BRUINS TAKE SECOND GAME, SCORE 8-6

Locals Overcome An Early Lead and Triumph Over Pocatello; Hodgkin Pitches Brilliantly; Last Game This Afternoon.

Starting a sensational eight-game series after trailing by a score of 3 to the local high school team, the Bruins overcame an early lead and won the second game yesterday at Lincoln Field, this morning their final score being 8-6.

Pocatello ran into a rocky lead, but Hodgkin, who had been brilliant, was successful with six runs in the ninth frame.

The game was scored until the ninth, during which the visitors tallied two runs on a fielder's choice, "Showboat" Jackson, tripled.

The City Gate Team added two more in the fifth, came right to center and home, home on Laube's double with fast scoring.

Pocatello made its total six by putting two men across the rubber in the seventh, Jackson and a Cornell scorched on two hits, a walk and a couple of errors.

The game was won in the eighth frame. Duncan was apparently confident of taming the Bruins in this inning, as he had done in the first three, when other than his own score was with Tamm and Muzzell, together with a single by "Doc" Johnson accounted for five runs. Hodkin struck out all three others however in the ninth and the battle was over.

For during work and personal bravery of the Twin Falls fire company was not declined the companies in other cities upon whom just praise is often bestowed. The boys worked with intelligence and intrepidity last evening and by handling of the situation prevented what might easily have been a very much more serious condition. It is unfortunate that the fire occurred. It is fortunate when it did occur that the boys were able to take care of the situation.

The extension this week into this territory of the Western States Securities company of which W. J. Allen, formerly of this city is president; C. E. Wright of Twin Falls, vice president, and O. C. Allen of Twin Falls, secretary and treasurer, is one of the hopeful indications of probable future growth. The men named, and the other directors, W. A. Flower of this city, and Henry D. Mayo of Salt Lake City, are all familiar with conditions here. The corporation was formed in January, in Utah, for the purpose of lending money and negotiating loans, forming, promoting and subsidizing companies, syndicates and partnerships and for the execution of trusts. The company has a capital of \$250,000 of which \$100,000 is paid up. The articles of the company, for transaction of business in Idaho have been filed here indicating that this is considered a good area in which to operate.

The meetings which have been held in Kinchela and other places by the forestry department for the prevention of fires in the U. S. reserves are of the utmost importance and should be attended by the majority of our people instead of such a small number. More of these meetings will be held next week and while this week closes the special Forest Protection week, yet we should make every week in the year the time to prevent fires in our forests. Seventy per cent of the fires in our forest reserves originate from man's carelessness and these fires destroy about eleven million forest acres in the United States. Idaho has a large acreage of forests which should be preserved as it is our heritage. Lumbering in Idaho is second only to agriculture and agriculture is dependent upon water and every one knows that our water supply is sustained by forest cover.

BITTER-ENDERS LOSING OUT

The defeat of Senator Medill McCormick in the Illinois primaries is another instance of the political misfortune that has befallen the little crowd of "bitter-enders" which, like the assaults on the League of Nations when the Senate refused to endorse the world of President Woodrow Wilson in Paris.

Senator Lodge, whose nominal leadership in the Senate is but a shell, is the only conspicuous survivor of the band of frontiersmen who led the battle of death in the campaign that brooked President Wilson's health and resulted in the rejection of the treaty.

Hiram Johnson has seen his presidential hopes fade away until nothing remains of it but his own personal seat. Senator Moses Reid in the returns from New Hampshire the refusal of the people of his own state to make him a delegate-at-large to the Cleveland convention. Senator "Jim" Reed has been repudiated by the people of his home state and is a shining example of a brilliant man who has thrown away an opportunity for leadership that would bring anyone with a conscientious program. Illinois now turns down McCormick.

The trouble with all of them has been that they are strong in attacking force when anything is to be pulled down, but none of them accomplished any results when something needed to be built up. And the country needs builders now if it ever needed them—Davenport (Ia.), Des Moines.

It is well to recall that the defeat of the League of Nations as part of the treaty of Versailles is only one instance of defeat of peace treaties by a combination of narrow personal views and predatory interests. The trusts identified with the American Protective Tariff and some democratic senators who lived the gentle occupation of "tail-twisting" beat a treaty of arbitration with England negotiated by President Cleveland. A similar treaty under the McKinley administration was blocked, and finally withdrawn and modified. Under President Roosevelt the expedient of inserting vital reservations and amendments was adopted and Roosevelt, refused to yield the point or attempt to exchange the treaties so they died. President Taft negotiated treaties with England and France to submit to arbitration all questions justiciable in law or equity. The Senate ratified the treaties with six reservations and Taft refused to exchange them on the ground that they were worthless as changed. He afterwards wrote a book defending his attitude and that of Roosevelt. In both of these last instances Lodge was strongly in favor of reservations. The experience of President Wilson with the Senate differed only from those of Taft and Roosevelt in the magnitude of the treaty involved.


