President of Mexico Will Not Sheathe His Sword Until the Enemies of This Southern Republic Have Been Annihilated; Foreigners Protected.

(Copyright 1922, by U. S.) MEXICO CITY, Dec. 11.—President Alvaro Obregon declared today that he would never allow the enemies of Mexico to be forgiven...

"I have no fear for the future," he said. "I believe my enemies are passing more sleepless hours than they have months ago..."

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U.S. Will Participate In German Reparations

President Coolidge Announced Today That Since This Nation Was An Important Creditor, Both of Germany and the Allies That He Would Favor Financial Experts Making An Investigation On The Reparations Question; Attempt Will Be Made To Stabilize German-Currency and See Why Their Capital Has Left The Fatherland.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—The United States has accepted the invitation of the reparations commission for private American financial experts to take part in an inquiry into Germany's financial condition...

The president read a formal statement to this effect to Washington today at a session of the White House. In view of the fact that the United States is an important creditor of both Germany and the allies...

The reparations commission has decided on an appointment of two committees of experts to investigate the financial situation of Germany as follows: 1.—An inquiry into the balancing of Germany's budget and the stabilization of her currency...

The American experts would be invited to take part by direct invitation from the reparations commission, Mr. Coolidge said. This government believes that the inquiry will have great value, the statement said...

It was also pointed out, informally on behalf of the president, that the United States had claims against Germany to approximately \$750,000,000 and also because of the great allied war debt to this country...

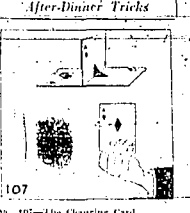
With the addition of Kieffer, who is some pin buster, the Golden Rule team will show a distinguished lineup this evening.

OIL THAT TROUBLES WATERS

(By JAMES D. WHELAN)

Just what connection there is between the agreements made between the Oregon government and the United States government with reference to oil and the present revolutionary movements in the nation south of the Rio Grande, nobody outside the great oil companies can possibly know in detail, but that there is an intimate connection nobody who has kept track of Mexican politics during the last two decades can doubt.

Just as France backed Turkey and England backed Greece in the recent struggle in Asia Minor out of account of the merits of the case so much as an account of rival oil interests, so the warring factions in Mexico primarily represent contending oil companies. Under the regime of Porfirio Diaz, the battle raged between the Water-Pierce company, otherwise and more properly known as the Standard Oil company, and the great Pearson oil concern of England. Diaz, skilled diplomat that he was long balanced these, but neither was satisfied at a fair field. Diaz finally leaned toward the Pearson interests. When the long suffering Mexicans threw off the yoke of Diaz, first one faction and then the other backed the revolutionists. Mexico was personally honest, but one of his brothers was identified with the oil field. Huerta, Carranza and Villa all flirted with various oil concerns to their own profit and ultimate undoing.

To an outsider, it looked as if Oregon were anxious to play a really patriotic role regarding oil. The uprisings, coupled with the fact that five oil men have been arrested at one place, makes this seem plausible. Anyhow, he is entitled to the benefit of the doubt. At the same time, these five men represent an important function. It is pretty certain that in order to maintain himself hereafter, he must make peace with one or the other for the sake of his finances, for there is nothing that a Mexican patriot likes better than finances except more finances.

It is unfortunate that oil plays so prominent a part in international politics, including our own.

For years the question of satisfaction of the Colombian treaty was before the senate. The democratic foreign relations committee members wanted the treaty ratified. With one exception the republican committee members opposed. The majority of the republican members of the committee held that to ratify the treaty and pay Colombia on the Panama possession dispute would cast a reflection on the administration of President Roosevelt. A singular fact in that connection was that some of the men who took that position were by no means friendly to the Rough Rider.

The exception was notable, since it was Senator Philander Knox, who as attorney general for Roosevelt, had declared an attitude in the Panama matter sound, according to international law, who later as Taft's secretary of state, had negotiated with the Republic of Panama and who knew more about the subject than any other senator, and upon whom the reflection, if any, would be cast.

Rising above partisanship, Knox, in effect, said simply, "I am certain as a lawyer, that technically we were right and that we owe Colombia nothing. But Colombia thinks honestly that we do. It is either up to us to settle this thing by negotiation or to arbitrate. But we have refused to arbitrate, and we have negotiated, so the thing to do is to ratify the treaty, and in doing so, we preserve our dignity and honor." The rest of his party refused to follow his advice.

Then rich oil fields were found. Instantly under the Harding administration there was a change of front. We promptly "dug up" under the leadership of Lodge, who during the Wilson administration, had declared proceedings involving any payment dishonorable. We paid. Our oil men got into Colombia and every body was happy. Personally, I think that Knox was right and that he should have paid as a matter of principle; but if we thought payment improper, we should have arbitrated or submitted the matter to the Hague. This and the Teapot dome transaction have too much of a Mexican odor to be appropriate for America. We have our own oil interests and factions as well as Mexico has.

ONE YEAR

In just less than a year a new president will be elected. By these days much happens in a year. Calverge says: "And in today already walks tomorrow."

Yes, Mr. Calverge, but nevertheless tomorrow is well hid. Look back at a few of the events of the last year. President Harding died. Magnus Johnson showed what a prize fire was running in the west. Japan received a horrible jolt from our friend and enemy, Nature. France went into the Ruhr and created anarchy in Germany. Mussolini revealed Italy's dangerous swollen head. The peaceable peasant government of Danubia was overthrown by Moscow.

Next November we shall go to the polls to pass upon solemn issues. But we don't yet know what they are to be. The market for grain, railroad rates, drink, Calverge's personality, the personality of the democratic nominee, the foreign situation, such are the leading elements as we see them now, but in 12 little months the whole situation may be changed by something that while entirely different is yet as unforeseeable as Harding's Bath, or Japan's catastrophe, or Mussolini's break.

BOY SCOUTS CHEER DYING LAD

"Scoutmaster on Long Island, N. Y., a small boy, three and one-half years old, with an enlarged heart and a stout chest...

"The lad is the son of Mrs. M. J. Stockdale, 12 Van Wyck avenue, Richmond Hill, continues the story. 'It is the verdict of a number of doctors that he cannot live to grow up because of an enlarged heart, and other complications which have since set in. The tragic tale became known through a letter written by Mrs. Stockdale to a New York newspaper, in which she asked that a delegation of boy scouts come to visit her boy.'"

"The letter was passed on to Chief Scout Executive James B. West, and in time reached the desk of A. H. Moore, scout executive of Queens Borough, L. I. The matter was turned over to Scoutmaster Arthur D. Oliver, Group 16, Jamaica, L. I."

"The affair was attended to in the usual boy scout way, and after Scoutmaster Oliver had made his report to the boys of the pack the scouts began to come to make life more bearable for the little lad who may not survive, except by his imagination, do a scout uniform."

"I don't know what we would have been without the boys' scout," said Mrs. Stockdale, who is the mother of two other boys besides little Robert, who is generally called "Benny." They have come again and again, and they brighten my boy's life up so much. They brought him a boy scout handbook, and every night he sleeps with it under his pillow. They came to lunch one day and I had a cake for them and everything. They are such good boys."

"One of the scouts, whose name is Michael, stops in every time he passes, and he brings the little boy a little treat—a box of candy and other things. Seven doctors have said that my little boy cannot ever grow up, but by helping these other doctors, my surgeon may fear of it and come to save his life."

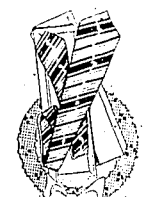

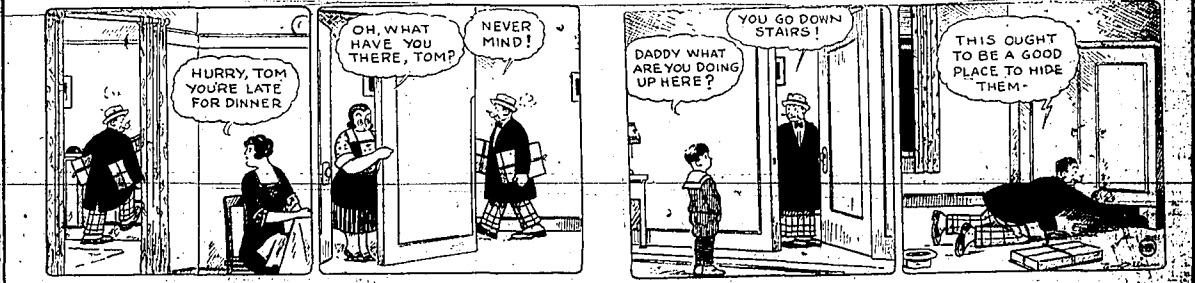

Brandes entered a plea of guilty this afternoon and his bond was fixed at \$1,000, which he expects to furnish.
