## Laying of Rails to Begin Late in June; Grade Contract Let

**Utah Construction Company Awarded the Contract for Grading by Short Line; Difficulties Ironed Out and Letting of Contract Makes Construction Sure.**

**SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, May 14.—**Laying of track for the Oregon-Wells branch of the Oregon Short Line railroad which will connect Wells, Nev., with Egerdon, Idaho, probably start the last week of June, according to R. V. Platt, general manager of the road, who announced yesterday that the grading contract for the road had been awarded to the Utah Construction company.

"The grading of the road was considered of a problem, as there is a great amount of rock material in the cuttings, and Egerdon which the contractor will have to cut through. We don't want to have any difficulties in the grading, so they won't start too closely behind the grading out fit," Mr. Platt explained.







## WHAT IS A RADICAL?

The use of the same word in different senses in different countries is often confusing. In America to call a man a radical socialist would be to brand him with belonging to the extreme wing of the socialist party. On the other hand in France, a radical socialist is really just a socialist at all, but a person who goes to the limit in some forms of state interference and who adopts a number of socialist planks without adopting the Marxian formulas. In Germany in old monarchial days the radical party, so-called, was pretty similar to the mutual liberal party and in no way identified with the large social democratic party of red socialism. There was what was called a radical party in England in the days of Gladstone, with whom, however, it generally acted. This party was extremely anti-socialist, and carried the opposition to governmental interference and tinkering far beyond the point held by the regular liberals.

## THE DAM AND RAILROAD TO GO

Neither the ruling of the supreme court yesterday upholding all the essential points of the ruling of the district court in connection with the American Falls bond issue nor the statement of General Manager H. V. Platte that the contract for the construction of the railroad south was unsupervised. Lawyers generally were of the opinion that the decision of the lower court in this matter was based on sound principles, and that the objections raised were not well grounded. Practically everybody felt that the Utah Construction company would get the contract to build the road and that interpretation of the conditions in the call for bids would show them to be the lowest bid bidders. The reported reductions between this company and the O. S. L. is such that it was natural for the work to go that way.

In both cases, however, there is general popular satisfaction. It is felt that since the U. S. company has large interests in this part of the state and in northern Nevada, the fact that it got the contract will mean much toward building up the country, and it is also felt that there will be less tendency to civil war conditions by that company, since it has the contract to construct the line.

The upholding of the decision in regard to American Falls is also a cause for congratulation. It means that the best price will be obtained for the bonds and that a larger amount of money will be available for work at an earlier period than would otherwise be possible. Nor is this fact, pleasing as it is, the chief reason for congratulation. The supreme court allowed anyone who had buy legal opinion that would probably shed light on any phase of the subject, from my angle, to intervene. The decision should tend to satisfy many who have had misgivings in regard to possible vital defects in the contract, which, it is admitted is not as good as it might be in some respects. Since the alleged defects were set forth in briefs filed in opposition to upholding the lower court, it is evident that the highest tribunal in Idaho does not consider them to be very serious.
