TWIN FALLS AS HOST

The delegates and visitors to our city have been loud in their praise of the entertainment given them by the citizens of Twin Falls under the auspices of the Chamber of Commerce and other organizations. In fact, few cities have taken such a whole-hearted part in the entertainment of visitors as has the Magic City in looking after the democratic state convention. No stone has been left unturned in the management of this remarkable undertaking and everyone has gone themselves proud in making these visitors feel at home.

At the banquet last evening Twin Falls people came in for a good round of real downright praise for their splendid efforts in this particular. Everybody has laid aside their work more or less and devoted themselves to being hosts to these visitors who are here for a definite purpose and yet are not unkind of this hospitality which breathes the true spirit of service.

Many of the speakers praised unreservedly the efforts of our people to make these visitors as much at home as could be and to give them the best that we had. Prominent homes have been opened to the entertainment of these delegates and while they have labored over their political problems they have at the same time been given full away insofar as entertainment and hospitality is concerned.

There is nothing which so impresses a visitor as loyalty to your home town, and this we believe has been broadcasted by the residents of this city in a most remarkable fashion. It has cost something for the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce to stage this show but we believe they will find that before another year rolls around they will see as perhaps they have already felt amply repaid for every sacrifice and every effort put forth in behalf of these visitors.

DAVIS ON NEWBERRY CASE

The references made by Mr. Davis, in his speech of acceptance, to republican signals have not been relished. He could have made no allusion that would have received complete republican approval as to his taste. The New York Herald Tribune agrees that the English of the speech was felicitous. But if protests against the reference to the Newberry cases it points out that Mr. Davis omitted to state that the supreme court overruled the lower tribunal, in which Newberry was found guilty, and held the law, under which he had been tried, to be unconstitutional.

Mr. Davis might have been wiser to qualify his statement in regard to Newberry. But while Governor Smith's suggestion as to "treason" was rough, it has been at once seized as a warning of things to come, the ceremony of notification at Clarkburg went off without any such breach of taste as that which occurred when a notification committee appointed by a democratic national convention last invaded West Virginia. In 1901, the late Henry Gassaway Davis, then a very old man, was chosen as the democratic nominee for vice-presidency by the democratic convention at St. Louis which nominated Judge Parker for first place. Speaking on behalf of the notification committee, John Sharp Williams observed that democratic presidents and vice-presidents did not die in office. Taken in connection with the assassination of McKinley three years before, the earlier death of Vice-President Hobart and the assassinations of Garfield and Lincoln, the remark was agreed to as unparliamentary as it was unfortunate. The manners of 1924 thus far are certainly better than those of 1901.

The Germans didn't celebrate very enthusiastically the fifth anniversary of their republican constitution, but a serious movement to re-establish monarchy would doubtless cause a prompt demonstration of real loyalty to the new regime.

British conservatives who had been pained by the laxity of dogs brought on by the advent of a labor government were delighted by the scrupulous correctness of the top hats worn by the visiting American lawyers.

LaFollette might take a motto from Cobden, who declared: "We are no political party; we have refused to be caught by the Tories; we have kept aloof from the whigs, and we will not join forces with either radicals or clericals."

Mr. Hearst's New York morning newspaper publishes a friendly report of the doings at Clarkburg, but, in summarizing Mr. Davis' speech, declares that it "blazes no new paths" and "has no novel ideas." But of course, there are some other virtues than novelty.
