## POLICEMAN LEADS DOUBLE LIFE; TWO WIVES TO CHILDREN

Wife 2: Mrs. Dennis, \$100 a Month; and the Poor Officer, Which Is Much Too Much to Spare.

CHICAGO, Jan. 22.—The amateur tale of how a policeman lived two lives and had two wives and two children, was told yesterday by Patrolman John W. Clark, age 22.

John W. Clark contracted his second marriage "on the sly" while drawing a salary of \$40 a month. His present salary is \$100. The disclosed secret of his double life is that he is the brother of Arthur Clark, who is, on a matter of money, Mrs. Clark No. 2 demanded \$100 a month, and she got it.

John W. Clark No. 1, his wife, Mrs. Clark No. 2, is part of his salary, who complained of Curtis Clark's conduct to his superior, Captain Clark.

Clark made a complete confession to Macmillan. He was suspended from the force and ordered to appear before the Board of Ethics. Mrs. Clark No. 1, had known of her husband's dual life for the past four months. She maintained, all along, that she had been compelled to throw out of work and jailed.

There are five women prisoners in the prison, ranging from Lydia Southard, Twin Falls husband poisoner, who was received two days ago at the age of 20, to Alice Wilson, forger and drug addict, received from Idaho a month ago at the age of about 40. There have been several visits of closely visits with two or three or four men who came to the prison in a high-powered car, entered the ward wearing masks and speaking only in whispers, yet outraging all the inmates.

Members of the board, Governor C. C. Moore, Attorney General A. H. Connor, and Secretary of State C. C. Ladd, were present at the investigation.

The similarities between the women were phenomenal and differ in almost every particular and they were unable to identify the visitors, who had claimed to be their relatives.





There ought to be a big crowd at the Lyceum meeting tonight where a fine quartette will present the last musical number on the program. The course has been a success. The last number, the lecture of Dr. Albert Bushnell Hart, February 8, will be a fitting close.

The musical feature of the irrigation congress, which convenes here tomorrow afternoon, made the pleasing save that renders more palatable the solid quality of the program. The numbers before the congress have largely to do with marketing, and such are especially important.

There is something hopeful about the manner in which Dr. J. Koehn talks about the settlement of the differences between the best sugar factories and beet breeders. He says that the committee selected at the December meeting of growers on which he was appointed, hopes to come to an amicable understanding with the companies to their mutual benefit. More of that spirit is to be encouraged.

Whether the suggestion of Attorney Turner K. Neumann that the interstate commerce commission has no power under the constitution to provide for a long bid short hand system which discriminates against some states to the benefit of others, the fact remains that such practice is an injustice to the states and constitutes against which discrimination is practiced, and should be discontinued. The railroad systems should be operated so as to build up communities in a normal way. It can easily be done, under the present system another should take its place.

## WASTE IN IRRIGATION

(OY NEWTON-JOHNS)

There is a tragedy of waste as a result of the common practice of irrigation. A survey, however, determines the annual average expense of drainage on all the great projects is more than a dollar an acre for the whole reclaimed area. And this expense is a general item in the maintenance budget.

An important factor associated with the cost of drainage is the waste of valuable virgin soil elements of fertility in the drainage water. Climatic aridity has preserved minerals necessary to plant growth in all desert soils which are readily released by artificial moisture. These mineral crystals are soluble to a degree that make the plant food available for a hundred crops—desirable cultural conditions and practicable conservation methods.

In the adverse alternative a degree of saturation may result from excessive use of irrigation water, but will waste this just stored plant food in a single crop season.

It is a fact of scientific determination that the correct degree of soil saturation to promote the maximum plant growth is required when the capillary action of the soil is filled with water, but always to be filled short of the degree that results in drainage waste. If the soil is filled to an overflowing stage the capillary system will be destroyed, and plants cannot be supplied with the required nourishment. A surface or subsurface discharge of irrigation water soon converts the first few inches to a barren clay. The overburden, phosphates and humus carried out of the soil by over-saturation and drainage are precipitated by chemical action, and one result is cementation which totally obstructs drainage and makes seepage areas and alkali swamps. Therefore no system of drainage is a permanent relief. As long as waste water flows from cultivated fields there will be encroaching swamps and seepage, and every swamp induces a barren field within the same drainage system. In some striking instances individual farmers have swamped one-half the farm and made the other half bare by the excessive application of irrigation water. As long as drainage requirement exists, there must result a waste of fertility. Wasting water is an economic paradox.

The water demand and plant food requirement of crops are matters of common knowledge and methods of accurate application are quite practicable. It is more than hope that both drainage costs and fertility waste may yield to early development of cultural science. It is logical that infinite skill combined with infinite expense can accomplish whatever is scientifically possible. The cost of drainage and the value of waste fertility, considered as a world aggregate brings visions of economic calamity. The history of irrigation farming chronicles the rise and fall of civilization. The modern method of waste of water, fertility and drainage expense, in the light of history, are suggestive of disaster.

Modern science has given us many agencies of conservation which are not practicable from the individual point of view. A more intimate supervision of federal irrigation projects is coming to be a general demand. One of the major demands is regulation of the water supply to exact requirements of crops. There is an logical objection to this restriction except the explosive increase of labor to insure accurate distribution of the limited water apportionment. The cost of infinitely correct distribution would be but a fraction of the cost of the present ineffectual drainage program. With accurate distributions to meet crop requirements the drainage demand would cease, crop yields would increase and fertility could practically be perpetuated.
