jersey City, to the mother who has never ceased to watch for her boy's return and they will be buried and the child's year mystery concluded at an end.

The future of the Twin Falls country is not dependent on the construction of the railroad south for her future business prosperity and success. The determination and spirit of the people to do things is the real test of our future progress. Coupled with this is the high purpose to keep this community free from the influence of radicals and propagandists who only tend to destroy rather than build up.

Walking has become a lost art in Twin Falls and vicinity. Yet it is one of the best forms of exercise and the most healthful pastime that can be indulged in for the business or professional man. About the only exception to this rule is found in those who hunt and fish. The growth of the Twin Falls Times was set forth in an advertisement the other day in this paper. We stated that we had put on 107 new subscribers since October the first and we are still growing. We have no criticism of others but we are determined to stand for the bigger and better things for Southern Idaho and we believe that such a policy will continue to win favor with the public generally. Every newspaper must have a policy and stand by that dictum. The Times has pursued this plan since June first, 1921, and we expect to continue that policy. If newspapers, like some men, try to take a middle of the road attitude on public questions, they will not be sought by the people who really do things in a community. We are not finding fault with the churches or with the means of grace as offered in this city, but we do believe that more of those who call themselves Christians should try to live according to the commandments and the teachings of the New Testament. The lack of this is the greatest hindrance to the church of today.

We are of the opinion that had the Twin Falls football team played Boise on Thanksgiving day instead of Burley, the score would have been more in favor of Southern Idaho. Football is a great national game and every team has their off days and evidently our boys had one the day they played Burley. We are inclined to the opinion that had the Bruins played as good a game against Burley as they did against East High they would have come away with the long end of the score. The exhibition here last Thursday indicated to the followers of the National game that we have a splendid bunch of football men and they were well versed in this great sport. The boycott at the first of the season did much perhaps to injure the morale of the 1923 football squad at the Twin Falls High School, but the players and the coach are to be congratulated in that they went ahead and played and practiced faithfully and lived down a bad name which was afterwards shown to be the result of false accusations and prejudices.

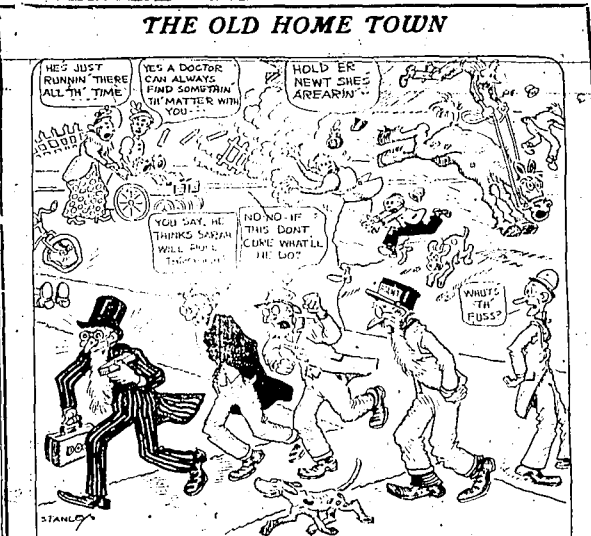
