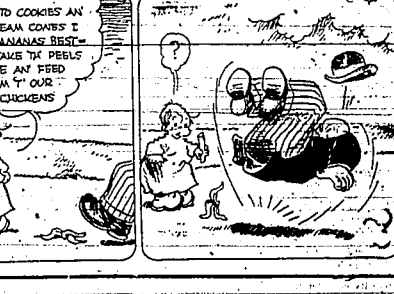

BANKERS' VIEW ON CO-OPERATIVE MARKETING

The attitude of the American Bankers' Association on cooperative marketing favors prior organization to facilitate the orderly movement of farm products, but holds that the co-operatives are so unmanageable in economic laws as to require special legislation.

It would be unfortunate for the farmer if he becomes imbued with the idea that cooperative marketing is a panacea for all ills, and that Mr. Stimson's attitude on cooperative marketing, well organized and wisely managed, can be most helpful in solving market problems.

Co-operative marketing cannot prevail at other countries with cheaper land and labor, even within our borders, at a price unattractive to us, it cannot successfully override the law of supply and demand.

The American Bankers' Association, Mr. Stimson said, believes that solutions of farm problems should be sought through private enterprise and not through government aid.

MONEY VALUE OF H. S. EDUCATION TO A FARMER

Many parents living in rural communities are doubtless debating whether they should send the boys and girls who completed the course in the small district schools last spring to high schools this fall. One question they probably ask is: "Will it pay in dollars and cents?"
The United States department of agriculture and the various state agricultural colleges have made a number of investigations of differences between incomes of educated and uneducated farmers. All of these studies show that in the majority of cases the better trained farmers receive the better incomes. The results cited in the following studies are typical of these investigations.

5. To keep myself physically strong--Morning calisthenics with optional dip. All suitable camp activities geared up to this law. Proper system for measurement of physical changes of scouts while in camp.
6. Mentally awake--Gear up scoutcraft instruction and merit badge tests to this law.
7. And morally straight--All camp leaders to set fine example. Personal attitude toward entire camp routine and boy companionship to be influenced by this law--Scouting.
