

MARS HAS DARK SPOTS ON SURFACE

Astronomers Say That It May Be Vegetation and That Area Would Raise 21,000,000 Bushels of Wheat; No Way Suggested to Get It Here.

LOWELL OBSERVATORY. Flagstaff, Ariz., Aug. 19.—Transmittance growth in two dark areas near the equator of Mars that a month ago were comparatively flat, was noted in last night's observations at Lowell observatory.

The regions have been on the back of the planet until the last few days and, therefore, were not observable in the daytime, but last night they swung into a wider view and presented graphic evidence of the expansion of them and their position in the sky since the spring season began in the North American hemisphere.

Observing a faint blue-green in spite of altitudinal atmospheric conditions which temporarily hindered observations, the Lowell and other astronomers believe it possible to be expanses of vegetation.

Offhand estimates showed their combined areas to be more than 1,100,000 square miles. They averaged about 350 miles across and reached nearly three-fourths of the way across the disk of the planet.

Scientifically the regions are known as "mare striatum" and "mare chryserium." The name "mare," Latin for "sea," was applied before it was discovered that Mars has no seas or oceans.

Reduced to more understandable forms, the combined areas cover nearly 100,000,000 acres of land. This is only a faintest illustration, however, as no one knows what form of vegetation on Mars, if there is any vegetation, has taken in the process of evolution through the ages.

Since first noted this year the tilting of the planet on its axis has brought these regions more directly under the rays of the sun, the declination or position of the sun south of the planet's equator, has increased from about fourteen and one-half to twenty-three and three-fourths degrees. On the earth, this action brings about seasonal change, causing the growth of vegetation and melting to a certain extent, of polar snow.

It is believed at Lowell observatory that this probably is what is taking place on Mars, that what is in the upper right-hand corner of the "regional" regions the southern polar snow cap is slowly but surely disappearing as the sun's rays heat the area to across 138,000,000 miles of area.

Germany Will Agree to Fact of London, Government Says

BERLIN, Aug. 20.—Government circles are confident that Germany will accept the necessary two-thirds majority for ratification of the pact of London.

DAWES SCORES PROGRESSIVES IN ACCEPTANCE

CHICAGO, Aug. 20.—Acting as the champion of the republican ticket in the northwest, Charles G. Dawes, republican nominee for vice-president, has initiated a vigorous attack on the progressive ticket.

In his speech accepting the nomination, delivered last night on the broad grounds of the Dawes mansion in Chicago, Mr. Dawes, however, dealt with only a few things deserving brief, largely to an assault on the progressive ticket.

Extremist Individualism. "Robert M. La Follette, leading the army of extreme radicalism, has a platform denouncing public ownership of railroads and attacking our courts, which are a fundamental and constitutional safeguard of American citizenship."

"Our nation is asked to leave important constitutional moorings to enable again into the chaotic confusion which it has found up to the establishment of good government. Through the war of the revolution, through the civil war, and through the World war, our people have striven to maintain our constitutional principles. They are asked to follow the path which has been marked by him by an aggressive personality, a heterogeneous collection of those who are the enemy of all that is good and true in our country."

Prejudicial Issue. "This is the predominant issue in this campaign. Characteristic of the progressive party, it is an aggressive conservatism. It is the party of the two wrongs of progressive conservatism and of radicalism which are properly allied upon this issue in the minds and conscience of the American people, in the progressive party, with one conservative and one radical candidate on its ticket, hoping to get away by avoiding the issue."

"In this situation, for which the American people are entitled to thank the democratic party, as a party, instead of recruiting itself from the two main lines, will suffer only two things, besides those who try to straddle a real issue."

Dawes said that the republican party, under the leadership of President Coolidge, has taken the stand firmly for the constitution. "Opposed to it, and in reality its most opposition, is the party which has proclaimed the platform of the Dawes-Younis plan, a program of unbridled and dangerous radicalism," Dawes declared.

McCoy was admitted with a right to a second trial, following the verdict of the jury which found him guilty of the murder of Mrs. Kibb.

McCoy's attorney, E. J. Connelley, today declared that his client was sane and that he was not guilty of the murder of Mrs. Kibb.

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WHEAT CROP IN EUROPE VERY SHORT

Yield Will Be 10 Per Cent Under Last Year; Part of Deficit May Be Made Up From Fields in India, Washington Learns from Abroad.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 20.—The wheat crop of ten European countries is 16 per cent under that of last year, according to forecasts announced by the department of agriculture today in predicting a further reduction in the world supply.

Recent news of reductions has caused the price of American wheat to jump for its friends, and the present announcement of the department was considered an indication that a European market might be opened for the American surplus.

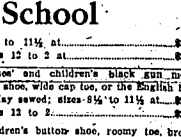

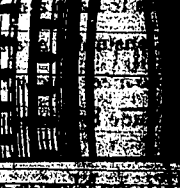

D. P. Drayton, in an eloquent plea against the anti-Borah resolution yesterday told of a conversation with the senator after the conventions of 1920, when Borah, then supporting Harding, said that the time was not yet ripe for a third party. As the senior senator from Idaho is supporting Coolidge in this campaign, it is evident that his mind still refuses to track with that of his interlocutor as to the time when such movement should start.

The assurance that work will probably start on the big dam this year has a sort of sound that will please the people of the tract very much indeed. There will be large crops at good prices as it is, but some crops in some places will have better with a good water supply and the auspicious news is disturbing. With the work started at American Falls, and the railroad construction well under way, the prospects for Twin Falls this year are the best in years, if not in history.

In passing the buck to the republicans state convention, by recommending Everett M. Swooley's resolution for "Idaho Power for Idaho People" to that body, the county meeting at the Parish hall missed a sweet opportunity. The time will probably be smothered in the state meeting and in any event does not carry with it the force and effect it would have had, had the local meeting taken an irrevocable stand, as did the democratic convention in its specific recommendations regarding the electrical issue.

Women fared badly in all the conventions. The republicans did the best since they granted minority fourth of the delegation voting power to women. The democrats did almost as well; they gave one-twenty-fifth of the voting power in the state convention from this county to women. The progressives finished a bad third by not giving any. It may be said in extenuation for the progressives, that they sent only the same number of delegates that they had votes. Had they selected four or five times as many delegates as they were entitled to vote, they might have allowed a fraction of a vote to be cast by some woman. Incidentally, the tendency of a vote to ignore women is what has caused such sporadic "Women's Party" movements as that staged by Mrs. Belmont. None of the parties here can suffer from the action, or lack of action yesterday, since for all practical purposes one party acted just as badly as the others. There is no inducement for women to leave one and go to the others.

It takes 75,000 tons to be established before the planting this year. There are 400,000 tons of potatoes in the state. The number will be reached. WATER BACK TO HALF ON WEDNESDAY

Manager Smith Explains How Supply Went Up to 80 Per Cent. Continuation of 50 Per Cent Flow for Rest of Season Is Promised.

Explanation of the conditions now which the Twin Falls canal company has been unable to raise their water delivery to 50 per cent normal and the prediction that within 10 to 15 days the flow will occur probably tomorrow, was made this afternoon by Burton Smith, general manager of the canal company.

"The question is being asked often where the water is coming from that is now being carried in the canals to maintain a 50 per cent flow. In explanation, I wish to say that the total storage accumulated in Jackson lake this season up to the time of the commencement of river regulation was 481,860 acre feet of this amount, approximately 1,250 acres were lost to the Twin Falls Canal company. Some of this was drawn out of storage till the first week in July. At the regular July meeting the board of directors decided to use the stored water available was discussed and a decision reached that the stored water should be used to prevent the flow of the canals from falling below the stage where 48 per cent deliveries could be made.

"The storage was drawn on rather heavily for this purpose, except for the natural flow. The water regulated by storms till about August 7; when about 2000 acre feet was retained in storage. Our storage had then been brought to Lake Walcott, and was being released from there as we needed it.

"The release during the time we were under regulation being in force, the natural flow discharge into our canal got as low as 1425 cubic feet per second.

Natural Flow Increases.
"About the first of August the natural flow of the river began to speak for itself. The flow rate was 2500 cubic feet per second since. In consequence of this we began to draw water from the storage. On the 5th of August, the deliveries were increased to 60 per cent, on the 8th of August to 70 per cent, and on the 11th of August to 80 per cent. This was done after a discussion with members of the board of directors who thought it best to increase the flow to a quantity that would put all available water in the canals, while the demand was greatest."
