FINK CHARGES BANKER WITH ROBBERY TODAY

Identifying Before Daugherty
Investigating Committee
of Fink Charged Vandenberg
With Robbery Offered Him
\$100,000 to Perjure Him

New York, May 31.—Al Fink of
Mobile, New York, today charged before the Senate Daugherty investigating committee that Senator George W. Vandenberg, of Michigan, offered him \$100,000 to give perjured testimony against President Coolidge before the Senate in the Senate room after Fink made his charge.

Fink was under the influence of alcohol when he made his statement, was testifying that he had not added Craven Brothers of New York to get away from the Senate, and was asked to leave at 11 o'clock Thursday.

"As Lodge prepared to leave, the

"I demand to be heard."

"I want to tell you I was offered \$100,000 by Frank Vandenberg," said President Coolidge, he continued.

"Call and office, and I threw

him out of my office," he yelled at committee assistants.

"He's a crook," said Fink.

"I want to tell you we're a crook."

Fink denied fully the charges by Coolidge, and said he had no information that he had secured illegal permits for Craven Brothers.

"Leave me alone," said Fink.

"I had only one request for what's permits and of course I would have been given it," he said.

Senator Wheeler then declared that Fink had "tried to sell out to Daugherty" and that he had been "told to leave." Fink then went up to the Rockefellers and got "put out of hall," said Wheeler, "and brought him down to the hotel where he was staying, the Hotel Warwick Park, hotel where he was to meet Frank and William.

"He was to meet Frank and William and he was to be paid a 'million-dollar' fee," said Fink.

Wheeler said that Fink's charges that Vandenberg had betrayed him to the Senate were "ridiculous."

He also said, "Fink had no chance to get out of the attorney general's office."

Wheeler said that he was informed that Vandenberg had been "told to leave."

"That's a 'fairy tale,'" said Fink.

IDAHO BANKER ASKS NEW TRIVIAL FORGERY CHARGE

Boise, Idaho, May 31—John Fink, banker, and his wife, Anna, who were indicted yesterday on charges of forgery, were arraigned before U. S. Commissioner John Daugherty in the federal court here.

Fink, 41, and his wife, 39, were charged with having forged checks on the First National Bank of Boise, Idaho, and the amount of the forged checks was \$100,000.

TWIN FALLS HONORS DEPARTED.

Memorial Day was fittingly celebrated in Twin Falls yesterday with a splendid parade followed by appropriate exercises at the cemetery. The city was beautiful with flags and bunting from one end of the business section to the other. It makes one feel proud of our home town as you ride or walk up and down the streets and view the many beautiful flags displayed on such an occasion. The majority of the homes displayed the National colors, too.

The spirit of such an occasion is hard to describe in cold type and yet we would feel that in passing such an event without proper recognition would be a sad oversight. The parade was an imposing scene and taught both young and old an important lesson in patriotism. We would like to suggest that if proper arrangements could be made on such occasions the whole organization should be provided with conveyances and taken direct to the cemetery after the parade is finished. It looks bad to see the parade break up and quite a number of organizations hurry back to the city and leave George to carry out the remainder of the program. We should take time to honor the dead by going to the cemetery and listening to the program at least.

The Twin Falls cemetery looked very beautiful yesterday and nearly all the graves were decorated, which is indeed a pretty and impressive custom. Few cities have such a beautiful cemetery as this one and we should do our best to keep same in the fine shape and properly decorated with overhanging and attractive shrubbery.

We might well remember, too, that the most lasting tribute which we can pay to our departed, whether they served under the Stars and Stripes, or whether they were privates in the ordinary walks of life, is to live such unselfish lives that their memory will be honored by our lives. We can serve today in the same patriotic manner as they served. We can sacrifice today in the same sense in which they sacrificed, and if we are true-patriots we will do our utmost in this regard.

But we ought to consider this fact that marching in a parade or unfurling the Stars and Stripes to the breezes is not the kind of service that America needs most today. What this nation needs is sons and daughters who will be true to the principles of American ideals and sustain the Republic by their votes and by their lives from day to day. This does not mean by mouth service but rather that giving up of some of our selfish ideas and ideals for the good of the community and the state. If we fail to serve we fail to sacrifice and, if we fail to sacrifice we have missed the mark of a true soldier in the army of America's great onward and upward march.

As we count the cost in the lives of that vast throng which paid the supreme sacrifice that this nation might be one and as we recount the deeds of heroism of those who sleep across the sea that a great world might know what freedom means, let us return thoughts that we can at least have a small part in building a great republic which reflects on our forefathers and on this generation as those who have suffered that we might enjoy the fruits of liberty.
