## DAIRYING CONTINUES TO HOLD ITS OWN

A Nampa banker has given out some financial data in further proof of the value of the dairy industry in the Boise valley and the necessity for its greater development and the attracting to this section, those who understand the dairy business and are prepared to push it to a further success. Probably no section in the country is better favored or has greater opportunity for building up this particular industry than the Boise valley and south-central Idaho.

This banker states that among the depositors transacting business with his bank, there are fully seven hundred of them engaged in the dairy industry either in a large or a small way; the majority of them, however, making it a strong corrective with their agricultural operations. He further declares that these depositors are not borrowers at the bank but, generally speaking, maintain a substantial balance to their credit. Probably no better evidence could be desired than this to prove the substantiality of the dairy industry.

In the opinion of this banker, and we quite agree with him, "the dairy industry points the way to the wonderful era of progress and prosperity for which nature has equipped the Boise valley." Not only does this banker believe what he says, but he is using his individual efforts to induce more farmers to go into the dairy industry in connection with their agricultural activities.

The Boise valley has been heralded as the "land of the full milk bell." The banker, the business man, the professional man, and in fact, persons engaged in all forms of occupation can well afford to get solidly behind a program for an enlarged dairy industry in the Boise valley. And nothing should be left undone to encourage and to give assistance to the farmer who desires to add a dairy herd to his farming of the equipment, that he may be better prepared to make a success of the agricultural industry. Our aim should be to retain on the farms those who are now there and to bring others here so that the dairy industry will be carried along on a much larger scale. Capital
