THE CONVENTION AND POLITICAL SITUATION

(By JAMES D. WHELAN)

Two good men, personally, both conservative, both well informed, and both lacking in personal courage have been nominated in a convention in which the keynotes were deliberately sounded to draw attention away from the Harding administration, and to lay the failure of the present administration to carry into effect the Mellon tax bill and defend the honors on the shoulders of congress, which has a republican majority in both houses. Dad politics! Not necessarily. A dangerous game, playing with edged tools, rather, in which a slip will be had for the actors. Four years ago republican platform, candidates and speakers scored a strong executive and lauded congress; today the reverse is true.

The party has been placed squarely on its platform in favor of the present world's court; Lodge, Horn and the majority of the republican senators notwithstanding; and the keynotes in the convention jumped gleefully on the senators over the feet, amid the piteous of the galleries. But the senators or the forces which pull the strings on them, have another day coming. Will they blinch? Of course not. There is the danger. Should Coolidge be elected, enough of them will switch over at the silent session to pass the Mellon bill as introduced. While Coolidge and company no talking world court just as hard as the 13 leading republicans talked league of nations four years ago, the senators will be saving word and getting re-elected on their records; when it all over they will recall the fact "that treaties are made with the advice and consent of the senate" and there will be no entrance to the world court; should the senate remain republican. According to the United Press dispatches, every Coolidge favorite was turned down by the senatorial clique for the vice presidency, which, with the business "foreknew" in many ways a good man on the ticket.

The real attitude of the next senate if republican, may be safely forecasted by the most reliable barometer of U. S. politics, "The American Economist," organ of the American Protective Tariff League. What it says goes with a republican senate. IT ALWAYS HES.

In its issue of May 30, the American Economist significantly says:

"The A. P. T. L. was the first and only national organization which opposed the league of nations and it took with a doubtful eye upon the world; court upon absolutely disassociated from the league of nations, or any similar authority."

"First and only national organization which opposed the league of nations" looks like a slam on the republican party, which is thus made a minor ally to its organization. But the boast is true. In January, 1920, it passed formal resolutions congratulating itself in the same terms, Senator Gronna, of South Dakota, praised it and read the resolutions into the Congressional Record without protest from the senators who were telling home folks that they killed the league of nations.

The American Economist just to show what it is able to do points out that the tariff league opposed successfully the seven McKinian reciprocity treaties of McKinley; the Roosevelt reciprocity treaties of 1902, 1903 and 1907, except the Cuban treaty, which it respects to see repudiated, and the Taft reciprocity treaties. All these were drafted in accordance with the specific pledges of republican national platforms and had the support of powerful republican presidents. It boasts that it opposed the ship subsidy bills defeated in 1898 and 1922, both republican party measures, and that it was "the first and only national organization" which opposed the dye embargo and "the first and only organization opposing free ports from 1909 to the present."

Roosevelt was only able to put over the Cuban reciprocity by an appeal to sentiment, which he could not make for his other reciprocity treaties.

In addition, the tariff league opposed the McKinley arbitration treaty with England, and the senate defeated it in its original form. It opposed Roosevelt's arbitration treaty with England and it was killed by reservations. The same fate overtook the Taft arbitration treaties with France and England, which the tariff league fought.

To sum up: If Coolidge and a republican congress are elected, the Mellon bill on which the tariff league is lying low until after election, will be passed. And the tariff league will kill the world court plan as at present drafted, as it killed reciprocity and other republican measures endorsed by republican platforms and backed by republican administrations.

Control-work carried on by the California state highway commission against the express bark scale (Ephrosina curvipes Ehrhorn) demonstrated conclusively that the method of control recommended by the Palo Alto laboratory of the bureau of entomology, United States department of agriculture, is a complete success. One hundred and thirty-four large-leafed cypress trees were sprayed October 31, 1922, with the spray composed of 8 gallons of 28 degrees gravity kerosene oil, 1/2 gallon of 70% alcohol, and 31 gallons of kerosene. On 7-27-23, 1923, 18 months after the spraying, re-examination of the trees failed to disclose a single living scale. Insects of this kind, in the vicinity used as checks are heavily infested with living scales.
