## E. B. McLEAN DENIES USING DOME LEASES

**Washington.** Publisher in Lengthy Statement Makes Warm Denial of Charges; Declares He Has Never Known E. L. Doheny.

**Washington.** March 12.—Edward N. McLean, publisher of the Washington Star, denied before the Senate all accusations today that he had loaned Alford Patti any money or that he was in any way connected with him in connection with his investigation. In a lengthy statement to investigators McLean declared:

"That he never knew Harry F. Doheny, and that he has never even speculated in any of the Sinclair company stock."

"That he does not know E. L. Doheny, nor has he ever been in business with him."

"That he has never spoken to Doheny only as personal friends and never had any official dealings with them."

"That he speculated in Phillips Oil stock in 1922 as an entirely personal matter and that he handled none of the business of the company."

"That he has never spoken to Doheny since November, 1922, when he bought 2,000 shares of Phillips Oil stock and sold it in February, 1923."

"That he has never spoken to Doheny since November, 1922, when he bought 2,000 shares of Bethlehem Steel and sold it in the December of a year ago."

"That this was entirely mine," he said. "I have never been interested in the purchase of any Sinclair or Doheny stocks, and I have never been interested in any stocks which I believe may have been purchased by me which I have never made any such purchases nor have I had any interest in any stocks which I have made by any one at any time."

McLean said he told his first story about lending \$10,000 to Patti before he had seen a printed version of it.

McLean declared no many individuals which pass between him and his office, and he said he had no connection with the investigation.

New York Menaced.

by Storms; Strong Gale in Evidence.

NEW YORK, March 12.—New York went through its most violent storm in history, brought by a strong gale which was held in the grip of one of the most disastrous series of tornados that have ever occurred in the city and vicinity from accidents attributed to the storm, many wires were broken, and the telephone and general gain all along the Atlantic seaboard, which caused shipping trouble and some rail delays.

Ship owners and sailors, however, followed through heavy seas, some held more than half an hour by the gales. Radio communications were hampered, and many ships were driven hither and thither out of communication.

**WASHINGTON.** March 12.—The fight between Attorney General Daugherty and the Senate investigating committee over the laws of California in 1923 is the subject on which the committee's attention at first will be focused. ## BODIES REMOVED FROM UTAH MINE

One-Hundred Twenty-Six on Victims Taken Out by Rescuers.

CASTLE GATE, Utah, March 12.—Rescuers have removed 126 bodies of 127 bodies from the mine of the Utah Fuel company, having for four months been unable to reach the bottom of the hole, which exploded last Saturday and became abandoned.

Rescuers are working in the hole and have learned details of the mine, where no danger is inherent in the water of the force, from five to ten feet per minute, and the water is not so bad as to prevent the miners from getting out.

Work of removing the bodies is progressing, though rapidly, and the miners expect to have the hole cleared by Saturday morning.

Bomb Explodes and Injures Thirty in Greek Coffee House

DUBLIN, March 12.—A dynamite bomb was exploded at the entrance of a coffee house in Dublin yesterday, injuring thirty persons and wrecking the building. Cut from flying debris a woman was severely injured.

Chinese Cabinet to Grant Recognition to Russian Regime

PEKING, March 12.—The cabinet, in special session today agreed to grant recognition to the Chinese delegation of Russia, providing M. Karakhan, head of the Russian delegation here, accepts the Chinese proposal of establishing diplomatic relations between the two nations.

It is understood the agreement will be signed jointly as soon as Karakhan accepts the Chinese text of the proposal.

The treaty provides that Russia shall evacuate and renounce her extraterritorial rights, recognize sovereignty in Mongolia, etc.

Many bodies have already been brought to the surface and still the rescue work continues. This terrible explosion took the gates of the mine from their hinges and great water pipes were torn out like straws. Even the insulation on the electric wires was blown off, so terrific was the force of the explosion.

Southern Idaho will be honored if the democrats from this section of the state unite on the proper man and elect him as their representative on the national democratic committee. Twin Falls entered the race for this signal honor last Saturday when they nominated Asher D. Wilson for this post. Since the national committee has come from the northern part of the state for the past several years, it is only a fair geographical distribution of the spoils to have those representatives come from the west of the state for the next few years.

Maybe the man whom Rev. E. L. White sent on the train was telling the truth in regard to the lack of value of the oil represented by Teapot Dome, and then maybe he wasn't. But whether he was or was not, makes not the slightest bit of difference in regard to the morality of the transactions. Dolley said he expected to make \$250,000,000 out of the deal. He bought Paul for \$100,000. He helped corrupt the public service. Suppose that he was foolish. His intentions were no better. His effect on official life was just as bad.

## THE JOINT TRACKAGE RAILROAD AGREEMENT

It is noted with a sense of satisfaction that the agreement reached between the Southern Pacific and the Western Pacific railroads to jointly use lines between Wells, Nev., and Sacramento, Calif., will have no effect on the construction of the Rogerson-Wells line which the Union Pacific is preparing to build south out of the Twin Falls country. It is very probable that when the Rogerson-Wells line is completed the Union Pacific will jointly use the Western Pacific.

The agreement was made between the Western and the Southern Pacific it is announced in the public interest, to expedite transcontinental traffic and in no wise lessens competition between the two roads. The trackage involved is some 183 miles in length and the Western Pacific, under the agreement which is for a period of fifty years, is charged with the responsibility of placing its lines in the best possible position to handle the joint traffic. Joint handling of the Pacific Fruit Express rolling stock is provided in the agreement.

By building from Rogerson to Wells the Union Pacific makes a connection to the south through the Oregon Short Line with the

Western Pacific thus providing an outlet for Idaho produce both east and west. However, the western outlet is not as important as the western for by it Idaho produce is taken directly into California where valuable markets are being built up to handle the food stuffs grown in this state. It is in reality a direct Pacific coast hideaway outlet at San Francisco for south Idaho and for that reason is of immense importance.

Any move made to block such an outlet for Idaho produce would be a serious handicap to south Idaho and it is well that assurances are given such is not the case. If it were, the inter-state commerce commission would no doubt not permit such dry-elimination to exist. But as it is not, according to the assurances made Idaho can feel more comfortable.

Southern Idaho is rapidly becoming the breadbasket of the intermountain country but we must have an outlet for our produce on fair and just rates and as the Pacific coast territory is rapidly increasing in population that seems to be the logical section into which the bulk of the produce we raise should go. And if that condition can be brought about thus saving the long and expensive hauls into eastern markets, the prosperity of this state is bound to increase.
