

LOEB'S ACTS ON DISH IS TESTIMONY

Evidence of Michigan Student Is Used to Prove That Man Who Struck Fatal Blow Was Not of Ordinary Mind; Plagiarism Would Have Whipped Post.

CRIMINAL COURT ROOM CHICAGO, Aug. 7.—Intimate of Nathan Leopold, Jr., and Richard Loeb, took the stand today in an attempt to save the youths from the gallows for the slaying of Robert Franks.

Max Schreyer, Chicago, a student of the University of Michigan, was the first witness and said he knew Franks and Loeb "very well indeed." It was not until after the shooting, he testified that Loeb struck the fatal blow.

He said he noticed Dick was very nervous, but when his attorney Robert E. Crow objected to him as a witness, Schreyer told how Loeb fumbled with his hands and jerked his head about incessantly.

The witness said that Loeb's "eccentric" nervousness was by twitching movements and jerking of the face and mouth. Loeb failed several times during his stay at the university, the witness testified.

Schreyer said Loeb had "a mind made of delicate straws" and when Charles Defense Counsel Harrow asked him by what mechanism Franks was known, Crow objected and was sustained.

The witness, in answer to a question, said that Loeb frequently abused harshly at things that were not his own, and that he had seen several individuals, which the witness could not identify, who had been talking in the opinion of Loeb and Crow.

Loeb also was impractical, the witness said. Crow then started a sharp cross-examination.

Schreyer said Loeb's classmates of the same year, who were asked questions for the amusement they derived from his answers.

Loeb's attorney, Robert E. Crow, said the witness had no opinion that Franks was "perfectly sane and normal."

"I remember saying I thought Loeb was sane, but I don't remember saying anything about his mind being normal."

FORD DREAMS OLD STUFF

Henry Ford, interviewed in Collier's Weekly, proposes that the United States could make future great wars impossible by arming itself with invincible strength. We'd be the pole-axe man walking the beat with a big stick to keep order.

Nietzsche had a similar idea and sold it to the Germans.

The direct result was the World war.

Nietzsche in effect told the Germans: "There can never be lasting world peace so long as there are powerful rival nations with opposing interests. The most powerful, just and deserving nation (the super-state) should arm itself until by conquest it will be able to conquer the rest of the world and put all nations under our flag. Then there wouldn't be any rival left to fight. Hence—lasting peace."

Sounds logical doesn't it? The Prussians thought so. Their leaders, followed the Nietzschean philosophy.

Many Germans claim, and sincerely, that Germany really built her great war machine to keep world peace—that she had no original intention of going the limit with Nietzsche's idea of trying to put the whole world under one flag.

But as soon as a nation gets a powerful military organization, she's tempted to use it. Confident of her power, she "takes lip" from nobody. Take pistol-blowing by the individual—it inclines him to a chip-on-the-shoulder mental attitude.

This was true of Germany.

Hungary, too, is a patriot. Quite naturally, he believes that his country, America, is more just and noble and altruistic than any other nation—in fact, that we are the only people who can be trusted with super-military power.

The rest of the world doesn't think so. Every other country has the same notion about itself. It's this hollow-thought attitude.

Until nations get rid of this attitude that "I'm the only fair and honest gent in the crowd," there can be no international brotherhood. A police system must be by mutual agreement, not by self-appointment.

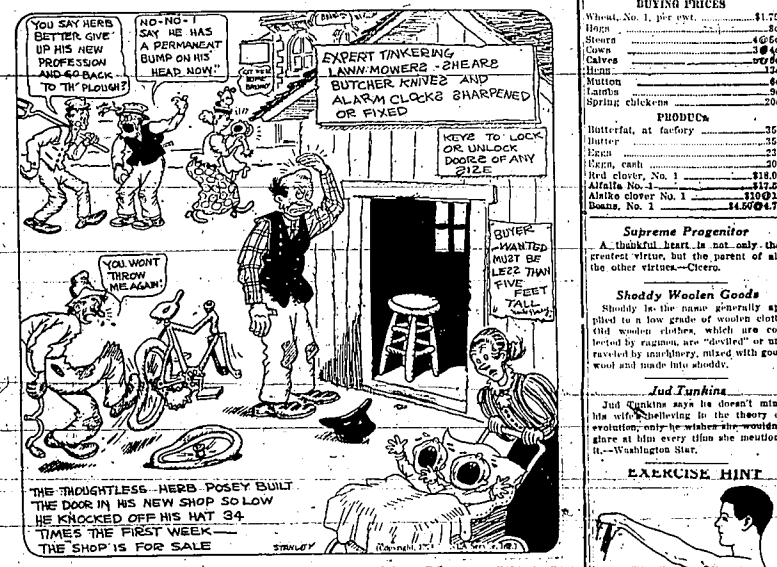
