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

## AS DAVID LAWRENCE SAW NOMINATION OF DAVIS

David Lawrence, the noted special writer, gives a vivid description of the blocking of the delegates to John W. Davis on the last day of the democratic national convention. He declared that Davis was the real choice of the delegates whom they escaped from the manipulations of the able politicians. He says Davis is fairly satisfactory to the Anti-Salmon League and personally dry.

Lawrence accepts the reported offer to defend Davis, about the nature of which there is some discussion, and the legal arrangement of which Davis has denied, but shows enough other activities to prove that the candidate confines practice to class. Lawrence says:

"Left to themselves for the first time in three weeks and uninfluenced by seasoned politicians who had brought about the deadlock between McAdoo and Davis, it became apparent after only three ballots that John W. Davis was the real first choice of this convention.

"As a campaigner on the stump, as a lawyer, as a disciple of Woodrow Wilson, as a 'safe and sane' man on labor and prohibition; Davis was hailed as a great candidate who might at last restore harmony in the party. Certainly the delegates themselves behaved after the nomination as if they never had quarreled. It was such a remarkable contrast to the struggle of the last 10 days that it was welcomed even by the galleries with tremendous applause and cheering."

John W. Davis, as former ambassador to Great Britain, because a devotee to the principle of international cooperation, on the subject of the length of nations he has repeatedly expressed himself, but the democratic platform calls for a referendum on that question, so it will hardly be a cardinal point in Mr. Davis' program.

"With respect to Mr. Davis' record as a lawyer, he has served both capital and labor. He has been counsel for the standard Oil company, J. P. Morgan & Co., and the New York Telephone company and for the Plate Glass Workers' union, the Irish Free State, Eugene V. Debs and 'Mother' Jones of West Virginia, the labor agitator. He has been sought by all classes for his legal ability and until recently was president of the American Bar association.

"As a member of congress Mr. Davis was chairman of the judiciary committee and extremely popular. When made solicitor general by President Wilson, congress promptly confirmed his nomination. The late Chief Justice White said of Davis that he was the most brilliant lawyer who had ever practiced in his time before the supreme court of the United States. The late President Wilson is said to have expressed himself favorable to the candidacy of Davis shortly before he died.

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## BILL O'CONNER TO RECOVER IN FRISCO FROM FIVE SHOTS

Young Flier Girl Dies—Bertha Hamilton, aged 14½ this morning, died at the hospital in Twin Falls following an attack of pneumonia.

O'Connor, alias H. H. Connor, was found to have arrived here when police broke into his hotel room but was captured on a lice escape where he was shot in the exchange of shots that followed.

Both members of the sheriff's force and the Twin Falls police entered very vivid memories of this natural one when they were asked about his headquarters for several years while in a drunken condition the years ago O'Connor was placed under arrest by the Idaho Capital Police and chief of police and then deputy sheriff and in the fight that ensued Hermann, the broken arm, confuses in his mind.

San Francisco police report today that he has confessed implication in several crimes but did not give names of persons involved, which led him to an offer of \$2,000 reward for his arrest, although police are confident of his guilt.

## Wallack Slips from Jail in Washington as Deputy Arrives

Light arrived from the sheriff's office that "Virgil" Wallack, wanted in Twin Falls for wife desertion and violation of parole, would be held in jail until he could be transferred to Twin Falls after breaking jail in Kelso, Washington, just before the arrival there Saturday morning of the state parole warden charged to bring him back to Twin Falls.

Little hope is held out for the fugitive's release because of the evidence of his ample skill. The largest-weighted-sizes dressings, made possible by relatives which raised him to level of 165 pounds, two feet, four inches tall, were used to bring him back to Twin Falls.

The state parole warden, however, said he had no objection to the return of the fugitive, although powers were dispatched from the Washington town in an effort to recapture him.

Wallack, 36, left the state parole office Saturday morning, having been granted a furlough to Twin Falls, in the belief that a capture will not immediately result from the search. When he was last seen he was en route to Twin Falls, it is believed, having fled a demand for service in view of award to the defendant.
