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Peddy Fought Klan and Texas Senator

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—George F. Peddy, 25-year old Houston attorney, was a teacher of the "Young Men's Sunday school" and assistant county attorney of Harris county before he took on the battle against the Ku Klux Klan. Peddy first jumped into the fight to maintain the Klan in Texas. He made a speech denouncing Slayfield and became director of the campaign of James Cropper against L. C. Brown, who was running for the senate nomination against Slayfield. The Slayfield contest started when the first Democratic primary was held in Texas in July, 1922. There were six candidates—Slayfield, Ferguson, the then Senator Cutlerman, Sterling F. Brown, Robert L. Henry and John F. Thomas.

Slayfield and Ferguson were high men so they competed against each other, with the rest eliminated, to a run-off primary held in August.

Slayfield received a majority of 58,000. In the campaign previous to these to maintain Slayfield's position with the Klan was frequently mentioned but Slayfield at first took no special notice. However, on February 1, 1923, (on April 1), the first of a series of questionnaires were sent to all the candidates demanding to know where they stood regarding the Klan. Before the questionnaires were made public a statement was issued by Slayfield that he was a Klansman and that he had the permission of the order to disclose himself.

Perhaps and Thomas answered the questionnaire, stating that they were not members of the Klan and in various degrees were not in sympathy with its principles.

Of all the candidates, Slayfield was the only one who did not answer the question. He said he did not consider Klan membership a proper issue in a race, but the questionnaires and the way they stood on the question.

Slayfield did not give his position until he took the witness stand in an examination of witnesses, when he was asked his opinion.

There is something very convincing about the letter sent by E. B. BOSSSES WILL NOT WIN




