## U.S. WILL WIN OLYMPIC MEET IN PARIS, GETTY

Regardless of New System of Scoring, the Stars and Stripes Will Go Up More Often Than the Colors of Any of the Other 41 Nations, Says Getty.

At Pittsburgh, June 27.—America will win the Olympic games, and probably will do so at the Olympic games, with something to spare.

The new system of scoring, devised deliberately to make more difficult the impossible American achievement, will not affect the outcome of the meet, and the unchanged number of entries present in any one event, is, from the Stars and Stripes' point of view, a good omen for the Colonels Stadium other than the colors of any of the other 41 nations.

If this country were represented by but one team, this might be a risky prediction, even with the apparently overwhelming strength of our team. But there are three or four teams over there at Paris, the Germans, the stars and stripes, the British, and the ones we held in Poland and Austria in Berlin.

For instance, we have eight men who are all so fast that if any of them are out of shape at the start, one can fill their gap and those others will be all right.

We have a plethora of short-distance men, and it really is too bad that only two of them can start in that final.

Colonel Thompson, chairman of the American delegation, a man of boundless enthusiasm, was just as

enthusiastic on this point as he was on the stadium. "American," he said, "is a prediction, not for publication," that well, he thinks the way the rest of the world looks at this country's chance of victory.

To add a sportman to the team, however, in one of the most important and wonderful sports, was just as good as anything else could be done.
