Attention, Beet Growers!

Now is the time to get busy on the land. Fall plowed land or potato ground should be gone over and seed bed prepared by spring-tooth harrow, or disc, then floated so that low places in field where dry ground has been dragged will have a chance to get soaked up with any moisture we may get, thus insuring an even germination of seed, also to start weeds, then worked again before planting to destroy weeds. Experience has proved that beets planted the latter part of March or early in April have made the best tonnage.

Drills should be examined to see that each shoe is depositing seed same depth. Each time a turn is made in field see that shoes are not clogged up. Do not plant more than one and one-half inches deep. A good seed-bed well packed and seed evenly deposited at the proper depth will go far to insure a satisfactory crop. All spring plowed land should be worked down, corrugated and irrigated before planting.

Clover and alfalfa ground should be crowned as shallow as possible, to cut off crowns properly, then harrow and leave long enough to go, crown dried up, then plow about seven inches deep, irrigate and plant us above.

This work should be done so beets can be planted by the 20th of April, and if possible by April first. Do not plant on smooth surface. Always harrow ahead of planter.

Far-fetched efforts are being made to in some way blame Senator Walsh and other democratic and progressive members of the upper house on the ground that in 1920 they voted for a measure which is asserted, would enable the secretary of the navy to transfer oil deposits. Senator Walsh denies that the law was amended as claimed in the manner asserted, and the critics admit that this is true, but say that it substantially resulted in the same thing. The matter is wholly immaterial. That under certain conditions it might be well to allow the secretary of the navy to make a transfer without red tape is not only possible but probable. The secretary of the navy is in touch with naval officers, who know the probable needs of the department. What happened was this: the navy department, with the request of the administration transferred the great oil reserves in the interior department away from the advice of those who were interested in keeping great deposits in the hands of the government, and where the right of recommendation could no longer be conveniently exercised, and after the transfer the department of interior secretly sold to the grafters.

Technically, the railroad committee has not complied with the conditions laid down in the telegram pleading building of the railroad by the Union Pacific holds, so that suit could not be brought to compel performance at this point, it is suggested by members of the committee, in discussing this question from that angle. President Gray pushed the building of the road, provided that the right of way, should be secured, and this has not been done. The road officials still profess willingness to build the road when this condition has been complied with, it is stated. However, the road officials undoubtedly knew just as well when they telephoned here March 1 as do we now, that the local committee here would not be able to furnish the right of way tomorrow. They know this, even if it were true that the message was misunderstood. That they are not liable technically, may excuse them, legally from responsibility, but if there has not been jockeying of some sort on their part, the situation is very importantly understood by the public.
