ANOTHER TEST IS SCHEDULED

Vote Will Determine the Relative Strength of Principles

WASHINGTON, March 21.—Another test will provide another test between William Johnson and Robert M. La Follette, to determine whether the two leaders of the radical forces of the Northwest. REHEARING ASKED BY POWER USERS

Petition Is Filed With Public Utilities Commission.

INDIANAPOLIS, March 21.—The Indianapolis Public Utilities Commission filed a petition for rehearing Thursday with the public utilities commission in the federal court here, asking that the case which the commission closed by placing a new rate schedule in effect March 1, 1923, be reopened. The order of February 29 ordered the new schedule into effect, and means California's worst drought in many years.

WHAT HAS TWIN FALLS TO OFFER?

There has been a great deal of talk and propaganda about what new factories would do for the city of Twin Falls, and generally speaking, we have agreed that a few new industries are absolutely necessary for the future growth and development of this wonderful section of Idaho. But, after all, the last vestige has been shaken from the prospective tie by the Idaho Power company with their new rate of rates. If a factory promoter or a manufacturer of means had his eye on Twin Falls with a view to establishing a great manufacturing plant here he certainly would turn his back on such a proposition now.

About the only-independent people of southern Idaho have had to offer a factory is cheap power and now that has slipped from our fingers and we find ourselves facing a dilemma which is worse than losing the prospects of a railroad to the south.

We are not generally inclined to be pessimistic about the future but unless we have something like a low power rate we cannot see how we can hope to draw any great manufacturing industries to this section. If we fail to do this aren't we lost in the great onward march of progress as far as commercial and individual development is concerned. The Snake river has more power, we believe; per foot of its length than any other similar stream and should afford the state of Idaho an opportunity to offer power at almost nothing. "But what has happened while we were sleeping another has slipped in and cornered our power resources and we are helpless." It matters not whether we have the strength of giants; we are short of our power because豪mons have slipped out long ago and we stand like Sampson of old, helpless in the presence of our adversary.

The future welfare of this section is dependent on the possibility of getting new industry into this section and on finding a better market for our products. The railroads claim that they cannot handle our freight to and from Twin Falls for a lesser price and unless something of this kind is accomplished the future of this tract is not as bright as it should be. If any one part of a commonwealth draws more from that particular section then is their just due then the other departments of said commonwealth suffer accordingly. While we are not expert on power rates and valuations we believe that the Idaho Power was getting along about as well as the average farmer or business man in Southern Idaho before this rate was granted and we are of the opinion that this new rate is somewhat prohibitive and will tend to retard the progress of this section of Idaho.

We have believed in miniput power and light plants. We think that if any such plan could be evolved which would give this section lower power rates for manufacturing industries, it should be brought about as early as possible. We are more anxious about the future growth and development of this section than we are about tickling the palate of any particular industry and to this end we have submitted for the consideration of our readers these few thoughts outlined above. We have no desire to tear down or to destroy any corporate power in Idaho or elsewhere; we do believe in fair play and equal rights to all.

WHERE EVERY KNOCK WAS A BOOST

The victory for McAdoo in Georgia and North Dakota indicates that Judge Bothwell fisted up the situation correctly on his return from Washington, when he said McAdoo had gained, rather than lost by the attacks on him, as nobody who understood the situation censured him and the attacks made his friends rally more strongly to him. The fact is that they were something very absurd about the criticisms of McAdoo. Almost uniformly his critics said that he had done nothing wrong, that his testimony was open and frank. He sold his services as an attorney, along with the services of the firm of which he was a member, on contingent fee of one million dollars to endeavor to secure an agreement with Mexico, along the lines which the Wilson, Harding and Coolidge administrations sought.



Attention, Beet Growers!

Now is the time to get busy on the land. Fall plowed land or potato ground should be gone over and seed bed prepared by spring-tooth harrow, or disk, then hoed so that low places in field where dry ground has been dragged will have a chance to soak up any moisture we may get, thus insuring an even germination of seed, also to start weeds, then worked again before planting to destroy weeds. Experience has proved that beets planted the latter part of March or early in April have made the best tonnage.

Drills should be examined to see that each shoe is depositing seed same depth. Each time a turn is made in field set that shoes are not clogged up. Do not plant more than one and one-half inches deep. A good seed bed will pack and seed evenly deposited at the proper depth will go far to insure a satisfactory crop. All spring plowed land should be worked down, corrigated and irrigated before planting.

Clover and alfalfa ground should be crowned as shallow as possible to cut off crowns properly, then harrow and leave long enough to get crown dried up, then plow about seven inches deep, irrigate and plant as above.

This work should be done so beets can be planted by the 20th of April, and if possible by April first. Do not plant on smooth surface. Always harrow ahead of planter.
