
Ministers Invited

CUBS PUT PEP IN NATIONAL PENNENT RACE

Chicago Youngsters Putting Pep into National League Pennant Race and Brooklyn Has Been Peaking Up of Late; Pirates Pulling Out of It.

NEW YORK, June 25.—The National League race of 1921 promises to be the best in years.

A hustling ambition lot of youngsters from Chicago are putting pep into their team, while the Brooklyn players better ball than was expected, while Manager Bill McKechnie expects to pull his Pittsburghers back up, one of the best before another month has gone by.

CROPS AND POLITICS

The condition of the crops on June 1 was the poorest in a dozen years, according to the government crop report. That is, in the country as a whole. At this season, economists, financiers and politicians are most concerned in the outlook for the great staple grain crops. The June Report's importance comes down to wheat, for the corn crop is not far enough along to be statistically considered after July 1. Oats are in about as good condition as last year. Wheat is only 4 per cent below the June 1 condition of last year, and is nearly 9 per cent below the 10-year average.

The decline in the wheat yield per acre now forecast is due largely to the weather. There has been cold and dryness in the trans-Mississippi wheat country and there has also been damage from insect pests and various diseases of the plant. But there has also been a decline in acreage. Winter wheat acreage thus far have reduced the prospective winter wheat crop by seventy-two million bushels compared with last year's corresponding estimate. The total yield of both winter and spring wheat as now forecast, is six hundred ninety-three million bushels as compared with eight-hundred seventeen million a year ago. A wheat crop under seven hundred million bushels must be compared with the high record crop of this premier grain exceeding a billion bushels in order to appreciate the extent of the harvest shrinkage now threatened.

The effect of a poor crop year is traditionally depressing upon general industry and trade. It means the production of less wealth from the primary source of all wealth—the soil. But the economic condition of what growers themselves has been so bad for several years that they would probably find compensation in higher wheat prices for the reduced volume of production. The southern cotton growers were measurably relieved of their economic burden under post-war deflation by the reduction in cotton acreage and the devastation caused by the boll weevil. They produced much less cotton but the price of cotton went up instead of down compared with commodities in general. In fact, the price of cotton was so high that the McNary-Haugen bill did not apply to the cotton-growing industry.

A rise in the price of wheat due to reduce crop yield would be regarded as in the direction of agricultural recovery, even if the effect on the wage earners of the country, especially in the eastern manufacturing industries, were much less pleasant. The western farmer's grievance is the disparity between the average price of what he sells and the average price of what he buys. Compared with the average of 1913 the farm commodity index on January, 1923, was 26 per cent higher and in April of this year 40 per cent higher. Non-agricultural commodities in January, 1923, were 70 per cent above the 1913 level and since that time have declined to only 59 per cent. That is to say, on April 1 last non-agricultural prices average nearly 20 per cent higher than agricultural prices basing both on the 1913 level for purposes of comparison. This gap would be more easily closed if grain prices this year tend to rise because of reduced production. As the gap closes, the agrarian grievance of the Northwest should be minimized and its political effects become less apparent.

The history of American agriculture supports the view that nature in the long run takes care of it and that the politicians do more harm than good when they meddle with it for political purposes. Legislative measures of relief which go to extremes of government intervention have in the past been proved by events to be unwise and really needless. The free silver movement of a generation ago just barely missed revolutionizing the American monetary system in order to relieve agricultural distress; but only a few years demonstrated that agriculture could revive without 16 to 1. Congress in the recent session refused to go to the extreme of passing a bill putting the government into the subsidized business of "dumping" our surplus wheat abroad.
