## STORM GRIPS WEST AND IS MOVING EAST

### Wyoming Stock Men Fear Heavy Loss As Sleet and Snow Sweep Over the Plains; Much Damage is Done by Sleet and Rain in Eastern Sections; Fire Follows Storm in Places.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.—A low temperature in the west as low as 24 below zero, the predicted cold wave was today sweeping eastward where it will arrive with the New Year, according to weather bureau forecasts. By Tuesday night the whole country will be shivering. Snow and sleet will be general.

Horn warnings have been ordered all along the coast from the Gulf of California to the Gulf of Mexico. The cold wave will be a white New Year's day, with heavy snow coming down out of the mountains of the West.

NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—Cold rain will be the weather in the north, which will turn into snow and sleet during the day, assured skippers, pavements for New Year's revelers being tough.

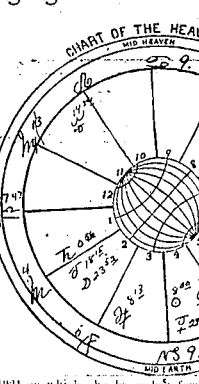

# NAVY HOPES TO UPHOLD FOOTBALL PRESTIGE OF EAST IN COMING BATTLE WITH WASHINGTON

PASADENA, Cal., Dec. 31.—Head Football Strategist Enoch Bagshaw and 30 young huskies from Seattle arrived here today for preliminary courtships with the Annapolis eleven which reached Pasadena yesterday afternoon.

After an easy practice yesterday, the midshipmen plan a lull today as the windup for a season of strenuous work which ends tomorrow in the East-West Tournament of Rouses contest. Hundreds of fans who impinged the easterners were surprised by their speedy heavy line and tight backfield. It isn't one of those heavy driving, plugging, locomotive backfields; rather, they appear to rely upon tricky plays, swift action.

Washington was greeted upon arrival by enthusiastic alumni and tournament officials. Bagshaw has just about time to give his men a couple of square meals and whisper a few words of final advice to Captain Ed Kuhn before the whistle blows Tuesday. Kuhn, who was recently elected Washington leader for 1924, will be the first captain of the year to lead his team on the field.

The big event starts at 2:15 p. m. tomorrow upon the turf field, which today is in excellent condition.

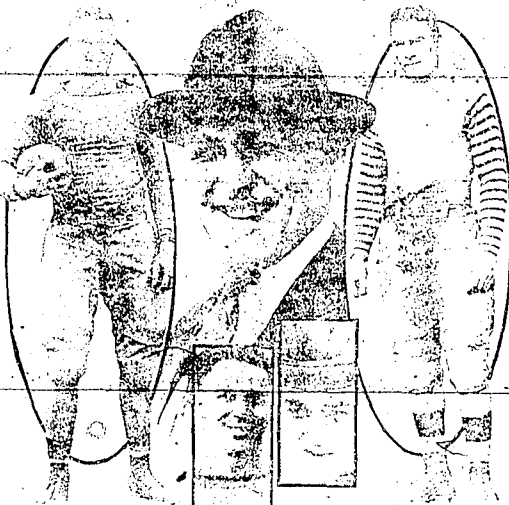

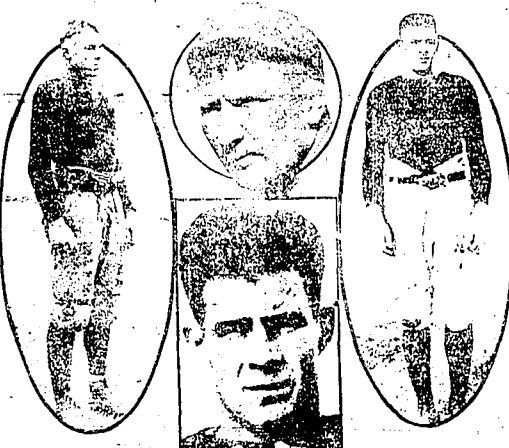

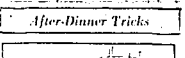
