The incident of those connected with the federal loan in this city tomorrow, ought to bring good results. The law originally enacted in the Wilson administration, was held up in the courts, but now finally declared unconstitutional, and recently been extended.

Almon, and the subsequent arrest of Church on a charge of adultery, serves to recall the bitter campaign of 1922 in this county, where his victory over Judge Reddick in the republican primaries, and his subsequent election, were heralded as great triumphs for the clan, throughout the state of Idaho and the nation.

BORAH AND M'ADOO

The Idaho presidential band, which exploded under it when Ed. Doherty, the California oil king and democratic leader, testified that McCulloch was in the employ of his company at an annual salary of \$20,000 and had been so employed for five years, is having paid McCulloch \$250,000.

Through the feelings of Senator Walsh of Montana, who was overjoyed at the opportunity to besmirch prominent republicans, when he heard Doherty gibber the vile obnoxious McCulloch. Walsh was getting great comfort out of the investigation while Fall and the republican clerics were being brought to account and was making desperate effort to keep himself and Secretary Hughes out of the oil scandal. It was cruel that the Montana senator should receive such a shock at the hands of a republican leader. Idaho Free Press.

In view of the record of its leader, who is also the public enemy of the republican party in Idaho, namely, William Edgar Borah, the Free Press might at least wait until McCulloch makes his statement in regard to a charge which neither he, nor any other, has culpability before mentioning him in the same sentence with Fall, who is charged with serious offenses while in office which were violations of law.

It is true that his leader, the postal carrier senator, may believe Fall wholly innocent, for while the essential facts in the Teapot dome scandal were shown up in the senate nine months ago by Kendrick and La Follette it took three weeks since Borah quoted Fall's statement in regard to himself, where the latter had misrepresented the interests, thereby by implication testifying to his reliability.

McCulloch wants to make a statement regarding charges which are true, is no crime. Fall declines to make a statement regarding a charge which if true is a crime. Can the Free Press go on differently?

Is it an attorney to represent a trust when he is in office and is a capacity which does not call for his violation? If so, how about Senator Borah, leader of the Idaho republicans and the Idaho Free Press?

Just before his election Borah was attorney for the lumber trust. He was prosecuted for alleged violation of the criminal law while acting in that capacity. He was acquitted. Doubtless the jury which heard the case brought in the proper verdict. But the fact of his occupation as attorney is not only undoubted but it is a matter of court record. Yet he is the head of his party.

If this last statement should be denied to any republican, ask him, if Borah, former lumber trust attorney, will not be unapologetically humiliated. Ask him, further, if it is not a fact that when the American Legion protested because of acts of questionable patriotism against the election of John W. Hart as national committeeman in 1920, Borah did not insist on the election of Hart, who is his political antagonist, to the place, and if the party convention did not bow to the demand in spite of the Legion? As Hart is the political representative of Borah and an officer in the United Idaho Sugar company, the whole attitude of Borah may well be compared with the worst manifested against McCulloch, in favor of the latter.

It is notorious that good defenders when elected make good prosecuting attorneys, and when they get out of office a great many alleged offenders hire them when arrested. When a man leaves office, he is free to make his living in any honorable way it was no reflection on the city attorney and city clerk of this city who at the expiration of their terms elected the service of the Warren Construction company.

If McCulloch is guilty of wrong he should be continued and prosecuted if not, why compare him to Fall and not to Borah?

Moreover, if Senator Borah wanted an Idaho delegation to the national republican convention this year, or any other of the last three presidential years instructed for him for nomination for president, he would get it and would get support of the Free Press. If the fact that Borah, served a trust as attorney would not bar him from the presidency, why should it bar McCulloch?

The trial was over.

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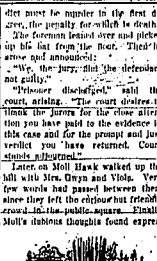
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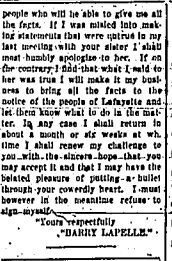
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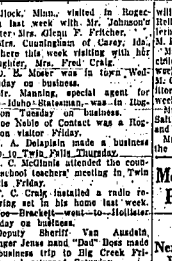
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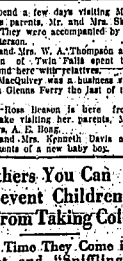
