COOLIDGE IS GIVEN EDGE BY MANAGER

Bulter Claims President Will Control 620 Delegates to Convention; Arrives in Washington for Important Conferences.

WASHINGTON, April 4.—The April 29 President Coolidge with two delegations to the national republican convention, Wm. J. Bulter, his chief political adviser, here to-day, Bulter claims he has 620 delegations for Coolidge, one, including those from Maine, from Missouri and the Connecticut delegation, which he believes will be the largest.

Bulter's claim is based on the fact that he has just now been informed of the number of delegations in his state which will be seated, the temporary and permanent chairmen of the Cleveland convention and the chairman of the republican national committee.

Bulter, who has been instrumental in getting John T. Adams, the green-clad chairman, not to continue on that position, after the convening of the national committee, said he will be the active manager of the Coolidge campaign from then on, assuming that Coolidge is nominated, all indications are that he will be.

"I am satisfied and satisfied to say that we will not be afraid to stand up to any man and take him on," he said.
