Murder of Bill Brennan Recalls Ketchel's Death

NEW YORK, June 20.—Bill Brennan, noted heavyweight, is the only man who carried a banner in the fight of the championship, is shot down and killed by a New York canvaser.

Five fighters go away. Most of them round out life's allotted span and live away peacefully as farmers, iron workers, actors or retired capitalists.

The man who makes his living catering human appetites to the canvas is so instinctively a savage and through his system must rouse the impulses of the killer.

Yet the ring has been singularly free of violent tragedies.

Ketchel died in death.

Stanley Ketchel was the only other noted fighter in memory to go to his death by an assassin's hand.

Bill Brennan was a farmer at Conway, Mo., Oct. 1, 1919.

Ketchel had gone to the Missouri village to train and was quartered at a Chicago firm here.

There was no quiet, pastoral background for Brennan's death. The Chicago Irishman died in the midst of the gay crowd by the night life with its lurid, electric atmosphere of characters and electric atmosphere.

"A dog barked him off."

That was the police sergeant's laconic report.

Brennan was not the fighter Ketchel was. Brennan was a man whose durability and infinite courage carried him higher in pugilism than anyone expected him to reach.

He was an artist with the eye, a tremendous hitter, a cut on his feet, and smart as a steel wire.

Once Brennan ran into a ring circle and built up a tough list of knockouts. The experts began to call him a "knockout" king.

Jacked legs Wallop

Indeed, had Brennan been able to live, he would have won the championship from Dempsey in 1920.

The champion Bill Brennan, Chicago, refused to trade and entered the ring in heavy, pillow shape, hoping to end the fight with a punch.

Brennan held the champion off for 12 rounds and then succumbed from his own exhaustion. This after that he reached Dempsey with full and shots to the jaw, but his blow struck the death sting. A Willard, a Firpo, a Brown, even a Corbett, had to have put the champion away that night.

COMMISSIONERS HAVE GOOD RECORDS

Announcement that the board of county commissioners will seek re-election will be received with pleasure by a majority of the people of the county. That they have made some mistakes cannot be denied, for they are human. That they have given the people the best service and that service has been good, all impartial observers will agree. They have been conscientious, honest, economical and industrious. Being three human beings, they have not always worked in complete accord in smaller matters but of greater moment they have worked together with more than ordinary unanimity and singleness of purpose and plan.

The movement by the Chamber of Commerce for the completion of the Jarbridge road, reveals a circumstance creditable to their party and to one member of the present board. When O. E. Carlson was chairman of the board in 1917 that board, of which two members were democrats and one was a republican, petitioned the democratic legislature under the administration of Governor Alexander to allow one county to build a road within the boundaries of another. The bill was passed and signed by the governor. War halted the project, and the next legislature under Governor Davis, repealed the law.

Twin Falls county has a great interest in the development of Jarbridge. Owyhee county, through which part of the road to the coal camp runs, has refused. Had this been left on the state books a good road to Jarbridge would already be carrying traffic back and forth to Twin Falls, Elmer and Hild. As the matter now stands, the road under construction to Death, Nev., will cut off some of the traffic which this county and state would have enjoyed had the law not been repealed. Chairman J. D. Barnhart and T. Dan Connor have both made fine officials and deserve to be re-elected as they doubtless will be by the people when they have faithfully served.

BORAH RUNS TRUE TO FORM

Just when Idaho thought she was to be freed of Borah by virtue of his being a candidate on the republican ticket for the vice presidency the senator, running true to form, did the expected and refused to do what his constituents for the most part wished him to do. He refused to accept the nomination. If in fact there was ever any real probability that his name was seriously considered.

It would have greatly endeared the campaign in the Gem state to have Borah, out of the way as a senatorial candidate, leading the field open for some other republican. But no such luck. Despite his many shortcomings, Borah will be before the republican convention this fall seeking the senatorial throne. He will get the nomination, and of course will be re-elected regardless of his opponents, both inside and outside his party.—Filer Record.

Borah is unbreakable so long as his opponents are divided. His opponents inside his own party will not defeat him, however much they may hate him. They will scramble and vote for him in order to keep him from quitting them. On the other hand, Borah will always do as he did in 1922; line up for the republican ticket. At that moment, though he may worry the nervous ones in the party during the campaign.

Borah will get a considerable section of the progressive party vote as long as there are leaders in that party who would rather see the whole state ticket go republican and elect Borah, than see Borah defeated by a conservative member of their own party, and a fusion state ticket win. Yet Borah is not progressive in either a partisan or non-partisan way, essentially, and that is why he has become backing of Senator L. A. Rockwell and Ed Dewey of the power trust. A. Bartow of the lumber trust, and Senator John W. Hart of the Utah-Idaho Sugar company.

A real fusion of democratic and progressives with the right sort of candidates and the proper kind of men running against Borah who would compare his talks with his votes could expose him and defeat the whole republican party in Idaho. Defeat of his record took enough votes from him in Twin Falls county in 1918 to carry it for Frank Moore.

That is why Borah and his henchmen in the progressive party oppose fusion. It is time for both democratic and progressive to quit taking orders from a republican politician and unite against the party that will beat both as long as they remain divided.
