

COOLEDGE HAS DISOBEYED HIS POLITICAL CAUSE

President's Secretary Returned from Convention Score Over the Way Butler Managed Affairs; the Old Guard Are Sore Today

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 15.—C. Coolidge, private secretary to President Coolidge, today displayed a more than ordinary interest in the case of difficulties with William H. Butler, chairman of the republican committee, over the management of the forthcoming campaign.

In a formal statement issued at the House Chamber, Coolidge resigned and did not intend to return.

On the contrary, he said, he expected to take an active part in President Coolidge's campaign, as a member of the advisory committee of the republican campaign committee, which he said, "will have the real management of the campaign."

Many reports circulated around the capital today that Slump was resigning immediately. The reports given cover by Slump's scheduled departure for Cincinnati this afternoon, however, are in the nature of a statement that he was going there to be present at an operation upon his tonsils.

WASHINGTON, June 15.—President Coolidge today was convinced of the necessity of assuming the role of mediator in two intraparty conflicts that seriously threaten smooth running of his campaign. These are:

One is the rift over in the republican ranks headed by William H. Butler, republican national committee chairman, and C. Coolidge, Slump, the president's secretary.

The other estrangement between the Coolidge campaign management and the "old guard" senators who were read into the outer darkness by Butler at the Cleveland convention.

Slump resigned from Cleveland with the understanding that he would be forthwith held before the president. The secretary is said to be content about the handling of the vice presidential election which resulted in the nomination of General Hoover.

Slump, however, faces a different situation in relation to Butler, the president, for Butler is one of Mr. Coolidge's closest friends and his personal secretary as well as of the president's committee.

The president will hear Butler's side of the row this week when he returns from Cleveland. If he hears Butler, however, in his position as the president's secretary, he will be in a position to advise the president of the situation.

The estrangement of the "old guard" senators is occasioning Mr. Coolidge a great deal of worry. The result of the convention he will still have to cope with on the December election.

WILSON GOES AS DELEGATE TO DEMOCRATIC PARTY

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After H. Wilson will be one of the Idaho delegates to the democratic national convention, which was held today in the city of St. Paul, Minn. Wilson was the request of Mr. Howe, who was unable to go, and Wilson's name was substituted for his own on the credentials. Mr. Wilson leaves for New York Thursday morning.

FORESTRY LAW PROVIDES TIMBER FOR THE FUTURE

ST. PAUL, Minn., June 15.—The forestry law, which was passed by the Senate today, will provide for the future of the timber resources of the United States.

The law is the result of a long and arduous struggle between the timber industry and the conservationists. It provides for the establishment of national forests and the regulation of logging operations.

One of the most important features of the law is the requirement that the secretary of agriculture to report to the states in the protection of timberland and to provide for the future of the timber resources.

Another section of the law authorizes the secretary of agriculture to determine the location of areas of public lands which are chiefly suitable for timber growing or for the protection of watersheds.

The law also provides that such areas may be withdrawn from public lands and placed under special management.
