

PETERS AND LECHLEITER ARE FOUND GUILTY

Kidnaping and Death of 14-Year-Old Lad Is Laid to Gang of Degenerates

Coroner's Physician Declares That Youth Is Mistreated by Abductors; Purpose of Kidnaping Is Ransom; Disappears from School Grounds and Hunt Begins at Once.

CHICAGO, May 23.—Degenerate kidnaped and killed Robert Frank, 14, son of Jacob Frank, millwright manufacturer and real estate man, Dr. Joseph Springer, coroner's physician declared today after an all-night investigation to determine the cause of death of the victim.

Dr. Springer said there was ample evidence of attack. Ransom was the primary purpose of the slayers, Lieutenant Michael O'Grady, in charge of the police murder squad, said. Two instructors at the Harvard school, a private institution attended by the boy, were questioned for several hours this morning. They were turned loose but O'Grady said he would take them into custody again later for further examination.

RESIGNATION OF FRANKLIN D. ROOSEVELT ANTI-COMMUNIST

Secretary of Treasury Is Bitterly Opposed to Enactment of Compromise Tax Bill; Withdrawal May Be Result of Congress.

WASHINGTON, May 23.—Resignation of Secretary of the Treasury Mellon was seen as possible in congressional quarters today as a result of the determination of congress to enact the compromise tax bill.

While talk of a veto by the president is still held, based largely on the theory that the publicity project would be nullified by the bill, it is still extremely distasteful to him, confidence is felt by republicans that he will win it.

Great doubt is voiced in his belief in gaining ground that he can pass over his veto because of the swelling excitement for the measure, as finally drawn by the conferees.

Speculation as to Mellon's position is based on the report that his tax reduction program by congress and the belief that the bill will become a law without the signature or passage over a veto.

There has been talk in the senate chambers for ten days that Mellon is "back of politics" and his position. Certain senators who claim to know Mellon's feelings are of the opinion to return to the many business interests which have been neglected during his term of office.

Chairman Wood of the finance committee intends to get the compromise report before the senate today. If it is adopted the house will pass upon it tomorrow or Monday.

GRAVE FEARS ENTERTAINED FOR SOLDIERS ARE FAREED

Howard Simmons and E. J. Hinman, of Oswego, N. Y., Believed to Have Met Death in Fiery Cauldron of Volcano in Hawaii.

WASH., May 23.—Herald that Howard Simmons and E. J. Hinman, soldiers from Oswego, N. Y., may have met a horrible death in the fiery cauldron of the volcano Kilauea, was growing today.

The two soldiers have been missing since Saturday. Search for them was abandoned yesterday. If they are still alive, they probably are sheltered in some native village or other habitation and have not yet been able to get into communication with friends in Hilo or Honolulu.

The volcano remained comparatively quiet much of last night. Three explosions have occurred during the last 24 hours, but they did not approach the violence of Monday's demonstrations.

The two soldiers lost their green uniforms. They were then seen near the crater. The term used to describe the actual cauldron filled with molten lava was "the great pit."

At that time the volcano was in eruption but had not reached its full force. The lava was not as hot as it is now, and it was not as much as it is now.

Investigation this week has been almost that since Saturday the pit has greatly enlarged, the sides cracking or being blown away by the eruptions. From below, the two soldiers have been caught at the edge of the pit when one of the eruptions occurred.

Another theory is that they may have been crushed to death by a boulder thrown up by the volcano, as was Thomas R. Taylor.

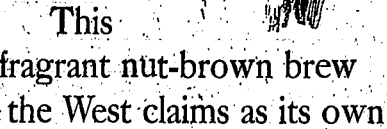

The proposition to build an auditorium as a memorial to the boys who fought for the country in the great war is a worthy one in every respect. There should be some tangible memorial for the boys and their achievements. Immediately after the return of the called men, this idea found favor and extensive plans for some worthy monument at Shoshone Falls were worked out. The legislature appropriated \$10,000 to help the project. The plans were too large for the funds available after the period of inflation was over, so the money from the state was turned back into the treasury of Idaho at the expiration of the time limit.

The Utah Construction company has given a million dollar bond to insure the completion this year of the 75 miles of the Rogerson-Wells Nevada cutoff. Part of the construction company outfit has already reached Rogerson. Shoshone officials received orders yesterday to divert all ties arriving here to Rogerson. This looks like hurried completion of this long-fought-of line that will shorten the distance to San Francisco by all very materially and will also give southern Idaho producers a saving on freight in reaching the great coast market. The new road will be a great aid to the Twin Falls fruit growers and will be of some assistance to the Shoshone valley. Idaho Free Press.

It is a question whether the railroad could not take steps to win back some local travel. As highway capacity is expanded by the growing number of motor cars, it is probable that there will be a gain both in street railway traffic and local steam railroad traffic. Moreover there are persons who temporarily or permanently are not using motor cars and desire railroad transportation. Railroads should not establish impracticable trains. If they can sometimes adjust schedules or equipment so as to make the trains run more serviceable and thus more productive of revenue, on the Boston & Albany, for instance, where there is virtually no east-bound passenger service on Sunday forenoon until 10 o'clock, a local train runs all the way to Boston to carry milk, having a schedule at least as far as Worcester that would be practicable for passengers. If passengers were carried, there would be no additional expense to the railroad for a passenger coach is already carried to accommodate the train crew and there would be a chance of building up a local passenger business.

IDAHO POWER DISCRIMINATION

Admission by the power company officials that they are discriminating and expect to continue to discriminate against the Times in advertising because this paper has had the temerity to suggest that the new rates were unsatisfactory and should be reconsidered raises a question of morals, as well as of legal status. Power companies as public service corporations, owing under public franchises, and are therefore of a public character, subject to fair criticism, in their conduct and charges, just as much as other public institutions are. The Times believes that the new rates are unfair, inequitable and unjustified, and that the only recourse the public has for the present is to ask for a rehearing from the public utilities commission, and should this prove insufficient, that the matter should be taken to the supreme court. So far as the city is concerned, it believes that it has a right to look into the matter of the wisdom of public ownership.

That a gas company might make good here and prove a safety valve has also been suggested. All this is within the law. It is legitimate and not unbecoming. The power company has a right to distribute its advertising as it desires, so long as it is a common carrier proposition. The Times is not a public utility and does not have the right to pay for favors, money that it is allowed to raise from the public. It is well for the people to understand clearly that this is the policy that it is pursuing.

The Times has not and will not deviate from said policy and whether the Idaho Power sees fit to use our columns or not remains up to them but we intend to continue to print the truth even if it hurts the Idaho Power or any other concern, which appears to be using their advertising budget for the purpose of influencing public opinion.

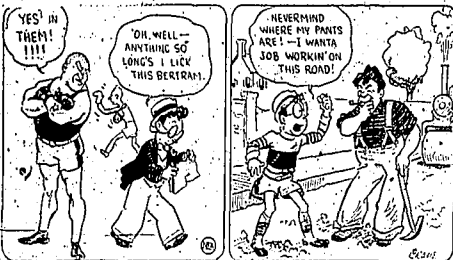
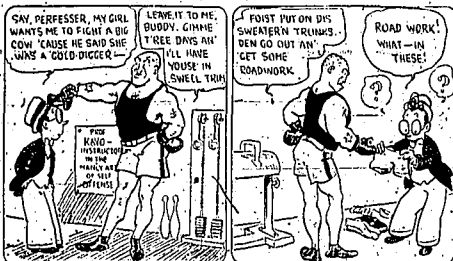
