

REBELS ARE DRIVEN BACK IN MEXICO

General Jose Lagunes Has Fought Obregon and Thrown His Fortunes With the Rebels; City of Cuatla Goes to Insurgents.

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 16 (Delayed)—Driving back the rebels in the west, federal forces have turned suddenly upon them in the east.

Letting reports were that the loyal troops were driving the insurgents back upon Cuatla de Gutzberg, the rebel headquarters, and destroying bridges and railroads behind them.

General Chalca, whose candidacy for the presidency was in a candidate measure favorable to the present rebellion, has gone to join President Obregon in the Vera Cruz sector.

General Jose Lagunes, who has been operating for Obregon in the west of Mexican and Tlaxcala, has thrown his fortunes with the rebels and is preparing to join them.

The matter of expressing an opinion is nothing compared to the obligation of the backer of proof that would rest upon the critic who would venture his own opinion.

Under the conditions it would be better to allow the burden of proof upon the other side and approach the subject the other way.

"What team in the country has better than Yale, California, Michigan, Illinois or Princeton?"

Aid out with ample preparation for the comeback: "They were defeated"—it might be in point to ask:

What teams over the season were better than Notre Dame or Syracuse? Stepping around the fact that football teams are defeated only upon games won and lost, we will attempt all risks attending the cause that Notre Dame would defeat any team in the country with the possible exception of Yale and a Notre Dame team would be a feat for the football gods.

Notre Dame was not beaten by Syracuse, Notre Dame was swept by her own schedule. After-Dinner Tricks

No. 11—Smoked Paper

A large piece of this paper is placed on the palm of the hand. The hand is turned over and the paper adheres to the palm.

The trick is accomplished by tying the paper flat on the table and rubbing it with the palm a number of times. The friction generates electricity and causes the paper to adhere to the hand. If the paper is rubbed with the palm of the hand, it will keep it in place.

Another way of doing the trick is to moisten the palm very slightly at the base of the forefinger. This will cause the paper stick and will not be noticeable when the sheet is taken from the hand.

Prohibition has naturally helped to swell this big sum. More people are saving their money than ever before. They are no longer worse than wasting it for booze. The wet growth will say a large part of this Christmas fund will be spent foolishly. Perhaps so. But it will bring joy and gladness to others and no sorrow and despair. Better spend money foolishly for Christmas presents than to waste that waste it on drink.

A PREDICTION: BORAH WILL NOT SEEK PRESIDENCY

(By JAMES D. WHELAN.)

Most prognostications on political matters when made months ahead prove incorrect, and I assume that this one will be something like the average, perhaps. Anyhow, I predict that Frank Johnson isn't lusting 200 with his prediction that Senator Borah will announce an unconditional candidacy for the presidency as a progressive within three months, or five months, for that matter; for when you say a man will announce, and you not intending to the statement, it means an unconditional announcement. Moreover, Senator Borah will not be a presidential candidate on the progressive ticket for any other, and does not expect to be. He puts very much like a stalking horse for Clifford Pinchot, with whom Senator Johnson is said to have an agreement. Johnson cannot be nominated. He probably knows it. If Pinchot delivers some goods to Johnson later in the game, the latter can return the compliment to Pinchot when he cannot win himself and Pinchot will have given less offense to the Confidence men than Johnson will do and has done. Meantime, with Borah in the office, as a supposedly possible third party candidate, a very plausible argument can be made for setting aside Confidence and nominating Pinchot as a compromise to keep the third party out of the field.

Johnson says that Borah will accept their platform including the plan for government ownership of railroads. But this is an old story. Government ownership may, including the non-partisan league, assumed as much when they endorsed him for the senatorship in 1918. In this county where it was shown that he had voted against permitting the government to take over either the railroads or the telegraph and telephone lines for military needs and had voted against the Adamson bill on national labor, while Senator Borah had Congressmen Smith and McCarson had voted for the last named measure, the non-partisan league struck its endorsement of Borah off their sample ballot and he lost this county. As a presidential candidate he would find these votes of his thoroughly advertised. But they will not hurt him very much as a conjectural possibility. Borah and Confidence both oppose the bonus for the soldiers, so the senator would gain nothing there.

There are two elements among the big business forces of this country. Both in the republican party. One of these believes in granting "encouragement" in the way of privileges to big business and then attempting to regulate the big business after it gets the privilege. The other believes in giving "encouragement" of a similar kind to big business and then "passing anti-trust laws, which are not covered adequately" to prevent at root, using its advantages. The first element is called the progressive element, or the radical element, and the other is called the conservative or reactionary element, depending in both cases on who is doing the calling. In a pinch big business will support either in regard to a great measure, but the business self is divided in regard to which republican plan is the wisest. President Confidence is a conservative.

Pinchot is a progressive. Using both terms in the above sense above defined, of course. There is danger in endorsing a president who seeks poison. Arthur was beaten by Blaine and Blaine was beaten by Cleveland. Blaine sought to imburse Harrison and failed, but one the reasons for Cleveland's great victory in 1892 was the trust that ensued, though Cleveland would have won by a smaller majority in any event. Taft would have been beaten by a small margin in 1912 but the Roosevelt episode made in overwhelming, see things will make old politicians cautious and they are among best assets that Confidence has at this stage of the game.

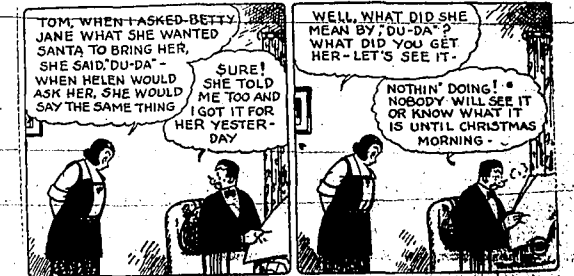

IRRIGATION PROGRAM IS OUTLINED

Gathering on January 23-24 Will Devote Large Part of Time to Considering Problem of Getting More Money Out of Farming; Noted Men Are Coming.

Work in filling out the program for the forthcoming annual meeting of the Idaho Irrigation committee on January 23-24 will be taken up Wednesday when the regular chamber of commerce will at its Tuesday night meeting have appointed a committee to confer with the regular program committee consisting of J. C. Wheeler and J. C. Porterfield of this city and R. L. Williams of Rupert. Many noted farm have agreed to be present to take part in the program, the main idea of which is to outline plans for getting more money out of the products of irrigated lands. Many of the public relations committee of the American Railway association is expected from Washington. It is hoped that the Idaho chapter of American Civil Engineers' association will meet here on the same time. Governor C. C. Moore will be present.

The tentative program consists of an address by Will H. Gibson, president of the congress; observations on eastern and southern methods, by A. V. Tallman, Boise valley water master; potato marketing, by C. J. Carlson, chairman of the potato committee of the Idaho railway reclamation board; farmers' view of marketing, by W. B. Mitchell of Parma; marketing of grapes, by President W. S. McMillen of the Idaho Fruit Growers' association; the reclamation association of the western states by R. E. Shephard; water supply studies by State Engineer W. G. Swenson; canal maintenance by Manager John Bradley of the Wood River system; canal operation by Manager J. C. Wheeler, and the woman's view on irrigation by some woman not yet selected. There will be various musical features and entertainments.

BUDGET PLEASES DIRECTORS OF BIG DISTRICT

Recommendations of Interior Department Found Satisfactory to Directors Who Want to Limit Use of Money. Great satisfaction was expressed by members of the American Falls district directors who met here to canvass election ballots over the budget of the secretary of interior as submitted to congress. If carried it will mean that money for continuing the project will be available as soon as the district has complied with conditions, which it is able to do. It is also satisfactory in that it would allow the project already made of the Idaho lands which will be made. The project of the project was, of course, anticipated, showing a small vote and election of all present directors. It is said that there has been some criticism of the levy of seven and a half cents an acre for expenses, on the ground that this would raise too much money for the project. However, the levy is a identical but an annual matter. The dispatch said: "The dispatch in the Statesman's special correspondence relating to the subject reads: 'The budget sent to congress Monday recommending the appropriation to continue work on the Idaho project, \$1,000,000 for the fiscal year, this amount being actually for the American Falls district, and \$1,000,000 for the Blue Hill project. The budget director also recommends legislation in connection with the project for the present at least, will utilize the appropriation. He asks that the following proviso be coupled up with the appropriation: 'That no part of the appropriation for the Blue Hill project shall be expended on said reservoir until companies and districts which have contracted to cooperate with the United States in construction of the project with the United States, cash or in kind, have filed their annual report, at least \$1,500,000. This means that bonds to at least \$1,500,000 must be sold before any work on the dam can proceed and this requirement is in conformity with the contract entered into last summer by which districts are to raise money with which to start work on the dam. The budget director further recommends legislation authorizing the secretary of interior in his discretion to buy whatever real property Idaho lands may be needed by the American Falls project at a price fixed by Department of Interior. This provision, if carried, will mean that the project will be more than approved price of land and will multiply effects of the project, as seeking a higher price for the Indians. Other than appropriations recommended are as follows: Enlargement of Fort Hall Indian project, \$2,000,000; expansion of Fort Hall Indian project, \$1,000,000; expansion of Boise assay office, \$400,000; expansion of Fort Hall Indian, \$1,000,000; Yellowstone National Park, \$1,000,000; administration, \$275,000. Terms Are Allocated. J. K. Wiley and J. H. Harper were selected as one year members by the directors at the meeting. The directors are: A. F. McMillen, W. F. Alworth and W. H. Spencer for three years; J. K. Wiley and J. H. Harper for one year; N. V. Sharp retiring 11 of the 200 cent district for director; William Thomas Blackburn, A. D. Brooks, L. C. Dunn and Ben Hinson can only be directors for one year. The directors will organize this evening.
