LABOR MOVEMENT TO SUPPORT LAFOLLETTE

American Federation Carries Out Plan Anticipated by the United Press and Votes to Support Wisconsin Man; Gives Platform Qualified Approval.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Aug. 4.—A large political organization, with 50 thousand campaign committees, hundreds of speakers and 5,000,000 active agents will back the nation this fall in the support of the presidential candidacy of Robert M. La Follette, the Independent.

Large gathering of service men here today in a session devoted to arranging complete details of political organization.

Samuel Gompers, veteran labor leader, will in his active control of the movement which he believes will prove the biggest political undertaking yet attempted by labor in this country.

The council authorized creation of a speakers bureau which is instructed to sound up speakers in all present laboring view in behalf of the independent ticket to every person that can be reached by the far flung power of the federation.

A public committee will print and circulate from coast to coast literature in support of the independent ticket.

Every possible facility of this movement, it is labor's intention to make this campaign its biggest battle and drama for the idea that labor's vote is the deciding factor.

Each speaker emphasized the importance of the American Legion and other service men's organizations were playing and had played a major role in the success of the movement.

The morning session concluded with a brief report of the executive committee on special rules and organization.

Ten per cent of the cars within the state of Idaho are owned in Twin Falls county, according to state records. Twin Falls ranks second in the state in the largest number of automobiles owned within its borders. Ads has first place.
