

FRANCE'S NEW PRESIDENTIAL CONSERVATIVE

Poincare's Friends Elected Gaston Doumergue—President of France Today, Was Premier Under Poincare and Is Conservative.

VERSAILLES, France, June 12.—Gaston Doumergue, president of the senate, was elected president of France by the national congress here today.

General Doumergue was elected by the Left parties following the recent parliamentary election.

His election was expected and is more of an satisfactory result of the elements concerned, although there was bitter debate among the more radical of the Left parties, many of whom favored Poincare, or former Premier Aristide Briand.

Conservative support for Doumergue in office, the new president feeling he will not go to extremes in forming a cabinet.

General Doumergue is a lawyer from Nimes in southern France and his political career is well known.

Doumergue first gained the political spotlight when he was appointed premier under the cabinet of Poincare.

He served as premier and foreign minister until June 1923 when he resigned to make way for the Viscount de Lamoignon.

He then aligned himself with the Left and did not accept public office again until he became president of the senate.

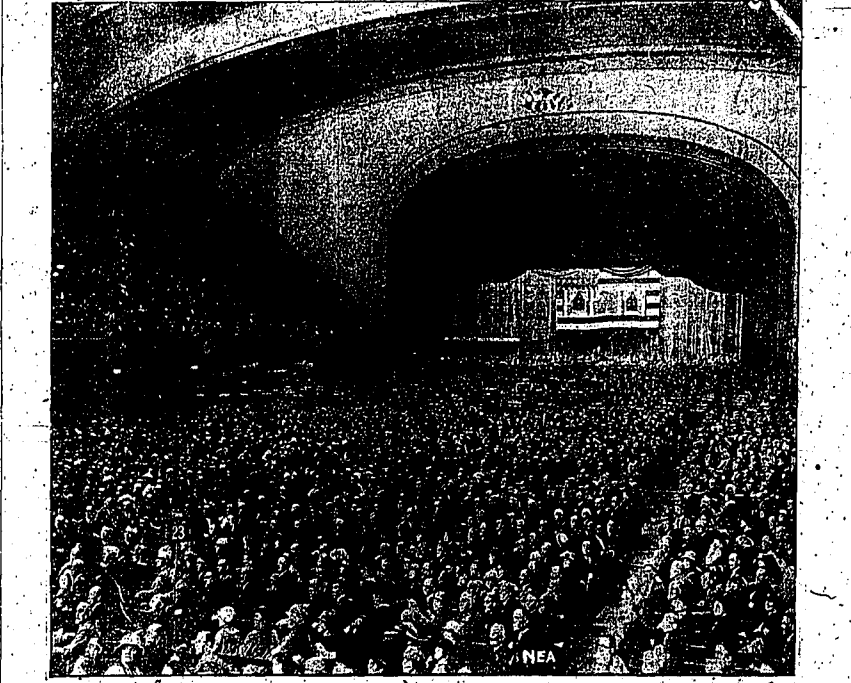
