## Coolidge Telegrams to Edward McLean Shed More Light on Mystery

### STARTLING NEW EVIDENCE FOUND

**Two Messages Are Made Public Following Further Inquiry**

**WASHINGTON, D. C., March 6.—(UPI)—** Telegrams addressed to Edward B. McLean, publisher of the Washington Post, were received yesterday morning at the post office, revealing the committee's developments in the day.

The telegrams, were sent from Washington to Palm Beach, where McLean was there with family members of the interior. All are from their read:

"January 22—

"Dear Mr. McLean, Palm Beach, Fla.

"President is away. 'Admiral' stamp with whom I shall confer."

The significance of the Coolidge telegrams to McLean and his identity of the "President" mentioned in them was apparent at the time the message was read.

A second telegram from Mr. Coolidge was also received yesterday.

"January 22—

"Thank you for your message.

You have always been most considerate in your messages. Please convey my kindest regards to you and Mrs. McLean."

"Yours, Coolidge."

C. Everett Stump, secretary to the president, was in Florida at that time. He had already learned that McLean was staying with him in Palm Beach.

The telegram from the president to McLean alluded to the "admiral" mentioned in the messages which had just preceded reading of the Coolidge message. That same included reading of telegram which was sent to McLean by Senator Edward McLean, doorkeeper at the White House Office to C. E. Stump, "the president is away." That was the first public notice of McLean's departure for Florida, yet the McLean letter left.

John W. Durst, Negro, New York, lawyer and prominent figure in the war-time administration, was in communication with McLean at the time he left and sent a telegram regarding.

Those disputes which nations can arbitrate should be arbitrated. Those which either one or both parties should refuse to arbitrate should be settled before an impartial world court, such as that now existing in Europe. More than the two parties who fight like anchors are involved in a contest of nations, the prosperity of the whole world is at stake. Unfortunately, the world has not learned the wisdom of the lesson which is understood and carried into effect by the people of Murtaugh.

## WHY WALL STREET OPPOSES HIM

"It is not surprising that Wall street, which fears William Gibbs McAdoo, is attacking him with every weapon at its command. The Wall Street Journal, organ of the big interests is leading the fray, and other panderers of the money trusts are joining in," says David Ladd Rockwell.

Edward S. Martin, in Collier's, the national weekly, of March 1, anticipated the absurdly attempt of Wall street, when he prophesied:

"Wall street is apt to call him (McAdoo) a crook, which is not true. He is no crook. He may not play the game of Wall street according to Wall street rules, but that would not hurt him in the eyes of the democratic voters. He has enormous energy, vast powers of work, and glibly does every job he can reach—McAdoo is still the leading candidate of the democracy."

Wall street does not like McAdoo because it knows that it can expect no special privileges from him. The people have the choice of Mr. McAdoo or Mr. Wall Street, and there is no doubt as to their decision.
