FALL FACES CONSPIRACY AGAINST U.S.

Former Secretary of Interior Indicted by Special Grand Jury and Is Charged With Conspiracy; Fall Also Faces Bribery.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 30.—Albert B. Fall, former secretary of the interior; Edward L. Doheny, Sr., and Doheny, Jr., were indicted here today by the special grand jury which has been investigating the sale of the naval oil reserves.

Fall, Doheny and son were charged on one count with conspiracy to defraud the United States; on the second count Fall was charged with accepting a bribe and the third count the two Dohenys were charged with offering a bribe; and with aiding and abetting V. S. Simonds, who was charged with conspiracy to defraud.

FAMILY OF FIVE BEATEN TO DEATH

SACRAMENTO, June 30.—Albert B. Fall, his wife, Alice, and their three small boys were found beaten to death in their home near here early today. Fall's wife had been beaten, had been battered with a blunt instrument.

Immediately after finding of the bodies, police searched for a man who had been living with the family. The man's name was not known.

The half-wit, according to neighbors, had not been seen since Feb. 20, and had been dead for more than a day.

Japanese Seaplanes Will Attempt 1500 Mile Flight Tues.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 30.—A squadron of Japanese war vessels, which was to have sailed for San Francisco on Feb. 19, 1924, according to word received here by Lt. Okamoto, acting naval attaché.

Air Mail Service Starts From Each Coast Tuesday

Uncle Sam's Flyers Will Travel by Night as Well as by Day; Huge Biscuits Will Guide Them by Night; Special Postage Will Take Care of Your Letters If You Want Them to Go via Airplane; Airship Leaves Each Coast Daily.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 30.—An air mail tomorrow an airplane laden with mail will hop up from the coast of San Francisco Bay, cross the way to the mountains four hours later a similarly burdened plane will skim down a flight on the Pacific coast, and land again at San Francisco.

This will be the inauguration of the first coast-to-coast air mail service, for which the post-office department has been printing and pointing for months.

With the arrival of the first plane in the larger cities along the route, airmail will be made by post office "air" in speed records in dispatching mail across the continent.

With Safety First.

"Safety of the pilot and safe handling of the mails" Postmaster General New said, "will be the prime consideration."

Into Three Zones.

The 1000 miles of coast line will be divided into three zones for the daily flights.



We understand that because the committee which is arranging the parade for the Fourth of July celebration in this city refused to allow the Ku Klux Klan to parade in their regular that this organization has decided to celebrate in Kimberly. Twin Falls will perhaps miss these humorous gentlemen and their wives but we believe it is the better judgment on the part of the committee to refuse to allow them to parade with their masks on. If these men wish to march like others who take part in the parade with ordinary citizen's clothes that should be sufficient recognition to the order. But we agree with the committee that no organization should be allowed to parade by thus concealing their identity.

The Chautauqua lecturer uttered a wonderful truth the other evening when he said, "Many men think that they cannot have an aversion of humor and merriment without growing smutty in their jokes." He stated further that this was one reason why humorous lecturers were staging programs like the one which was presented here last Friday evening by Ralph Chapman. Mr. Chapman did present a splendid evening's entertainment for fun and laughter and it was all wholesome fun. Between his jokes and puns he uttered some remarkable truths which were very much to the point. His definition of the difference between humor and wit was that a witicism very often carried a sarcasm insinuation which was too pointed oftentimes to be real funny.

This "should-be" of a certain vocal teacher from Twin Falls reminds us that you cannot tell just who, to trust now days. This man paraded about as a prominent church man and even sang for several revival meetings in the immediate neighborhood of Twin Falls and yet it is a pretty well known fact that this same fellow was in Twin Falls several years ago under another name and at that time was a singing evangelist. Some action should be taken to prevent this wholesale graft which some men are permitted to reap from the public. Justice should be meted out to such offenders without mercy and the quicker these fellows are brought to justice, the better society will off. Men who will work in an unorthodox way, and use the church as a screen for gaining people's confidence are indeed the very sort of criminals. It is your duty and mine to do our best to see that such men are punished and we should help gather the evidence for the conviction of such criminals.

ONE FARM COMMUNITY BENEFITED

The children in one rural district in the south have been fortunate during the past few years in having their six-months term extended to a nine-month term. The state normal school at Troy, Mo., according to a report received by the United States bureau of education, kept its elementary school open free of charge to the neighboring rural children during the three summer months. The district furnished the trucks and the normal school furnished the gasoline and drivers for transporting the pupils.

When this service was first extended to the rural districts they looked upon it with distrust. Attendence was optional. The mid-givings rapidly cleared away as is illustrated by the growth in number of the pupils along out-of-the bus lines. The head increased from six pupils the first day to 26 the second day, to 60 by the end of the fifth day.

The pupils were classified on the basis of needs as revealed by standard tests. The regular rural course of study was pursued, each pupil beginning where he left off in the rural school. The normal school, glad to extend this service since its summer school students could thus see and get experience with the type of pupils they were to work among during the coming school year. The rural people were grateful for the service since it offered their children educational opportunities during that period, equal to those received by the more fortunate urban children.

SUMMER PLAY FOR YOUNG COUNTRY CHILDREN

The consolidated rural school can furnish a very helpful service during the summer months to the young children of the community, and to their mothers as well. The summer is a trying time for children of kindergarten and primary age since the older members of the family are too busy to give them attention, and being unable to be of help they do not know what to do with themselves. It is the need of directed play and companionship that the school could meet by opening the primary room for the children's use, each morning, and providing a play leader, preferably a trained kindergarten teacher to direct their activities. To this room the children could bring their picture and story books and their toys for co-operative play, and by the use of paper, card-
