

GERMAN REICHS TAG RATIFIES PACT OF LONDON

PRESIDENT ELOQUENT ON VIRTUE

Homely, Elemental Principles Are Stressed in Address Before Fraternal Congress; Explored Reply to Davis on Ku Klux Klan Fails to Come.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 29.—President Coolidge today summoned the nation to practice the "simple, homely, elemental virtues of industry, thrift, industry, common sense, faith and duty."

In a speech to the members of the Fraternal Congress meeting here in which he made no reference to the Ku Klux Klan directly or indirectly, it was intimated that the president stressed the need of bringing the citizens of the country to a realization of the "virtue within ourselves."

Virtue Always Work. The virtues he named, Mr. Coolidge, are fundamental and always work. Before we conclude that the times are altogether out of joint, that all our institutions have proven a failure, that we must have a new order of things, we ought to be certain that we have fully realized the value of the things of the observance of these things of the observance.

WHY NOT JOINT DEBATE?

Now that Frank Martin, one of the ablest lawyers and most profound students of government in Idaho, has been nominated to oppose Senator William E. Borah for the United States senate, would it not be a great educational treat for the people of the Gem state to have these two men meet in joint discussion of public issues in the leading cities of the state?

Martin is the equal of Borah in ability, he is an excellent speaker, and each is thoroughly familiar with the political history of the other. Martin once served with great ability as attorney general of this state. Many would be afraid to go against Borah on account of his deserved reputation for eloquence, but Frank Martin is not afraid of anything or anybody.

Borah has many admirers in Idaho, who believe that his record is such that he deserves a return. On the other hand, in all parties, including his own, there are those who oppose him. The LaFollette men have nominated him as well as the Coolidge men, and yet he cannot be for both.

A series of joint debates before the people of Idaho would settle many things. Diamonds are unimpaired by a baptism of fire, and does not tarnish gold. If Borah is what his admirers believe, the debates would clear away many misunderstandings. Let us have the debates.

RADICAL VERSUS SANE UNIONISM

(By JAMES D. WHELAN.)

Refusal of the pressmen's union to endorse LaFollette and Wheeler is in pleasing contrast with the wild and woolly action of some of the radicals. Union labor representatives, who appeared before the democratic state convention resolutions committee with sane and reasonable requests and got them; assured the committee that a majority of the union men of this state were with the democratic ticket. In contrast with this is the attitude of a few unionists in Montana. Senator Wheeler, arrested on charges believed to be trumped up, had engaged his colleague, Senator Walsh, one of the ablest lawyers in America to defend him. Now come the radicals and demand that Walsh shall be discharged. Yet at the time of the arrest of Wheeler, he and Walsh were members of the same party. Must a lawyer change his political faith because his client does so?

Another case in point is that presented by the radicals before the progressive convention in Boise. Many progressive delegates had decided to vote for John C. Rice of Caldwell, a man of great ability and liberal tendencies, because of his recognized fairness and because they had determined to advocate a non-partisan judiciary. Some radical agitators appeared, press reports say, and declared that his decision in the Boise restaurant cases was unfair to labor, and so affected the delegates that they turned down Rice and nominated another man. The decision in the case was concurred in by all the justices on the bench. Representatives of union labor at the Hailey democratic state convention declared themselves satisfied with it four months after it was handed down in 1922.

The title of the action is reported as Robinson, et al. vs. H. & R. E. Local No. 782. The record of the case shows that the injunction of Judge Charles F. Reddish was much modified in favor of labor. The right to form unions and to strike and, moreover, to patronize the public of the fact and to request the public not to patronize the employer are fully recognized. A combination for an illegal purpose, or use of illegal means to further a lawful strike is forbidden. Pseudohol, libel, defamations and physical violence must be avoided. It is specifically stated that the words 'unfair to organized labor,' if truthfully not be enjoined. It is held that a lawful strike is not in violation of the Idaho anti-trust law, and that 'posting of pickets on the streets in front of a place of business does not in itself constitute a trespass upon the premises of the owner, of abutting property.'

The court did, however, hold in the particular case that the stationing of pickets or near Robinson's restaurant was intimidatory in character and had been properly enjoined by Judge Reddish, and added, 'This does not mean, however, that applicants are to be debarrred from use of the streets to employ other legitimate means of peaceful picketing or delivery. The injunction was broader than justified. The injunction should not require the applicants to voluntarily desist or refrain from in any manner interfering with the business of respondents. Neither should it include every species of expropriation or seizure. The case is remanded with the directions to modify the injunction so as to accord with the views herein expressed.'

As a lawyer of known friendliness to union labor and who was in this city during the democratic convention very well said, 'Judge Rice's decision should satisfy anybody who is not a red.'

The list is available for use in all dairy affairs and is being used as a mailing list for the distribution of information in regard to the coming National Dairy Exposition to be held at Milwaukee, Wisconsin, September 27-October 6.

Idaho Falls Participating. Information received in Twin Falls to the effect that Idaho Falls dairymen are planning on having a booth at the exposition.
