WORLD PROSPERITY RETURNING

The world is getting over its reaction after the financial drain, which followed that great war. In this instance, as in other occasions, the depression was world-wide and sprang from causes that were greater than any local tariff or money system. The usual cycle has consisted of a period of flush times then a boom period during which wild speculation prevailed, then a crash followed by a dull period and slow recovery. The period of recovery is now here. The following story by Henry Wood, United Press staff correspondent, at Geneva, released today, shows that all nations save Germany are recuperating:

The world is steadily fighting its way back to normal conditions in the matter of unemployment, according to the year-end statistics just gathered by the international labor bureau.

The turning point in this most serious economic situation which the war entailed and which came only during the middle of the present year, is still continuing.

For the moment, Belgium holds the world's record for having come the nearest to getting back to a normal basis. The latest figures there place the total unemployed at 4,500, or only 0.7 per cent of the number of workers covered.

France is next best, being placed by the international bureau in the same category as Belgium, namely, where the question of unemployment now is virtually negligible. France is now paying unemployment subsidies to less than 1200 workers.

England still continues to be the worst off, with her unemployment constantly remaining above a million and a quarter.

In Denmark, Norway and Sweden unemployment has steadily decreased during the past six months of the year until it only remains at from 7 to 8 per cent of the total working population.

In Austria, the decrease in unemployment has been largely due to greatly improved conditions in the building, wood and metal industries at Vienna.

In Poland the situation has remained about stationary, unemployment decreasing in several lines but the improvement being offset by increases in other lines.

Italy, under the Mussolini regime, shows a steady improvement, the total number of unemployed having decreased to about 135,000. Short-time working has also decreased.

Holland and Switzerland along with England show slight increases in unemployment.

Germany is the only country where the increase has been really serious. Unemployment there, among the 5,000,000 union workmen has increased from 3.5 per cent in July to about 7 per cent for the end of the year. The short-time employment has also increased during the same period from 11 to over 20 per cent. The principal industries affected are metal, clothing, building and transportation.

In Canada, the situation has remained about unchanged, while the principal change in the United States has been a slackening in the industrial lines.

As a whole, however, the experts at the International Labor bureau consider that, with the exception of Germany, most of the increase in unemployment is purely the result of seasonal changes, while the world-wide situation as a whole shows a slow but steady improvement.
