POCATELLO WINS THIRD GAME 19-08

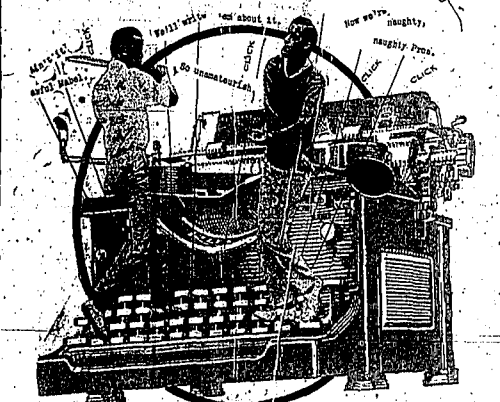
Victors Took Three Games with Twin Falls Blues in Series Here; Twin Falls Started Weak Before Their Team Was Well Organized; Funds Also Needed.

## HAZELTON BANK ROBBERY CASE UP IN JEROME

Final Hearing on Seasonal Crime Cases on Alleged Meeting with Arthur Hill; Said to Have Led to Trial

JEROME, June 2 (Special to The Times)—The free gambling of \$200 to one dollar bills in Hazelton was a means of raising money and Russell Smith who was accused of assisting James H. Havermale, the Hazelton bank of \$4500, November 22, 1922, was said today by Prosecuting Attorney Henry H. Hill and Frank L. Stephan of Twin Falls, special prosecutor in the case which came on for trial here. The trial which has aroused great interest in Jerome county, dry large crowd to the courtroom. Senator La Follette will run as a third party candidate, he is quoted as saying, if both the major parties nominate reactionaries and if he is convinced there is a demand from the people for him to run. In other words, apparently, his hat is in the ring.

As his party in congress continues to refuse him support the better odds on the president's chances of election increase. And the opposition by congressmen to the president's policies is largely dictated by the hope of political profit. Politics is a queer game.

Secretary Hughes thinks that "it is remarkable that the standards of official integrity are so well maintained." But does he deplore public indignation against failures of maintenance? Not if he is to be judged by his past record in getting after official corruption.

Use of schoolhouses in Utah for religious instruction, specifically by the Mormon church, is forbidden by state laws and the state constitution, according to an opinion rendered by the attorney general of the state, himself a Mormon. On the contrary, Dr. C. N. Jensen, state superintendent of public instruction, has recently advised a school board that such use of schoolhouses is permissible. Under the statutes of Utah the state superintendent is legal adviser to all school boards, and his advice will govern the boards unless prevented by judicial action.

Student travel in foreign countries will be the topic of discussion at the second annual conference of the National Council on Foreign Service Training to be held at Hotel Brunswick, Boston, June 25. In conjunction with the Eleventh National Foreign Trade conference. As an adjunct in foreign service preparation supervised student travel has been neglected in the United States. The National Training Council on Foreign Service Training has appointed a sub-committee to study this important question and recommend a program for co-ordinating all organized effort of this character.

The motive behind the Goetting bill was largely economic and the long standing demand for rate relief somewhat modified a debate that was in most respects keen and weighty and approved only by gratuitous asprimony toward the interstate commerce commission. It preceded the senate's passing of this measure by more than two months. It was brought out that neither the commission nor the railroads could determine exactly when freight was handled at a rate in excess of the "out of pocket" cost, and it was argued that in estimating this cost the railroads did not reckon interest on bonds or dividends. The bill as passed takes from the commission its discretion of granting lower long-haul rates to meet the competition of water-carrier.—Springfield Republican.

## 35 SUICIDES TODAY

To every day at least 35 American commit suicide. Last year alone more than 12,000 who killed themselves, reports the *Survey-Life League* after a check-up. Then, are the known cases. Many others, probably thousands, did away with themselves, never to be discovered.

The League estimates that a third of the suicides are due to insanity. As a matter of fact, all suicides are temporarily unbalanced mentally. That is why the person, depressed and tempted to taking his own life, should wait at least 24 hours.

Only almost always changes the decision from self-destruction to the normal desire for self-preservation.

And tomorrow may bring better things. It is always blackest just before dawn.

Poverty, remorse, sickness and loneliness are the principal reasons for suicide. At least two of them can be mastered—poverty and loneliness. Sickness, too, usually is not hopeless. Remorse, if genuine, cannot be excepted by atonement.

Twenty per cent of last year's suicides, it's estimated, were due to mental failures. Repair is a better way of expressing it—black of courage to fight for a comeback.

But complications are believed to cause a third of all suicides. Battered liver, deserted wife, loss of a mate by death. A catastrophic emotion is love. Without it, most people do not consider life worth living.

The most pathetic among the suicides are the children. Some, born between ages of 6 and 10, killed themselves in 1922. Usually they were the victims of unhappy homes, unpleasant school experiences, youthful marriages or jazz life.

Hedonists, you who are so melancholy and depressed that you see the borderline of mental instability. Tomorrow will be a better day. Tomorrow follows every storm. And the commandment "Thou shalt not kill" applies as much to self-destruction as to the killing of others.

Just as the bank of Hazelton had finished business on the afternoon of November 22, two men who had been arrested near their home appeared at the bank and demanded the cash. It is the contention of the prosecution that the man drove the car owned by Mel Havermale, a few miles from the scene of the robbery. He was seen to take the car and then drove away until the car disappeared.
