

GERMANY ACCEPTS PROPOSAL

Word Comes From Allied Circles That Scheme of Conference Has Been Found Acceptable to Government of Germany.

LONDON, Aug. 15.—The German government has decided to accept the proposal of allied conference on the Dawes report, providing Franco-Belgian military evacuation of the Ruhr within a year, it was stated in high quarters here this evening.

The favorable word emanated from authoritative allied circles, and while no confirmation had been given in German quarters up to 8 p. m. it was reported that the acceptance of the allied program would be announced either late tonight or tomorrow.

TOWNS IN PATH OF FOREST FIRE

Coulterville and Breiburg Threatened by Raging Flames.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 15.—Two fires running through the Merced valley near Yosemite national park were approaching Coulterville and Breiburg today, fanned by high winds. Scores of expert fire fighters have battled the fires for hours, with little appreciable progress in retarding their advance. One of the fires, which started in Anderson valley, has destroyed a summer resort several hours in the town of Kinley, several ranch houses and a large amount of timber.

The Breiburg fire now is but a mile below El Portal, at the terminus of the Yosemite valley railroad, and 12 miles from El Capitan in Yosemite valley. There is no fire in the national park, nor is it seriously threatened.

National Forester W. H. Greeley has ordered reinforcements of expert fire fighters to report to the office of the fire from New York, and from Missouri. The first detachment left New Mexico yesterday.

The Truckee basin fire on the eastern slope of the Sierra Nevada range today was believed to be burning hot, but according to meager advice reaching here.

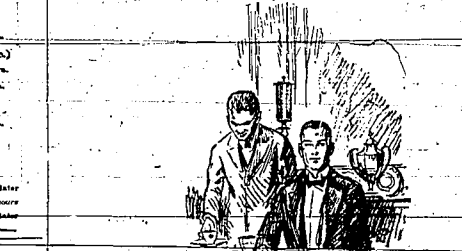

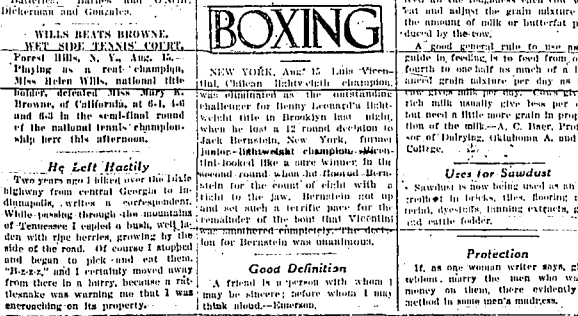

IDAHO WANTS CHEAPER GAS

Throughout Nebraska and points in the middle-west gasoline is selling for 15 cents per gallon. On the Pacific coast it costs 15 to 20 cents per gallon. In Idaho and in Boise consumers of gasoline are today paying 29 cents for high test gas and 25 1/2 cents for common gas.

This means a difference of from 5 to 9 cents per gallon between middle west points and this state. A slight increase in freight might justify a differential of a cent or two; but there is no logical reason why the people here should be overcharged to pay fat dividends to the oil companies.

That there is something radically wrong with the marketing of gasoline is indicated by the fact that there is no spread of difference in retail price in various parts of the United States. President Coolidge some time ago ordered an investigation of this situation, and a partial report has been made.

Within the past few days Attorney General Stone has started a further inquiry. The report of the federal trade commissioner on the subject, made at the request of the president, contains information, Mr. Stone said, which warrants a further investigation of the several phases of the problem.

Department officials described the trade commissioner's report, which has never been made public, as "very interesting," but indicated that it was incomplete in some ways, and the department of justice now will delve into the leads thus afforded. Mr. Stone was said to believe that such an inquiry might supply the government not only with better knowledge of what is going on in the whole oil industry, but with evidence which it might use in its injunction suits recently filed in Chicago to break up selling agreements.

Apparently the oil business is operated on the basis of "choking" all the traffic will bear. In some states, where agitation was started against higher prices, material reductions were made. In other states like Nebraska and South Dakota, activity on the part of the governors resulted in relief to motorists. However, it is not properly the function of the state governments to intrude in the oil distribution business, for it establishes a precedent applicable to other lines of endeavor.

It is not the intention of this editorial to attack local gas dealers for it is understood they make a profit of only two cents on each gallon. Instead, the dealers are, or should be, just as much interested, if not more, than the consumers, for if the price of gasoline were reduced it would act as a stimulus and result in greater consumption. This would mean a larger volume of business and greater profits.

How long are we going to passively pay any price which the oil corporations wish to exact? Other states, through agitation, and concerted action, have compelled a reduction, and the same thing can be done here. Automobile owners should organize clubs, with a slogan of lower gas prices, and if necessary, invoke a boycott on the use of gas until some relief is afforded.

In the past the people of Idaho have been the victims of discrimination in several ways, and it is time that they asserted their determination to resist such gouging. The exaction of a penalty from the people of the intermountain country is not justifiable. The use of automobiles is essential in the daily life of the great west, and excessive gas prices are a money. Why must we pay from 5 to 8 1/2 cents per gallon more than in other states? 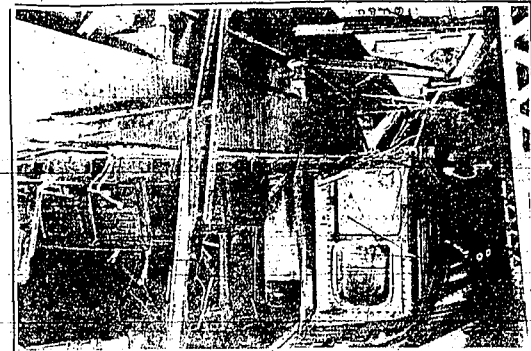

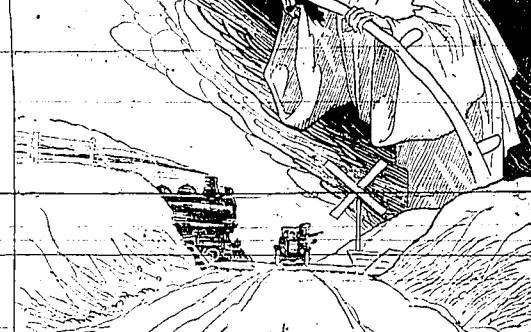

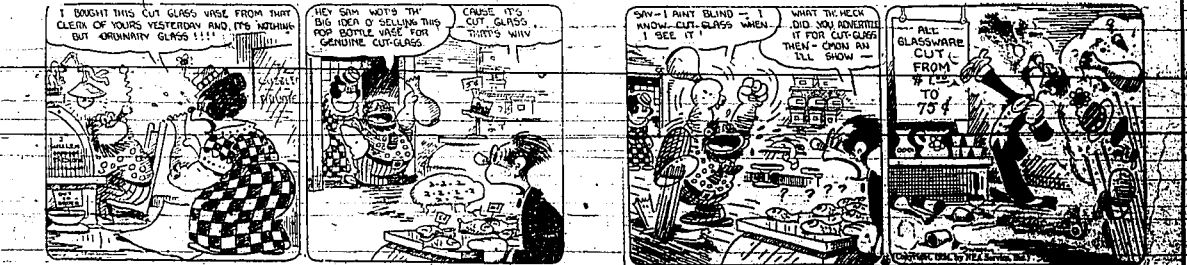
