MARS HAS DARK SPOTS ON SURFACE

Astronomers Say That It May Be Vegetation and That Area Would Raise 21,000,000 Bushels of Wheat; No Way Suggested to Get It Here.

Lowell Observatory.—Flagstaff, Ariz., Aug. 20.—Tremendous growth of vegetation on the equator of Mars that a month ago were comparatively faint, was noted in last night's observations at Lowell observatory.

The regions have been on the back of the planet for so long that they were not observable in their entirety, but last night they swing into a wider view and presented graphic evidence of the expansion of them that has taken place since the spring season began in the Martian northern hemisphere.

Glowing a faint blue-green in spite of submerging atmospheric conditions, when telescopes have power of observation, the new per cent. "radical school" of Martian astronomers believe it possible to be expanses of vegetation.

Off-hand, estimates showed their combined areas to be more than 100 million square miles, or about 370 miles across and reach, nearly three-fourths of the way across the disk of the planet.

Scientifically the regions are known as "more strenuous and more strenuous" than the "less strenuous." Latin for "less," was applied before it was discovered that Mars has no seas or oceans.

Reduced to more understandable form, the combined areas of the two "radical" schools of hundred million acres. This would raise more than twenty-one billion bushels of wheat, even if the crops were had.

On the earth this action brings about seasonal change, causing the growth of vegetation and melting to a certain extent, of polar snow caps.

It was observed at Lowell observatory that this probably is what is taking place on Mars, for in addition to the apparent growth of the "radical" regions the southern polar snow cap is slowly but surely disappearing, as the sun has been of Mars, a gaseous 130,000,000 miles of space.

Professor Graff, director of the Bergedorf observatory, declares he has "discovered dark spots on the planet which are indicative of the presence of large plant bodies, who could not be found before." Professor Graff said he was viewing Mars as it moved toward earth for its closest visit in 200 years.

Four Cents An Acre Charge Is Levied by Board.

Levy for the maintenance of the American Falls reservoir district was fixed at 4 cents per acre foot by the board of directors of the district just prior to their adjournment. The charge, which comes as a reduction from the 15-cent levy made for the past fiscal year.

The charge to be assessed will be four cents per acre for all land up to 100 feet above the level at which the reservoir water was subscriber per acre of land.

Under the first and second agreements on the north side tract the association will receive 4 cents per acre foot of water used for irrigation purposes, while 1 cent per acre foot will be received by the association under the third agreement, with the latter pro-rated subscription of storage water, which will be 1 cent per acre foot.

D. F. Detwiler, in an eloquent plea against the anti-Borah resolution yesterday told of a conversation with the senator after the conventions of 1920, when Borah, then supporting Harding, said that the time was not yet ripe for a third party. As the senior solon from Idaho is supporting Coolidge in this campaign, it is evident that his mind still refuses to meet with that of his interlocutor as to the time when such movement should start.

The assurance that work will probably start on the big dam this year has a sort of sound that will please the people of the tract very much indeed. There will be large crops at good prices, as it is, but some crops in some places would have been better with a good water supply and the suspense is nerve-disturbing. With the work started at American Falls, and the railroad construction well under way, the prospects for Twin Falls this year are the best in years, if not in history.

In "passing the buck" to the republican state convention, by recommending Everett M. Sweeney's resolution for Idaho Power to Idaho People? to that body, the county meeting at the Parish hall missed a great opportunity. The thing will probably be smothered in the state meeting and in any event does not carry with it the force and effect it would have had, had the local meeting taken an irrevocable stand, as did the democratic convention in its specific recommendations regarding the electrical issue.

Women fared badly in all the conventions. The republicans did the best since they granted twenty-fourth of the delegation voting power to women. The democrats did almost as well; they gave one-twenty-fifth of the voting power in the state convention from this country to women. The progressives finished a bad third by not giving any. It may be said in extenuation for the progressives, that they sent only the same number of delegates that they had votes. Had they selected four or five thousand, as many delegates as they were entitled to vote, they might have allowed a fraction of a vote to be cast by some women, too. Incidentally, the tendency of men to ignore women is what has caused such sporadic "Woman's Party" movements as that staged by Mrs. Belmont. None of the parties here can suffer from the action, or lack of action yesterday, since for all practical purposes one party acted just as badly as the others. There is no inducement for women to leave one and go to the other.
