MURDER ENDS LOVE TANGLE IN MICHIGAN

Brutal Death of Girl at the Hands of Farmer's Son Comes to Light; Killer's Crime Was Committed by Consent.

ST. JOSEPH, Mich., Aug. 13.—"I saw him choke her but I didn't know he was killing her."

Thus George McKinney admits knowledge of the crime of his fiance, Emilie Spike, who confessed he murdered Cora Ister "for Cora's request," so that he would be free to marry Florence.

Mrs. Rader was to become a mother.

The McKinney is being held at the Berrien County jail here, although no definite charges have been made against her. She is the daughter of a farmer near here.

Sheriff George C. Bridgeman took George McKinney into custody on the road leading to the lonely thicket 12 miles south of here where the Rader girl's partially decomposed body was found Sunday.

"The murder was last Wednesday night," said Sheriff Bridgeman, "and statements made public by the sheriff, 'Emilie drove in my house in a roadster. Cora was in the car. He said he had to take her to Ullens and wanted me to go alone.'

"I drove the car. Cora sat on the right seat, and Emilie sat on the middle. Emilie wore gold, about three miles, I saw Emilie raise his hand and place it over Cora's throat."

"He was murdering her, but I did not know it. If I had I would have tried to stop him. Cora didn't cry out. I didn't see her again any more," stated.

And up to old Sheriff Bridgeman that McKinney's story was correct. At first he had told a slightly different tale.

"We were alone in the car," he stated. "Emilie and Cora had to marry Florence because I loved her. And Cora said:

"'Then get me out of this some way.' I did."

Spike still insisted that Cora had said she wanted "out of the way."

Cora and Florence were to have been married Sunday—the day the body was found. It was also Spike's twenty-fourth birthday.

"But after the marriage I knew I could never leave her," the youth said. Miss McKinney declared she had wanted to leave all of cringe.

"I weighed heavily. I told Lawrence Olt of Bridgeman about it, but he said, 'You've got to keep quiet for a little while.'

County authorities were looking for Olt today.

TAKING A CHANCE

Driving your car, you see a train coming. It's a passenger train, and you are sure you can beat it across the tracks. So you take the chance. Likely as not, you cross safely and are quite a distance away when the train thunder past.

But—

Thousands are killed each year at the railroad grade crossings, afoot or in auto. Every one of them was sure he could beat the approaching train, except in cases where they were careless and didn't observe the train coming.

Now—

The average fast train passes the grade crossing in seven seconds. Are you really so rushed for time that you can afford to take a chance on your life to save seven seconds? Think it over.

MONEY VALUE OF H. S. EDUCATION TO A FARMER

Many parents living in rural communities are doubtless debating whether they should send the boys and girls who completed the courses in the small district schools have spring to high schools this fall. One question they probably ask is: "Will it pay in dollars and cents?"

The United States Department of agriculture and the various state agricultural colleges have made a number of investigations of differences between incomes of educated and uneducated farmers. All of these studies show that in the majority of cases the better trained farmers receive the better incomes. The results cited in the following studies are typical of these investigations.

The department of agriculture reports a survey of three representative areas in Indiana, Illinois and Iowa, which shows that tenant farmers with a high school education receive an average annual income of \$926 a year more than the men with only a complete school education. A college education will add to this average about a year making the income of college graduates \$715 more than the labor earnings of the men with only a common school education.

Cornell University has estimated that a high school education is worth as much to a farmer as \$6000 worth of bonds bearing 5 per cent interest; and that a college education is worth twice that amount.

ASCOUT LAW CAMP PROGRAM

2. And my country—Morning flag raising, evening retreat weekly patriotic assemblies.



5. To keep myself physically strong—Morning calisthenics with optional dip. All suitable camp activities geared up to this law. Proper system for measurement of physical changes of scouts while in camp.

6. Mentally awake—Gear up scoutercraft instruction and merit badge tests to this law.

7. And morally straight—All camp leaders to set fine example. Personal attitude toward entire camp routine and boy campers to be influenced by this law—Scouting.
