VITAL CAREY ACT SUIT BEFORE THE SUPREME COURT

Contention That Carey Act Unconstitutional Takes Local Taxes and Contracts from the United States Supreme Court

summons the master on behalf of the Twin Falls South-West Land and Water Company, which company charged the company with violating the carey act.

The position of the carey act company is that since it was filed, it has been compelled to abandon its trust desert and prairie farming

districts of Idaho into prospective farming areas and that the company has not been interfered with by the state in levying taxes.

In other words, they say, that if it had not been for the existence of the carey act, it would not be anything more than a state in itself.

They further contend that the primary purpose of congress in enacting the carey act was to remove the state of Idaho from the national timber and timberland system and to build the irrigation systems and that for that reason congress gave the carey act authority for the collection of taxes.

This judgment, while it allows the state to collect its taxes and put into its treasury, it is also contended that the state of Idaho, rather, is guaranteed first right and priorities in its water control, with the irrigation districts having the same control.

Therefore the claim is made that any attempt by the state to remove this first right under the terms of the carey act would violate the state's own contract and deprive the carey act companies of their property, all contrary to the constitution of the United States.

On the other hand, the defense

claims that the power to levy taxes is a sovereign right of the state,



Attention, Beet Growers!

Now is the time to get busy on the land. Fully plowed land or potato ground should be gone over and seed bed prepared by spring-tooth harrow, or disc, then floated so that low places in field where dry ground has been dragged will have a chance to get soaked up with any moisture we may get, thus insuring an even germination of seed, also to start weeds, then worked again before planting to destroy weeds. Experience has proved that beets planted the latter part of March or early in April have made the best tonnage.

Drills should be examined to see that each shoe is depositing seed same depth. Each time a turn is made in field see that shoes are not clogged up. Do not plant more than one and one-half inches deep. A good seed bed well packed and seed evenly deposited—at the proper depth will go far to insure a satisfactory crop. All spring plowed land should be worked down, corrugated and irrigated before planting.

Clover and alfalfa ground should be crowned shallow as possible to cut off crown properly, then harrow and leave long enough to get crown dried up, then plow about seven inches deep, irrigate and plant as above.

This work should be done so beets can be planted by the 20th of April, and if possible by April first. Do not plant on smooth surface. Always harrow ahead of planter.

Seventy-seven traveling teachers are employed in Cuba to give instruction in 187 centers in sparsely populated districts. They instruct 3000 children.

Approximately 40,000 children received milk at the mid-morning recess in 47 cities and 31 villages of New York during 1923.

The Pullman Car company announced an increase of 5 per cent for its porters, the annual total of which will exceed one million dollars. The increase will be distributed among all Pullman porters.

Close to 30 per cent of all steel purchases thus far this year were for railroads, buying being at a rate which if kept up will be 10 per cent more than the proportion last year. Car buying in prospect seems large.

Automobile and automotive parts manufacturers with probably not a month's stock of steel on hand, expect to expand operations further. At present the number employed is put at 363,000, the largest on record.

Gasoline production in the United States established a new high record in 1923, amounting to 7,553,915,433 gallons, of which more than six-sevenths was used domestically. Production of kerosene, fuel oil, and lubricants also showed heavy increases.

Only 1618 hours were lost on account of illness by the seven thousand students of Ohio State University during the month of January, 1924. The activities of the student health service in fore-stalling-preventative disease is credited with much of the improvement over past years.

"Training in leadership in the education of parents" is the title of a course offered this year for the first time at the teacher's college, Columbia University. The lectures will deal with the fundamental principles of child nature and development from the physical, psychological and educational aspects.

STEPHAN ASSISTS PROSECUTION IN ROBBERY HEARING

Former Twin Falls Prosecutor Helps
Locality Attest Wyke's "Pro-
ficiency" While Still in Japan.
Today of Men Charged with Holding
in Hazelton Last November.

over all the cash in the way of
notes and coins. Both men and the
men slipped out and jumped into a
car in which a third was quickly wait-
ing. The car started off at once at
high speed, so quietly and symmetrically
that the officers did not notice it immediately
on the street until another pursued
until Mr. Gundelfinger came out and gave the alarm. Everybody had
a hard time getting away from the
car after it, and the pursuit was started.
For days the sheriff's forces of the
various southern Idaho counties were
on the search, many people per-
sonally interviewed, and evidence on
suspicion. The lookout continued
through this state, Nevada and Utah.
Only the day before the arrest, three
men were suspected of being the cul-
pable, but the criminal was not
identified.




