Twin Falls is pleased to find Twin working actively for the securing of the democratic convention here. This is not a partisan matter, since every city deserves a big convention. Whether Hansen had or had not any funds such as usually develop and are perpetuated in little villages that do nothing but settle, is unknown, but if it had these are forgotten in the work of building up the community. The institute which is now in session up there, is the second event of agricultural importance which has taken place within the past few months. Activity in building problems co-operation and understanding between men and women, and when they go to know each other and understand one another a viewpoints pretty profound and jealousies based on misapprehensions die out. The Devil proviso can find lots of work for idle hands and he does not neglect idle tongues and idle minds. Hansen is applying one of the adjuncts of practical Christianity, when it goes together to do something for the general good of the village and its vicinity.

ONLY ONE ALTERNATIVE

A week hence the election on the extra school levy will be over. There should be a large and unanimous vote for the levy. Whether wise or otherwise, the change which took place last year from the old four and two system, with the union of superintendency and principalship of the high school and the retention of a superintendent of the junior high and the supervisiorship; and the new system of this year which retains the three and three system, but abolishes the supervisiorship and the supervisiorship of the junior high and creates a new principalship while retaining radical alterations, do not vitally affect the total cost of the system, or in the slightest degree obviate the necessity for the raising of enough taxes to defray the reasonable expenses of conducting the schools. Compared with the cost of other systems, the expense of the Twin Falls schools has been reasonable for several years past, and it was because fair taxation have been paid and a fair amount of money expended on necessities that the schools have attained the high reputation throughout the state which the new supervisiorship says that they justly enjoy. Every dollar asked for the schools will be needed for their proper conduct and no friend of public institutions of the district will deny the truth of this statement. No intelligent man believes that the school can be maintained at any reasonable degree of efficiency on eight mills, the school board believes that it needs the amount that it has asked and has so stated unanimously. There is an alternative. Either you are for the levy requested, or you are for the trying to run the schools on eight mills. Anything which would leave a discontent impression is the result of a combination of stupidity and dishonesty.
