Harrison, 64, was arrested here last week after a long flight from justice. He was charged with conspiring to defraud the United States of \$50,000.

The bird, unable to fly, was later killed by S. Gilbert, the lady father.

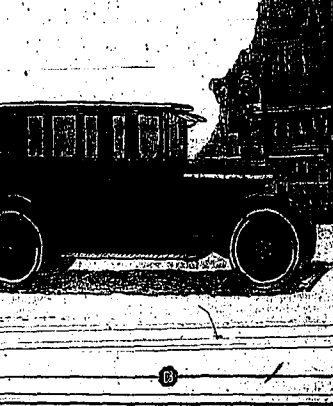
