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DIXMUDE SIGHTED BY ARABS OVER SAHARA IS LATEST REPORT

Captain's Body of French Airship Found Floating in Sea; Air Fleet Sent Out With Hope That Some of Crew Still Survive; Sighted Wednesday by Arabs in Report; Tribesmen Race Ponies to Carry Report to French Outpost.

TUNIS, Dec. 28.—Out of the heart of the Sahara, word came to the French wireless station at Bizerte last night that the missing dirigible Dixmude had been seen by Ghouff Arabs, drifting southward towards the Hoggar mountain fastnesses.

Receiving their tough little desert ponies 150 miles over the sands to Inouan, the tribesmen informed the French outpost there of seeing "the big bird that flies without wings" high in the morning sky last Wednesday.

Hope that had died was revived again. Possibility that the French hopes and men who sailed on the Dixmude more than ten days ago might yet be alive stirred officials here and at Algerian military posts to instant action.

Relief expeditions were ordered to push in from the desert outposts while the air squadron which for days have combed the territory over which the Dixmude was flying when last seen by white men were ordered to prepare for dangerous reconnaissance flights into the Sahara.

The district towards which the missing Dixmude was flying was one of the most impenetrable of the Sahara wastes. Moreover, it is considered, presenting few possibilities for a safe landing for a dirigible of the size of the Dixmude.

The expedition's report which of late has agreed seemed credible said that at 8 a. m. December 26 the dirigible was located south and west about 125 miles from Inouan.

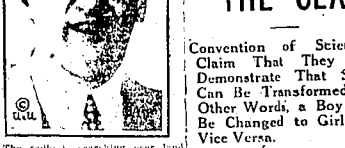
