U.S. ASSURED OF VICTORY IN OLYMPIC MEET

America Takes Longer Lead at End of Fifth Day in Olympic Games by Winning Fiftieth and Annexing 20 Additional Points to Their Big Lead; U.S. Has Total of 177 Points to 103 for Finland.

ORE HENRY L. FARRELL, COLOMBO STADIUM, July 10.—Paavo Nurmi, Finland, won two Olympic events within an hour this afternoon.

The wonderful distance runner from the Northland scored twice, however, in the company, when he took first place in the 10,000-meter and followed that up with a victory in the 200-meter, shortly afterward.

COLUMBUS STADIUM, France, July 10.—The Stars and Stripes were flying from three Olympic records of the track and field games, leading the winning of the first three places in the pipe vault by Lee Barnes, the youthful Hollywood school "California" star, who put up, experts by winning the pole vault, 16 feet, 10 inches, and gleam Graham, of California Tech and James K. Hooker, of Michigan, who were second and third.

Ralph Sington, University of Oregon, who was expected to win the event, did not win "the money" but came in fifth place.

Although everyone of the above

had cleared the bar at 16 feet in the tryout at Harvard stadium, the record height today was 17 feet.

The Americans' performance in this eventuated 20 points to the United States, while the remaining 16 points, giving America a comfortable lead over Finland, as Postell and the other Isaac, throwers added, 16 more points to the American total.

Finland won two firsts, both to the credit of their wonderful runner, Nurmii.

Two Americans, Surplice, Two Americans, Pitch and Taylor, survived the first and second rounds of the 400-meter trials, while others, Johnson, and Wilson, were others.

In this event, Imbach's Swiss 7-meter distance little known, created a sensation by setting a new world's record.

Nurmi broke Olympic records in both the 1500-meter and 5000-meter events.

In the longer run, he was opposed by his teammate, Whitehead, who had ambitions to beat Nurnii—but was beaten.

Imbach, in his 27th pole-vault, he scored for Finland thus far.

Wide of Sweden, who "pressed" him. In the 10,000 meters, Nurmi, Sington, and Surplice, and Romie of Penn State finished fourth.

Surplice, of Finland, was third, and Gillon, England, sixth, the time was 14 minutes, 31.26 seconds.

Finland accepted 17 points in this event to three for the United States.

SULLIVAN SAYS DAVIS IS PROGRESSIVE

In his brief statement issued late yesterday, John W. Davis made a statement of two purposes which doubtless caused William Jennings Bryan to make the announcement that he would support the ticket, after previously saying that he might make no statement. The first of these purposes was to carry into effect the progressive platform for which Bryan more than any other man was responsible. The second was a distinct declaration to carry forward progressive principles in all things.

In his conclusion he said: "I shall hope to rally to their aid that great body of liberal, progressive and independent thought which believe that progress is motion government in action" which opposes privilege in whatever form and which does not wish the American people or their government to stand still.

"There can be no compromise with reaction. This is the mandate of the hour and I SHALL OBEY IT."

Later last night as a further evidence of good faith, he requested the nomination of Governor Charles W. Bryan for the vice presidency. His progressive attitude in the past is described by Mark Sullivan in his syndicate letter to the Capital News and Salt Lake City Tribune of June 8, wherein that writer in giving a thumbnail description of his democratic possibilities said of Davis:

"Came from West Virginia to Washington as congressman. Made a favorable impression on Wilson who was then president, and was loyal supporter of Wilson's policies in Congress. Wilson took him out of congress to make him solicitor general. As such Davis was described by Justice of the Supreme Court as one of the three ablest men who made arguments before the court. Late when appointed him ambassador to Great Britain. On July 14, 1921, from that office his private fortune was depleted and he began the practice of law in New York in order to accumulate a competence. His New York legal connection among corporations and banks are put forward as an argument against him by some democrats. Older democrats remember that in Congress he was progressive. He was one of the authors of the Clayton Act, exempting labor unions from the prohibitions and penalties of the Sherman anti-trust law. Has a fine accurate mind. Is an exceptionally attractive speaker."

NEWSPAPER COMMENT ON DAVIS

Democratic newspapers today are congratulating the party on its choice of John W. Davis while such republican newspapers as the Washington Post and the New York Herald-Tribune agree to the nominee's personal charm and ability.

Dissenting voices are few and far between. The New York American, owned by William Randolph Hearst, says:

"The proud old democratic party proposes to substitute the house of Morgan for the White House."

The New York World, which supported Al Smith, says:

"Yesterday the democratic party vindicated popular government in America. To have concealed nothing, to have fought the battle to the bitter end, and then to have turned the leadership to a man of the quality of John W. Davis, is proof that the democratic party is fit to live up to to govern and is worthy of the name."

The New York Times says:

"He is the man best fitted at this time to reconstruct and reanimate his own party and to lead it with intelligence and vigor against the republicans."

The Washington Post carries an editorial by Colonel George Harvey, who succeeded Davis as ambassador to London, in which Harvey writes:

"If the democratic national convention had done as well in framing a platform as it has in selecting a candidate, the chances of the democratic party would be much brighter."

The New York Herald-Tribune calls Davis "an able citizen unquestionably one of the three best considered by the convention."

"The nomination was born of desperation rather than of optimism," declares the Detroit Free Press, a strong supporter of the Coolidge administration in an editorial on the selection of John W. Davis as the Democratic standard bearer.

"Possibly he is the best person who could have been selected for the first and main task that confronts him, the task of preventing a party split by serving as a neutral figure about which the factionalists can rally. If he is able to do merely this, he will accomplish great work for the democratic party and he will do the country a great service."

"Mr. Davis was the ablest man in the list of candidates," declares the Kansas City Journal, republican. He is a clear and able representative of his party; he is a brilliant lawyer and has filled acceptably a number of important offices in the service of his country, notably as ambassador to Great Britain."

The Kansas City Times, also republican, said:

"After trying hard not to do it, the democratic national convention has made a nomination that must command the respect of the country."

The convention has by this nomination furnished the antidote for all the poison involved in its deliberations and probably the only antidote which could heal the skirmish scars so liberally scattered during its protracted deliberations," says the Atlanta Constitution.

"Every patriot will rejoice that the democracy on its one hundred and third ballot finally nominated such a man as John W. Davis instead of some others whose names were before the convention," commented the San Francisco Chronicle, republican.
