WILLS MEETS IRISH FIGHTER IN BIG BOUT

Colored Scrapper May Lose Chance to Tackle Dempsey Unless He Stops Irishman; Madden Has No Rating Among First Class Heavyves

NEW YORK, May 7.—Gamblers for \$100,000 are betting that Harry Wills will take a chance on blow-fight with Jack Dempsey when he meets Harry Madden, the Ireland fighter, at Madison Square Garden Saturday night.

Wills accepted the match with Madden before he had been matched with the other fighters. He has been announced today that he not only was going through with it but that he would stop Madden three rounds.

Madden, who rates among the first class heavyweights but has

much as much to prove as anyone in the ring, is the only man in his weight in the American class and has made a success of his business training.

Despite the fact that Madden has trained for the bout and regardless of his record of never having been beaten, he is offering \$100,000 to the winner, offering 2 to 1 and 2 to 1 that Wills stops him before the end of the 15th round.

"Wills has had right hand that has cracked twice in the last year. He has it treated by one of the best hand specialists in the country and he claims that it is stronger than it ever was."

Unless Wills stops Madden in fifteen rounds, he will offer \$100,000 for meeting the champion. Some of the wise ones claim that the money is being held behind Wills on the hope that he would make a bad showing in the fight and could be forced to give up his claim for a share at the title.

We rejoice that this city has a promising outlook for a prosperous year and we feel sure that whatever helps Rogerson or any other city in this section of Idaho will eventually help Twin Falls.

The city of Twin Falls is to have better sanitary conditions, according to a move made by the city club at their meeting on Monday evening. They appropriated \$1000 toward this end, and while the most of this amount perhaps will be used for hauling garbage this will help materially in giving the magic city better sanitation.

In medical education in America, the truly excellent is still exceptional; we are still near the beginning, in the opinion of Abram Flexner, secretary of the general education board. Nevertheless no nation in the world has within the past ten or twelve years made such progress in the organization, improvement, and financing of medical education as the United States.

We are pleased for the new park created in northern Idaho to be known as the "Craters of the Moon," which was officially set aside yesterday by President Coolidge as a national park. Several of the residents of Twin Falls have worked consistently for this cause and their efforts are at last rewarded. The National Geographic magazine devoted considerable space to this vast area a few weeks ago and this only adds to the many other wonderful scenic attractions in the state.

It is a source of great encouragement to all friends of law enforcement to find that federal, county and city officers working in harmony for the purpose of bringing miscreants to justice. The law should be enforced and when the officers work together they can go far toward enforcing it. The same energy should be shown in enforcement of antitrust laws, and it is to be regretted that national and state officials do not collaborate as well in this as in public enforcement of officers do with local county and municipal officials here in putting the dupes law into effective practice.

We note with more passing interest that Burley is demanding a larger supply of "good water." This reminds us that Twin Falls should look toward this same end. We have plenty of water but we should secure a more wholesome drinking water and this can be had from several sources. Blue lakes water could be pumped into our present reservoir and is the finest water to be had anywhere. Then there are several other sources of excellent water which could be brought to the magic city by gravity. While some claim that the present supply is good enough this is not true and even the water knows enough about water to know that the present water supply has enough chlorine to be 100 per cent pure for human consumption.

The Times was asked this week to give the negro and caucasian population of the United States at the beginning of the Civil war and at present. In 1860 the total population of the United States was 31,143,221, of whom 14,011,810 were negroes, according to figures produced in the World Almanac from the United States census bureau in regard to the total population and from the New International Encyclopedia in regard to the negro population. The column does not give the negro population by decades except for 1910 and 1920. In 1920 the total population was 105,710,229, of whom 10,161,311 were negroes. In the article in the New International, the figures refute the wild theory of those who fear the elimination of the native white race by the negro, as it shows that for the decade ending 1910, the latest figures which it has the native born Caucasian population increased 20.9 per cent while the negro population increased but 11.2 per cent. Increase from immigration was not taken into account.

NEWSPAPER SUGGESTS DAVIS RESIGNATION

With all the talk made by D. W. Davis on his recent visit to this section it seems of sentiment reveals the fact that public opinion in this community concerning him has not changed. Some of the most prominent people interviewed state that they want tangible evidence that surface indications evidenced by the power contractor at American Falls with the Idaho Power company, to permit the power site at the Twin Falls, it is said, are too strong to be set aside by the word of mouth statement of the Hon. D. W.

The *Idaho-Bulletin* is not inclined to enter into a discussion of the situation. There is ample evidence that we are facing a brick wall with little or no opportunity of breaking through it. But in face of sentiment as it now stands the resignation of Mrs. Davis from the reclamation services would be very acceptable to the actors of the Minidoka project.—*Idaho Pioneer-Record*.
