GRAIN TRUST OBJECTIVE OF GREAT MERGER

DES MOINES, Ia., Aug. 22.—The man who claims to have furnished the idea for the co-operation merger of the five big grain companies in Chicago under the management of the American Farm Bureau organization is now preparing to launch another co-operative grain trust.

He is Harry Northrup, Des Moines land broker. He claims that he spent more than \$100,000 in an attempt to solve the marketing problem of the farmer and that he is prepared to spend that much more if it will result in stabilizing agriculture.

Northrup charges that the big grain companies recently merged, have taken in co-operative plan and perverted it to serve their own purpose.

He says that the merger is a co-operative project, but merely termed as such to escape the Sherman anti-trust act.

The main back of this speculative co-operative scheme, says Northrup, are those men who have always been enemies of the farmer in grain movements. These grain concerns have been hard hit financially, and by twisting the plan I worked out as an incentive to get the farmers to refund their operations. It is a stock-selling scheme to bleed the farmer.

The Indiana Farm Bureau, federation organized the merger, and warned the farmers to have nothing to do with it.

MARS BIDS GOODBYE TO OLD EARTH

Red Star Winks as Our Globe Sweeps Past but Keeps Up Steady Lick Without Showing Slightest Sign of Fatigue in Everlasting Chase.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Aug. 22.—Mars came within 34,000,000 miles of the earth last night, blinked his red eye and went away into space again, still as mysterious as ever in our eyes.

But delicate instruments at Lowell observatory here, record many facts concerning him and will continue to do so for many more weeks.

Summed up, this evidence shows, in the opinion of the scientists at Lowell observatory, that the planet in question is such as would support an otherwise adapted form of organism.

Terrestrial clouds interfered somewhat with observation here during the maximum approach last night but later in the evening they cleared away and the planet shined clear and strong across space.

The difference in distance between one night and another at present is not so great as might affect the investigations and even as the planet drops back into space he will become of greater scientific interest.

The summer season is just starting on the planet in his northern hemisphere and for weeks the planet will still be relatively close enough for observation of changes on the surface as they develop.

Next night's maximum date of this hemisphere corresponded with Oct. 23. The regions along the equator are expected to get a "dark area" as they are expected to become darker in accordance with the season.

The next opposition will occur November 4, 1925, but it will bring Mars and the sun so close together that observation will be impossible.

ENOUGH TO MAKE POLITICIANS WORRY

By CHARLES P. STEWART, NEA Service Writer.
 If progressiveism's development means a coming re-division of America's voters into two new parties—liberal and conservative—that's one thing.
 But if it means, henceforward, three major parties instead of two, that's something altogether different.
 There have been re-divisions before.

During the process of re-division, sometimes there have been more than two pretty big parties in the field. But in the end, matters always have settled down to only two parties again.

A two-party system is what the country always has run on in short.

It has had its little inequalities. There have been times when the president has been of one party and congress of another. There have been times when the senate has been one way and the house of representatives the other way.

In the past years congress even has been split three ways—Republicans and democrats not far from evenly balanced and the progressives holding the balance of power.

Now, however, there is a prospect that no presidential candidate will have a majority over all, leaving it to congress to pick out a White House tenant—and it's far from certain that congress, split up as it is, can agree.

Should a special election have to be called after March 4, to settle the deadlock, with some temporary chief executive, like Secretary Hughes, filling in, anybody can guess what a commotion would result.

And suppose the special election should result in a deadlock, too!
 All this would be bad enough once. It would be still worse if three parties remained in the field and it kept on happening, again and again, every four years.

It isn't impossible. It's a situation which actually exists in most European countries. Most of them have "coalition governments." That is to say, no one party has a majority over all the rest.

The only way an administration can hold office is by an agreement between two or more groups to work together, for a while. Of course they don't agree very well. Such a government necessarily must be compromising all the time.

Still, in Europe, where "parliamentary government" generally prevails, it isn't so bad, because "parliamentary government" is more or less adapted to it.

The United States constitution isn't adapted to it at all. Here the confusion would be terrific.

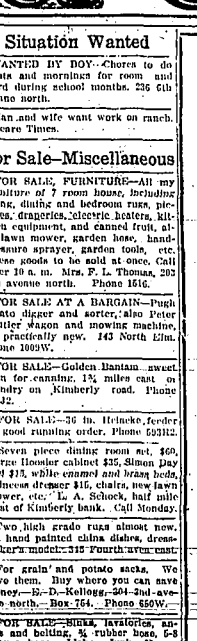
