"Apparently so," Dr. Hubert replied. "Then those police friends of Loeb's who mistook him for a burglar?" "Not necessarily," the doctor replied, "he may have been more nervous when he was a student than he is now."

Davis Bitterly Assails Republicans for Errors During Administration

He declared that the present administration had failed to restore the confidence of the people in their government. From President Coolidge down none was more than a puppet, he said, and the country had suffered through the "greedy misdeeds" of the republican administration.

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SCAB WORKMEN SUFFER WOUNDS

Five Miners Fired Upon From Ambush in Oklahoma Coal Fields.

WILBURTON, Okla., Aug. 12.—Five non-union miners were shot down from ambush in the coal fields near here today. One of the workers was injured seriously.

The shooting occurred shortly after the night shift of workmen left the mine. The five men were walking home when a blast of buckshot followed them.

Feeling in the mining community was aroused under local conditions. It is believed that the miners were fired upon because they were non-union workers.

The wounded men were Owen McHenry, Clyde Coffey, Everett Egan, Fred Williams and J. W. Wilson.

They told Sheriff Austin Park that three men fled from the scene after the attack and disappeared into the woods. Park took his bloodhounds to the woods but was unable to pick up the trail.

The Oklahoma wire state officials in Oklahoma City said that he could handle the situation without aid of state troops. "I have deputies searching for the men and expect to capture them before evening."
