

# Fin Los Angeles Beauty Beaten to Death in Her Apartment; Throats Cut

## HOLLYWOOD MAN HELD BY POLICE

### Young Woman's Clothing Found in Her Body

LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 5.—An amateur actor, arrested after police today in the search for the slayer of the young beauty, beaten to death late last night in her apartment.

When the body and the condition of the woman's clothing, after evidence of a terrible struggle, the body of the 23 year old beauty was discovered by her sister, Mrs. Frank, when she returned to the apartment, the two young women, occupied, shortly before midnight.

Mrs. Stone's clothing was partially torn from her body, police reported. A piece of clothing had been broken and scattered over the room. Few clues have been afforded, the police search for the slayer, believed undoubtedly to be a man.

Mrs. Stone's throat was scratched with her fingernails, and her skull bore evidence of having been crushed, presumably with a hammer. A hair dress, worn twice, and a pair of gloves, were known to have many friends, she added.

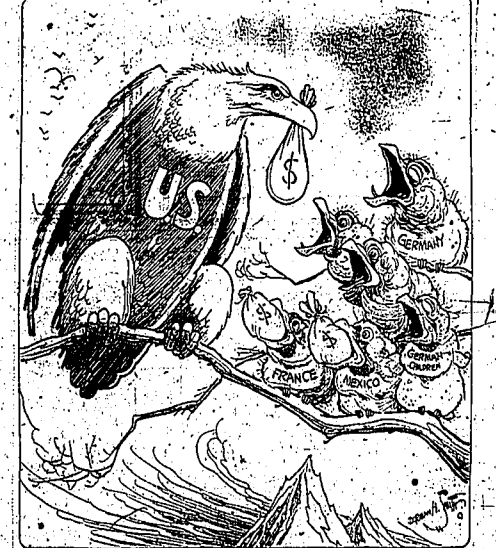

## CLEAN ATHLETICS

(From Jhingham Press Bulletin.)

Last week the L. D. S. U. school held an assembly in which it made known to the outside world that it had been playing an ineligible player in its basketball team, the team that won the state title. At the assembly, the school relinquished its right to be called state champions, relinquished its right to go to Chicago for the big tournament and is at the present time the subject of much discussion and punning.

It is not the aim of this paper to dwell upon the fact that Max Foster, of the L. D. S. U. school was over 21 years of age when the school year opened last September, and it is not our aim to try and ridicule the unfortunate team and school, but we would like to ask a few questions concerning the rulings of the state athletic association which is supposed to be at the head of high school athletics.

First, we would like to know how an ineligible player can get away with that sort of thing with a lenient supposed to be watching for such things? How can a slip, such as the case of Max Foster, escape the oversight of the eligibility department of the association?

It is claimed that the registration card of Foster's had been tampered with. All well and good, but why didn't those who discovered the fact, find it out BEFORE the Saints were allowed to be proclaimed state champions, and allowed to compete throughout the basketball season. What school or individual believe proved at the winning L. D. S. U. team and spilled the beans?

Certainly the L. D. S. U. faculty is not composed of Jhing persons, who would be unable to see that a registration card had been tampered with.

Why, or why, did the school allow Foster to play? What is the result normally upon the other schools of the state?

What is gained with the winning of a championship under false colors? Oh, the folly of it all, and yet the L. D. S. U. school is the first school that has been found using such tactics to win a title.

Jhingham, the team that, for the past six years has won a team to compete in the state tournament, has just to bring home the coveted title, it has always tried to live up to the rulings of the state high school officials.

Jhingham has been accused of being the home of a rotten bunch of sports, but, think heaven, with all our so-called nobleness, we did not try to slip in any ringers at the state tournament. The fact of the matter is that a man smart enough to get past the eligibility board of the state has never been located, and the people of Jhingham are not looking for him either.

There are many lads in Jhingham of the present time, who, in years gone by, have fought for the blue and white, and are now playing with the Ethel Cup basketball team, and would have aided materially in the last state tournament in bringing the flag to Jhingham.

It is rather discouraging, to say the least, to take a team to the state tournament year in and year out, and never a championship, but it lends considerably more to have ineligible players bent us out of the honors.

And now, we feel would ask one more question of the powers that be: Why was Pangloss, awarded the state championship? Here in Jhingham, away from the beaten path, away from the rest of the world, many of us know: but little more than the law allows, and yet our conception of the controversy is that where a team is found to be playing an ineligible player, every game in which said team participated is thrown out, thus one finds that the South Mountain-Santa game, the Jordan-Santa game, and in fact, all four games in which the Saints were participants are null and void, and, therefore, should not be a state championship awarded in the state this year. But at this writing, Pangloss is in Chicago, and it is our hope that the Georgia club, quieted under the able guidance of Coach Church, bring home the championship of the United States. We know it known that Utah exists in everything, even to its athletes, but we also want the world to know that said championship was won on merit and honest athletes.

Perhaps the state board of control of high school athletics in answering our questions would like a few suggestions, and are going to take the liberty of suggesting: First, that the honorable board declare no championship be awarded any team for the 1924 basketball season; second, that the L. D. S. U. school be suspended for the period of one year from participating in any branch of scholastic athletics. This on the surface may sound a trifle severe, but will be a trifle severe, but will prove to be an incentive for other schools who may at some future time try and slip one over.

But be that as it may, we wish to doff our heads to the Jhingham High school, to Principal Lars W. Nielsen, to Coach Tommy McMullin, to the players on the team, and to the students who have supported that, which should always be foremost in the heart of every student, CLEAN ATHLETICS.

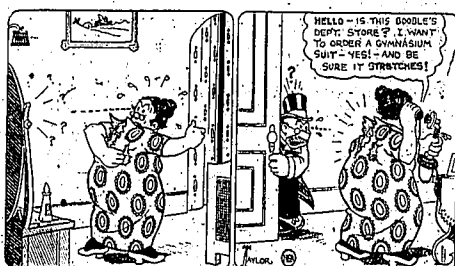
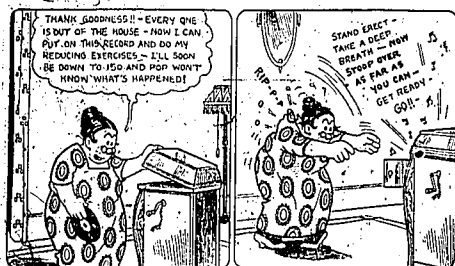
